AN INTRODUCTION TO MACOMB COUNTY

The first white settlement in Macomb County was built in 1784 on the banks of the Clinton River, then known as the Huron River. A missionary group known as the Moravians pitched their tents on the south bank of the river approximately three miles west of Mt. Clemens, in the summer of that year. Known as "New Gnadenhutten", the mission had the distinction of being the first settlement in the State of Michigan. Four years later the Moravians were forced to leave the area by the Chippewa Indians.

In 1796, a settlement was established again on the Clinton River by a man named Christian Clemens. This settlement, later named Mount Clemens, was located a few miles downstream from the one previously established by the Moravians. The area of Macomb County was then part of Wayne County which included almost the entire State of Michigan and portions of Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Wisconsin.

In 1818, Macomb County (named after General Alexander Macomb) was formally organized as the third County in the State of Michigan, after Wayne and Monroe Counties. At that time, it covered a much larger area than it does today, extending north through much of the thumb area, east to Lake Huron, and west to the middle of the State. The southern boundary, Eight Mile Road, served as the baseline of the State. In 1819 and 1820, large portions of the County were removed to form the Counties of Oakland, Lapeer, Genesee, and St. Clair. Two years later, the current boundaries were reached when small portions of land were added back to the County.

Urbanization in Macomb County paralleled that of most

other areas in the eastern United States during the nineteenth century. Mainly devoted to agriculture, the County contained a number of villages where population was concentrated. By 1920, two significant developments occurred that would shape the future of Macomb. The first was the establishment of Selfridge Field near Mount Clemens in 1917, which was to spur growth of that area. The other development, much more significant, was the beginning of the urbanization movement northward from the City of Detroit.

Macomb County is located within the northern segment of one of the largest metropolitan areas in the nation. As such, it enjoys the benefits of the larger urban center, Detroit, while still possessing suburban and rural characteristics.

The County Seat, Mount Clemens, is approximately twenty miles north of the City of Detroit, 80 miles north of Toledo and 285 miles northeast of Chicago. Excellent highway routes to Canada and all parts of the United States accentuate Macomb County's favorable location. The dynamics of the Detroit Metropolitan Area are reflected in the substantial residential, commercial and industrial development in the County.

The locational advantages of the County are among its best assets. These include:

- A good system of interstate, State and County highways, with more to be constructed;
- Close proximity to important business and industrial centers in the State;
- Large recreation facilities located within the County;
- Open land for the development of residential, commercial, industrial and recreational uses;
- Access to the commercial and recreational advantages of the Great Lakes.

These factors continue to play a large part in the growth of Macomb County. Currently, the population of Macomb County is approximately 686,000 persons.

Only 482 square miles in area, Macomb County is the

ninth smallest of Michigan's 83 counties, yet it has a population which ranks third in the State and is larger than that of seven states and the District of Columbia.

Macomb County is known as "The Boating Capital of the World" since there are nearly 40,000 pleasure crafts registered in the County, most of which are berthed at the 59 marinas and at homes located on the many miles of canals and shoreline.

There are four privately licensed airports in the County. Selfridge Air National Guard Base in Harrison Township is the home of elements of the active Air Force, Air Force Reserve, Air National Guard, Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard. Selfridge takes pride in being the only base to have permanently assigned flying units from all five of the uniformed services.

Each of the automotive "Big Three" has extensive operations in Macomb County, the largest being the General Motors Technical Center, located in Warren. The Tech Center is where many General Motors products are developed and it's often called "the magic square mile". The site covers more than 1,000 acres and the entire research complex was designed by Eero Saarinen.

Chrysler Corporation has eight operations in the County, including the new Sterling Heights Assembly Plant which will begin operation in late 1984.

Romeo is the home of Ford Motor Company's Michigan Proving Grounds and Tractor and Equipment Plant, two of eight Ford operations located in Macomb County. Ford's newly expanded Vinyl Plant and Paint Plant in Mount Clemens, two automotive assembly operations in Utica and Chesterfield, the Sterling Axle Plant and the Van Dyke Transmission and Chassis Plant complete Macomb's Ford family.

