The ^Road ^Commission requested that all members of the ^Board of ^Cupervisors be at the ^Court ^House at 9 A.M. tomorrow when the bus will leave on the tour to inspect the County ^Roads and Bridges.

Mr. Rosso moved to adjourn until 9 A.M. tomorrow.

The Board of Supervisors met at the Court House on Friday October 14th A.D. 1927, at 9 o'lcock in the forenoon to start their tour of inspection of County Roads and bridges in the County.

Seventeen members of the Board, the Clerk, the Road Commission, Mr. Schelling of the Poor Commission and Mr. Jones of the Monitor constituted the group that made the tour.

Leaving the Court House at 9:30 A.M. after several pictures of the members of the Board were taken in front of the Court House, the party made its way down South Gratiot to the County Road Gravel pit, where a 15 minute inspection was made. The trip was resumed south to Erin, Clinton Town line to Fraser, thence north to the Sterling Clinton fourline bridge, and back to Mt. Clemens over the Moravian Drive to Plant # 2 of the fourty Road Maintenance Department. From there the route lead the party through Harrison, Chesterfield and Lenox Townships. At Richmond the Ladies of the Methodist Church served a sumptuous chicken dinner at $\frac{12}{14}$ P.M to the party and other County Officials and Norton Price of the Daily who joined the party at that point. Mr. Miller, City Assessor, explained these matters to the students in detail. On motion by Mr. Priest, duly supported, the Board took a recess until 1:30 P.M. Carried.




