Mr. Hacker, Chairman of the Superintendent of the Poor, requested that the necessary expenses be allowed to take care of the State Superintendents of the Poor Association Contentinthat is to be held at Mt. Clemens in 1927.

On motion by Mr. Evens, duly supported that the Convention in 1927 of the State Association of Poor Commissioners in the County be supported and that the bill be presented to the Building Committee of 1927 for the expenses of holding the convention, the amount no to exceed \$400.00.

Carri ed.

On motion of Mr. Evans, duly supported, that Judge Dusse be called before the Board in the matter relative to one Buscho, who is held for murder in the case of the People vs Buscho. The report has come to the attention of the Board that Buscho was seen in different parts of the County, in custody of a deputy sheriff, however, the Board takes exception to the privilege granted Mr. Buscho by the Sheriff.

Judge Dusse reported that the defendant is now in custody of the Sheriff and that the matter is now before the Circuit Court.

The Board requested the Clerk to call the Sheriff to appear before the Board and that the Sheriff (George Smith) explain to the Board, why he allows the defendant Buscho the privilege to go about the County with a Deputy Sheriff.

The Sheriff reported that Mr. Buscho is in his custody and that Buscho has business to attend to and that he should be treated the same as any other person charged with a serious crime. There are no special favors shown but, on account of the large business he has to attend to he should be granted the privilege of looking after his business. The claim of the Sheriff is that the man is considered innocent until proven guilty and that under the circumstances the defendant should be given such privileges

as will give him an opportunity ti look after his business, and that it is up to the Sheriff to have him in Court on the day of the trial.

The Sheriff wants to work in harmony with the Board and to the satisfaction of the people of Macomb County and if it is the request of the Board of Supervisors that he retain Buscho in Jail he will keep him locked up. The Sheriff stated that the prisoner will be kept in Jail hereafter, however, if he should allow him to go out at all it will be only in the City of Mt. Clemens and then only with two Deputies in Charge.

On motion by Mr. Bohnhoff, the Board took a recess until 1:30 P.M. Carried.

By apportioning to him such work as the present clerk can handle, and by calling in outside help in cases where the work is more difficult and when there is more hurry for the work, I believe I can get more satisfactory results.

I would appreciate this change as I would then know just how much I could spend for such extra help. Furthermore, I have agreed to pay the Clerk each week on Saturday.

The Chairman, Macomb County Board of Supervisors.

Dear Sir:-

- (a) I wish to make the charge that Mr. Edward Millar in employing one Paul Benz, as County Drain Engineer, is not upholding the laws of the State of Michigan. Mr. Benz has acted as County Drain Engineer since November 1925 to December 1926, and is not a registered Civil Engineer, in the State of Michigan, as required by law. (Act 334 of the Public Acts of 1919), during that time.
- (b) That the Drain Commissioner has shown irregularities in the conduct of his office and the employment of Engineers since the passage of the November 1925 resolution of the Board of Supervisors of Macomb County.

That Mr. Walter Lehner Engineer for the Nine-Mile Halfway Drain, has been allowed to continue in this capacity after the creation of the office of Drain Engineer in the November 1925 Resolution of the Board of Supervisors; and has been paid to date \$74,000 for an engineering fee. This does not include inspection charges on the work, clerical help, office supplies, and miscellaneous costs. That for said \$74,000 the Drain Commissioner does not even seem to have had a topegraphic map of the Drainage area of the Nine-Mile Halfway Drain; as his engineers, paid by the Macomb County Taxpayers, are now making (in December 1926 and Jenuary 1927) such a topographic map of the Village of Halfway.

It is my contention that Mr. Millar should explain why Mr. Lehner and Mr. O'Mara were not treated on the same basis. Also why such an enormous fee of \$75,000.00 should be paid for engineering on the Nine Mile Halfway Drain, When the cost of the consulting fee on the Sewage Disposal Plant is subtracted from the final total fee paid Mr. Lehner, it will still be a handsome fee paid for running 9 miles of levels. My estimate for the engineering fee on this work, exclusive of the Disposal plant would be \$15,000.00, Lehner's total fee will probably reach \$100,000.00

Your Committee on Drains Respectfully Report the following:

Your County Brain Commissioner Mr. Edward D. Millar has appointed, with the Consent of this Committee, Mr. David Ramsey as County Drain Engineer, at a salary of Forty Five Hundred Dollars a year.

The Matter of Bookkeeping System for the Drain Commissioner's Office is now under consideration and a detailed report of same will be given at the next meeting of the Board.

A Matter that should be given immediate consideration by the Board is the propestion of securing legal advice for the Drain Commissioner. At present it is impossible for the Prosecutor's Office to take care of the Drain Commissioner's needs. The usual attorney charge on a Drain amounts to one half of one percent. As there are a number of very large drains to be constructed this year an attorneys fee on a percentage basis would run into an ennormous amount of money. We would suggest that if an attorney could be hired for the Drain Commissioner at a fixed yearly salary it would be a great saving to the tax payers.

The large safe now in the Drain Commissioner's office is in a damaged condition and we recommend that the Drain Commissioner be given authority to have the same repaired.

Also that he be given authority to purchase a new four drawer filing cabinet.