Agriculture is an important industry in Macomb County. Its diversified program includes such products as roses, mushrooms, bedding plants, sod, cash crops, vegetables, nursery stock, fruit, dairy and beef. These are but a few of the total of twenty-one different agricultural enterprises flourishing in Macomb County.

MACOMB COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

In our County, as in the 82 other counties of Michigan, the Board of Commissioners is the legislative, administrative and policy making body for the county. Our Board is composed of 25 members who are elected every two years.

There are eight major committees, three special committees, 25 sub-committees and such special committees as may be appointed from time to time for specific purposes.

SESSIONS OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Organizational Session — The first meeting of the session, to be known as the Organizational Session of the Board of Commissioners shall be held in January of each year, at which time the permanent Chairman, Vice-Chairman and Sergeant-at-Arms shall be elected.

Annual Session — The Annual Session of the Board of Commissioners shall be held on the second Tuesday in October of each year.

**Public Act No. 261 of 1966
(as amended)**

An act to provide for the apportionment of county boards of commissioners; to prescribe the size of the board; to prescribe the manner of election of the members of the county board of commissioners.

Sec. 1. Within 60 days after the publication of the latest United States official decennial census figures, the county apportionment commission in each county of this state shall apportion the county into not less than 5 nor more than 35 county commissioner districts as nearly of equal population as is practicable and within the limitations of section 2.

Over 600,000	25 to 35

Sec. 9. The electors of each district established in accordance with this act shall elect one county commissioner to the county board of commissioners. There shall be no representation on the county board of commissioners other than that set forth by the provisions of this act.

Sec. 10. The term of each commissioner shall be concurrent with that of state representatives as specified in article 4, section 3 of the state constitution.

Sec. 11. Candidates for the office of commissioner shall be residents and registered voters of the district which they seek to represent and shall remain so to hold their office, if elected. Nominations and elections for commissioners shall be by partisan elections. To obtain the printing of the name of any person as a candidate for nomination for the office of commissioner upon the official primary ballot, there shall be filed with the county clerk of each county, a filing fee of \$100 or nomination petitions signed by a number of qualified and registered electors residing with the district, equal to not less than 1% nor more than 4% of the number of votes cast in the district by such party for the office of secretary of state at the last general election in which a secretary of state was elected. The deadline for filing nominations petitions or filing fees shall be the same as candidates for state representative.

GENERAL INFORMATION

COUNTY OFFICERS

The Michigan Constitution provides that the voters of each county must elect a Prosecuting Attorney, Sheriff, County Clerk, Register of Deeds, County Treasurer and Drain Commissioner or Public Works Commissioner every four years.

CLERK AND REGISTER OF DEEDS

Macomb County has combined the Clerk and Register of Deeds offices and Edna Miller holds that office.

Over 1,110 different services are performed by the office of the County Clerk, most of them statutory.

The County Clerk is clerk of the Circuit Court and clerk of

the following Boards: Board of Commissioners, Board of Election Commissioners, Tax Allocation Board, Board of County Canvassers, County Plat Board, Civil Service Commission, Election Scheduling Committee and Concealed Weapons Licensing Board.

Other functions of the Clerk are primarily record keeping in nature. The Vital Records Section has records of county births and deaths from 1867, marriage licenses issued from 1819. Certificates of assumed names and co-partnerships, records of discharges of military personnel and records of those persons authorized to practice certain professions are some of the various records the Clerk is required by law to keep. The Clerk issues marriage licenses, notary public commissions, concealed weapon permits and processes passport applications and naturalization petitions.

All Circuit Court cases, both civil and criminal, are started in the Clerk's office and records of these cases, dating from 1848 are kept here.

The Clerk's Election Department conducts state and county elections. The canvass of votes in state, county school and some city and township elections is under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk who is responsible to the Michigan Secretary of State for certified results of elections.

The Register of Deeds records all deeds and mortgages which have to do with properties located within the boundaries of Macomb County. All subdivision plats within the county are also on record in the Register's office. Financing statements on automobiles and other personal property are filed, as are attachments, lis pendens, federal tax liens, Michigan tax liens, mechanics liens and Sheriff's deeds.

PROSECUTING ATTORNEY

The Prosecuting Attorney, George N. Parris, is the chief law enforcement officer in the County. The office is established by the Michigan Constitution and the duties and

qualifications of the Prosecuting Attorney are set by statute.

The Prosecuting Attorney is a sworn impartial arbiter, charged with the conduct of criminal prosecution of the violations of state criminal laws in the interest of the people. As a minister of justice, he is also charged with defending those unjustly accused.

He represents the County in all Courts of the County and before the Supreme Court and Court of Appeals in criminal matters in which the state or county if a party or is interested.

In Macomb County, the Prosecuting Attorney's office is on the Sixth Floor of the Court Building. It is staffed with 42 attorneys — Prosecuting Attorney Parris and his 41 appointed Assistants. They service the District Courts, Municipal Courts, the three divisions of Probate Court and eight Circuit Courts.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSIONER

The basic job of Macomb County Public Works Commissioner Thomas S. Welsh is to build a more livable land.

It's an assignment that thrusts his office into the forefront of a wide range of public works activities... activities such as flood control, pollution control, water management, sewage treatment, solid waste disposal, subdivision plat review, soil erosion control, parks and recreation, and construction of storm drains, water lines and sanitary sewers.

His involvement in these programs is extensive and includes responsibility for initial planning, final design, sale of bonds, securing federal/state grants, construction, inspection, maintenance, repair, administration and debt retirement.

Facilities owned or operated by the office include three sewage treatment works, 42 waste water pump stations, 20 storm water retention basins/pump stations, 668 miles of storm drains, 174 miles of sanitary sewers and 43 miles of water lines.

The Public Works Commissioner is chairman of the Intra-County Drainage Boards, secretary/member of the Inter-County Drainage Boards, agent for the Macomb Sanitary District and a statutory member of the Parks and Recreation Commission and Technical Review Committee of the County Solid Waste Planning Committee.

SHERIFF

Sheriff William H. Hackel's jurisdiction encompasses the entire County. As a law enforcement agent, it is his sworn duty to enforce all laws and to protect the lives, property and welfare of the people.

So that he may fulfill these obligations, he maintains a Sheriff's Patrol, a Marine Patrol, SCUBA divers, polygraph facilities, identification bureau and many other services.

In addition, it is his responsibility to confine and secure all prisoners in the County jail, providing them with proper food and health facilities.

Not only does the Sheriff have criminal jurisdiction, his responsibility also deals in civil process.

The Sheriff is one of three members of the Concealed Weapons Licensing Board.

TREASURER

The County Treasurer, Adam E. Nowakowski, is custodian of all monies and securities of Macomb County. He is treasurer of the County Employees' Retirement System and, by virtue of his office, is a member of the County Election Commission, County Plat Board and County Tax Allocation Board. He is administrative agent and coordinator of all automated tax roll services. A primary and mandatory duty of his office is settlement with local units for current tax collections and collection of all delinquent real taxes. He is the Administrative Agent of the Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund. The office is responsible for accounting of all revenue, investments, securities, and

monies in financial institutions; sale and distribution of dog licenses to local units of government; collection of inheritance tax for the State of Michigan; certification of deeds and plat maps and other documents pertaining to tax histories and litigations; also conduct of the annual Tax Sale on behalf of the State Treasury. The functions of this office are dictated by state statutes, along with guidance of the Bureau of Local Government Services Audit Division, State Treasury Department.

PROBATE COURT

The Court has exclusive jurisdiction for: the administration of deceased persons estates; inter-vivos and testamentary trusts; appointment of guardians and conservators for minors and legally incapacitated adults; determination and administration of disappeared persons estates; name changes; secret marriages and waiver of certain requirements to obtain a marriage license; civil proceedings regarding the mentally ill and developmentally disabled person.

The Juvenile Division of Probate Court has original jurisdiction in cases involving juvenile delinquents, neglected and dependent children, adoptions and cases involving juvenile delinquents under 17 years of age and concurrent jurisdiction with Circuit Court for those 17 years of age.

FINANCE DIRECTOR

The Finance Director is appointed by the Board of Commissioners and has certain statutory duties prescribed by law including the maintenance of the necessary books and ledgers to control the expenditures of all County departments, and the preparation and presentation of the annual budget and the general appropriations resolution. The Finance Director supervises the County Budget and the ex-

penditures thereunder for the Board of Commissioners to assure that a balanced budget is maintained.

The Finance Director is Secretary of the Employees Retirement Commission and performs other duties as prescribed by the Board of Commissioners.

Under authority of the Board of Commissioners, the Finance Director has the administrative responsibility for the following departments: Equalization, Accounting, Data Processing, Purchasing, Internal Audit, and Reimbursement.

BOARD OF CANVASSERS

Each county must have such a board to canvass all state, county, school and some city and township elections. After the primary and general elections, the board reviews, analyzes and scrutinizes results to determine who has been nominated in primary elections and which candidates are elected in general elections. After the general elections, the board delivers certificates of election to the County Clerk. The board is also empowered to conduct recounts in certain elections.

CORPORATION COUNSEL

Corporation Counsel is appointed by the Board of Commissioners to serve as legal counsel to the Board and parliamentarian for all Board meetings. Corporation Counsel provides legal advice to all County officials, departments, agencies, boards and commissioners, and prepares and/or reviews and approves all County contracts and resolutions. In addition, Corporation Counsel represents the County, its officials, and agencies in all civil proceedings that may be brought in the various Federal and State Courts and Tribunals.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The Macomb County Health Department provides a wide

range of health services to local residents. The primary focus of the services provided is to maintain, improve and protect the health of our citizens through health promotion, prevention and educational program efforts. These health programs are delivered by the Personal Health Services Division and Environmental Health Services Division. Personal Health Services include: Continuing Education for Youth (CEY), Dental Clinics, Expectant Parent Classes, Family Planning, Field Nursing Services, Hypertension, Immunizations, Medicaid Screening, Nursing Home Patient Evaluation Program, Senior Citizen programs (SHAPE), Tuberculosis, Venereal Disease, Vision and Hearing, Well Child Clinics, and Women, Infants and Children Supplemental Food Programs (WIC). Environmental Health Services include: Consultative Services, Food Services Sanitation, Recreation, Sewage, Shelter, Solid Waste, Water, and Non-regulatory Direct Services. Other services include Nutrition Education and Health Education. There are three Health Department locations to better serve the Macomb County residents. They are located in Mt. Clemens, Warren and St. Clair Shores.

CONCEALED WEAPONS LICENSING BOARD

Michigan law states that the Prosecuting Attorney, the Sheriff and the Commissioner of the Michigan State Police, or their respective authorized deputies, shall constitute boards exclusively authorized to issue licenses for carrying concealed weapons to applicants residing within the county. The County Clerk is the clerk of the board and issues such licenses as approved by a majority of the board.

COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

The Cooperative Extension Service is one component of Michigan State University's Education Program, as established in 1914 under the authority of Federal Smith Lever

Act (38th Statute, Law 372) and Michigan Public Act 65, Laws of 1915, and subsequent amendments. Funds are provided to "... aid in diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects related to Agriculture and Home Economics and to encourage the application of the same..." Cooperative Extension Service is jointly financed by U.S. Department of Agriculture, Michigan State University and Macomb County Board of Commissioners.

Non-formal education programs in Macomb County are provided in agriculture, horticulture, natural resources, public policy, nutrition, and in youth development (4-H). Specialists in subject matter areas at Michigan State University support county staff in programs and services which require special technical knowledge.

BOARD OF ELECTION COMMISSIONERS

The law requires that this board be created to prepare ballots for state and county elections and determine clarity of wording on recall petitions. It consists of the senior Probate Judge, the County Treasurer and County Clerk.

EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES SYSTEM (EMS)

The EMS system functions under the authority of the Public Health Code, which establishes that each County in the State of Michigan shall be designated as a region of medical control for emergency medical services within their jurisdiction.

The Macomb County Medical Control Board (known as the EMS Executive Council) is appointed by the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners with confirmation by the board and is chaired by a Project Medical Director (PMD), who is also appointed by the Chairman of the Board. This Executive Council is mandated by the Code to assure that all advanced mobile emergency care services (ALS) and basic mobile emergency care services (BLS), both public and private, conform with the rules and regula-

tions promulgated by the Michigan Department of Public Health.

This non-paid Executive council consists of representatives from six cooperating hospitals, physicians, nurses, paramedics, ambulance operations, consumers, Fire and Police Chiefs Association, Macomb Community College, County Radio and Health Departments.

The Council is also responsible for establishing minimum procedural standards in the areas of patient treatment protocols, patient care quality review, training and continuing education for EMS technicians, system telecommunications and security, control and exchange of pharmaceuticals used by ALS units. The County provides a coordinator that acts as a liaison between the Council, Board of Commissioners and ambulance operations in the County.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Emergency Services is responsible for the planning, administration, coordination and operation of resources and manpower of all County agencies and departments having a disaster operations capability during declared emergencies. Emergency Services acts through the Sheriff's Department as staff aide to the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners in time of any natural or manmade disaster. Public warning, communications, training and development in implementation of survival planning are additional responsibilities.

EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT BOARD

The board was created under permissive legislation to administer the employees' pension fund.

FACILITIES AND OPERATIONS

The Department of Facilities and Operations is structured to provide professional engineering and mainte-

nance service in planning, construction, maintenance, and operations of all County-owned buildings and grounds.

The department is divided into four divisions: Facilities Engineering Division, Operations and Mechanical Maintenance Division, Building Maintenance, and Security Division. The entire operation is coordinated through an administrative section.

The Facilities Engineering Division directs and coordinates the professional engineering services such as consultation, investigation, and planning for the construction, alteration and maintenance of all county-owned facilities.

The Operations and Mechanical Maintenance Division is responsible for the proper operation and maintenance of the mechanical and electrical equipment in all county facilities.

The Building Maintenance Division provides the personnel, material and equipment to plan and direct the technical services of maintenance, custodial service, building management and county skilled trade forces for the existing county-owned facilities.

The purpose of the Macomb County Security Division is to safeguard the buildings owned and operated by Macomb County from theft, vandalism, malicious destruction of property, fire, and other natural or manmade hazards. An additional function of this Security Division is to assist both County employees and/or the general public in providing information and other types of requested assistance.

FRIEND OF THE COURT

The Friend of the Court is primarily responsible for the enforcement of all Circuit Court orders and judgments of divorce in relation to custody of minor children involved and collection and enforcement of all support payments for said minor children and visitation for the parents involved. The Friend of the Court reviews petitions for increases and decreases in support payments and enforces all paternity orders and uniform reciprocal orders of support.

HURON-CLINTON METROPOLITAN AUTHORITY

The Authority was created under permissive legislation (which required voter approval) to provide parks and recreational facilities on a regional basis for the counties of Macomb, Oakland, Wayne, Washtenaw and Livingston. It operates ten metroparks.

LAND FILE/TAX MAPPING DIVISION — OFFICE OF COUNTY TREASURER

A newly re-organized department maintains updated records of every parcel of land in the county.

The department is responsible for maintaining legal descriptions of real property changes recorded in the county. A drafting section draws current line maps containing all new subdivision, acreage divisions and consolidation of lots and acreage.

The addressograph plate records (40 years) have been converted into a data bank of Data Processing Center. Updating is forwarded by "input forms" to Data Processing on a daily basis.

LIBRARY BOARD

The County Library, supported through county appropriation, penal fines and state aid, makes many backup services, such as reference and book processing, available to the local libraries of the county. It provides direct walk-in public library service to all county residents by providing specialized materials not available at local libraries. In addition to a book collection of 190,000 volumes, there are over 1,600 films and 800 periodicals, as well as pamphlets, phonograph records and art prints for loan. The County Library also serves as headquarters for the Library Cooperative of Macomb, a federation of the individual libraries within the county.

MACOMB COUNTY ANIMAL SHELTER

To provide a holding facility for stray animals from all of the Macomb County townships and cities, to pick up dead animals, to answer citizen complaints and questions regarding animals and to enforce Animal Control Laws.

Hours: Monday-Friday 10:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m., Saturday 10:00 a.m.-3:00 p.m. Closed: Sunday & Holidays.

MACOMB COUNTY CRIMINAL JUSTICE MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM (MACMIS)

The MACMIS System is an umbrella for the County's computerized LEIN Network, Prosecuting Attorney Information System and Jail Information System. This system functions under a MACMIS Policy Committee which is represented by the Circuit Court, Prosecuting Attorneys Office, Sheriff Department and the Management Advisory Department. This Committee, appointed by the Board of Commissioners, is responsible for establishing policy that protects the privacy of individuals identified in information systems maintained by MACMIS and to regulate the collection, maintenance, use and dissemination of information in accordance with Federal, State, and Local legislation.

This MACMIS System is an integrated, comprehensive criminal justice system for courts-prosecutors-corrections components and is designed to provide a comprehensive method for timely data capture, access and retrieval of information. The Policy Committee, through a Coordinator, reviews applications for terminal requests, provides for security checks for all personnel assigned to have access to computerized information, process complaints against personnel for security violations, provides users training, dissemination of authorized material and acts as liaison for the courts, law enforcement, and corrections components of the system.

MACOMB INTERMEDIATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

The Board of Education provides a variety of services for local school districts, including business and instructional computer support, instructional and non-instructional consulting, instructional media support, and consulting/clinical services for handicapped children and their parents.

In addition, the Board operates six schools servicing the more severely mentally and emotionally impaired — extending such services to children residing in two Macomb Nursing Homes and the Macomb-Oakland Retardation Center. In another area, the District assists the State Department of Education in auditing roles and in teacher certification recording and reporting. The District serves as a middle agency in the three tier school system (State — Intermediate — Local) servicing both State and local schools.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES

This division is maintained by the Board of Commissioners to assist all county departments and agencies in analyzing and implementing improvements in office procedures, and where feasible, to design and implement computer data processing systems for more efficient and economical operation.

Management Services Division is composed of 3 sections: Computer data processing operations, systems analysis, and data preparation.

Data processing computer operations maintains a computer and the peripherals necessary to provide fast and efficient record keeping and report preparation.

The department is charged with the responsibility of surveying, proposing, and implementing improvements in office procedures, and where feasible, to automate manual procedures.

The data preparation section is responsible for the keypunching of all documents required as input to the com-

puter, and is also responsible for the editing of files via computer terminals.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION

The ten member Commission was established in 1966 by the Board of Commissioners for the study, acquisition and development of needed parks and open space. Functioning under the Board of Commissioners and through the Public Works Commissioner's Office, the Commission developed the William Tucker County Park near the Clinton River Spillway and the Macomb County Park at 15000 Metropolitan Parkway near Schoenherr Road. The Macomb County Park is the scene of summer ethnic festivals held each year. Located at the park is the multi-purpose recreational Independence Building. The William Tucker County Park hosts picnicking, fishing and rowing races.

PLANNING COMMISSION

The Macomb County Planning Commission was created under the County Planning Act, P.A. 282, of 1945, as amended. Established in 1956, the nine member Planning Commission is responsible for examining the existing resources and needs of the County, projecting future growth for the next 20 to 30 years, and suggesting a means by which this growth can be guided.

Other primary activities of the Commission include research, program development, and undertaking special projects for the Board of Commissioners as well as providing planning, graphic arts and audio-visual assistance to other County departments. Major programs include the Community Development Block Grant Program, Solid Waste Planning and Economic Development Planning. In addition, the Planning Commission prepares detailed maps of the County and individual municipalities, including school districts and road systems. They also prepare statistical reports on population, economics, land use and other planning related activities.

PLAT BOARD

A plat is a plan or description for subdividing land. State law requires that a County Plat Board be created to examine and pass upon all proposed plats as to suitability, conformity to general plan, possible conflicts with other plats and conformance with street and alley layouts of adjacent plats. This board consists of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, the County Clerk and Register of Deeds and the County Treasurer.

RADIO DIVISION

The Radio Division has the responsibility of system design, maintenance and supervision of municipal public safety radio systems for Macomb County and its political subdivisions. This includes all Federal Communications Commission licensing, writing specifications for and acting as consultant to the various police, fire, highway maintenance, departments of public works, and other agencies using two way radios. Macomb is the only county in the state offering this service for the benefit of the public.

REIMBURSEMENT DIVISION

This department handles accounts established by the Probate Courts and other county agencies. It takes care of matters pertaining to billings and collecting of costs of Youth Home and boarding home care of children and juveniles, private mental hospital care costs, state institutional costs, ambulance charges for which the county is responsible and other miscellaneous accounts. The department audits time and costs of the above mentioned accounts as well as investigating the ability of the responsible persons to reimburse the county for services rendered. The department works closely with the Probate Court and State of Michigan and makes recommendations regarding reimbursement.

BOARD OF ROAD COMMISSIONERS

Three commissioners are appointed by the Board of Commissioners to operate the Road Commission, as provided by law. Their duties are to formulate a policy for the administration of motor vehicle funds allocated from gas and weight taxes. These revenues are applied to the construction and maintenance of approximately 1,800 miles of state and county roads and all bridges located along routes under the jurisdiction of the Road Commission.

SOCIAL SERVICE BOARD

The law requires that each county create a Board of Social Service to administer the general relief program. The program provides general public assistance to the unemployed and those unable to support themselves, medical care for the chronically ill in the Martha T. Berry Memorial Medical Care Facility and assistance for the indigent in general hospitals. U.S. Department of Agriculture food stamps are distributed through the Social Services Department and foster care for dependent children is arranged.

SOCIAL SERVICES DEPARTMENT

The state and county share the administrative costs of operating the department. Its employees are classified as state employees under the jurisdiction of the rules and regulations established by the Michigan Civil Service Commission. The Department administers, under the direction of the Michigan Department of Social Services, the distribution of state and federal funds for Aid to Dependent Children (ADC), and Child Care services. This department also administers Child Welfare Services for the care of children who are wards of the state, issues licenses for foster care homes and oversees community based services for delinquent children.

TAX ALLOCATION BOARD

State law requires that each county have a board to allocate the constitutional 15 mill tax levy between the county, townships and school districts, on the basis of need, as determined by a survey of the tentative budgets submitted by each of the units.

BOARD OF TAXATION (EQUALIZATION DEPARTMENT)

This department maintains assessment and equalization records, surveys assessments and assists the Board of Commissioners in the matter of equalization of assessments and assists the local assessing officers in the performance of any duties imposed upon such officers. This includes development and maintenance of accurate property descriptions, the discovery, listing and valuation of properties for tax purposes and the development and use of uniform valuation standards and techniques for the assessment of property.

TRAFFIC SAFETY ASSOCIATION OF MACOMB COUNTY

State law allows each county to establish countywide traffic safety organizations. In 1965 the County established the Traffic Safety Association of Macomb County to provide assistance to all public officials in dealing with traffic safety matters.

Operating funds and leadership are provided by local communities, the county and private industry. In addition to direct assistance to communities, the Association develops public information for the motoring public to assist in making Macomb a safer place for everyone to drive and walk in.

The Alcohol Highway Safety Program is administered by the Association. The program is an educational approach to the problem of drinking and driving. Judges

and Secretary of State personnel refer participants to the program.

VETERANS AFFAIRS

This department provides assistance to veterans and/or their dependents with filing claims for federal benefits with the Veterans Administration. These benefits consist of disability compensation, pensions for veterans, pensions for widows and/or minor children, federal burial allowances, headstones, government life insurance, educational and vocational programs and medical and dental outpatient treatment or hospitalization in Veterans Administration hospitals.

The Veterans' Affairs department also administers the county burial allowance program, the soldiers' relief program and the Michigan Veterans Trust Fund. Special counseling is furnished on many problems affecting the veteran and/or his dependents.

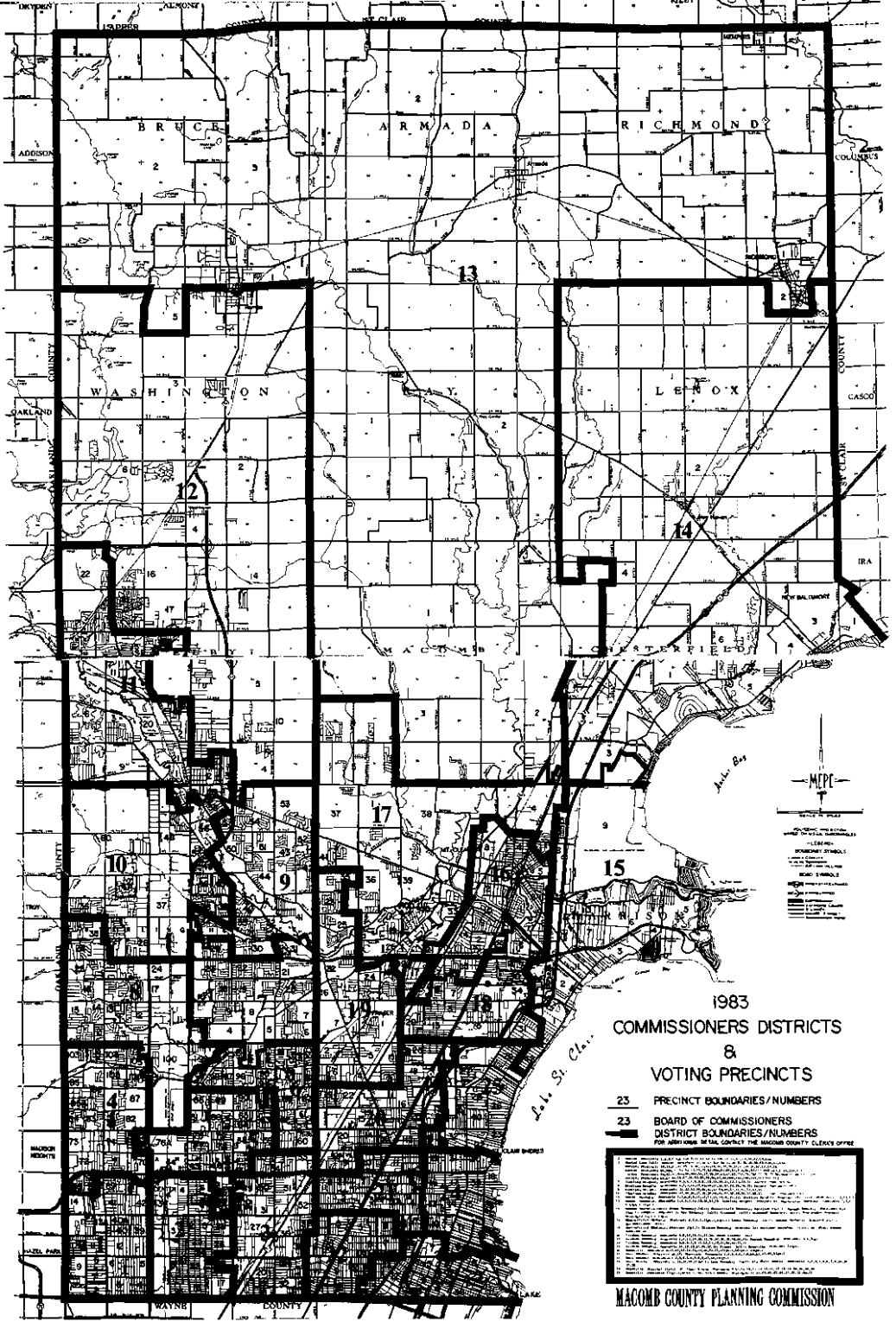

Dominating the emblem of Macomb County is the County outline flanked by a sailboat and three gears which represent recreation and industry, two of the County's greatest assets. The banner traversing the County's outline contains three triskelions, an age-old symbol, representing progress. The date, 1818, is the year Macomb County was established. Circumscribing the emblem are the words Macomb County and Michigan, separated by five-pointed stars — symbols of quality.
