The Mayor stated that the Committee had investigated the need of such a Department for the County and recommended that a County Clinical Laboratory be established. Further that Doctor Leo Braun be engaged to establish the Laboratory at his own expense and maintain

said laboratory without cost to the County for any rent or equipment. Further that for his services the County of Macomb shall pay to the said Leo Braun the sum of \$3000.00 per annum payable monthly when other county salaries are paid and that for said salary the said Leo Braun shall do all County work that comes to him or is brought to his attention that would otherwise be any kind of a County charge. That this salary shall include all transportation necessary in this work. That this service shall commence on February 16, 1928 and that the work shall be carried on under the supervision and direction of the Macomb County Poor Commission in conjunction with a Committee appoint ed by and from the members of the Macomb County Medical Society as suggested in said Societys recommendation filed at the Dec. 1927 meeting of the Board.

Dan Frost made the following report on County Buildings.

February 17, 1928.

To the Honorable Chairman and Members of the Board of Supervisors Gentlemen:-

According to your instructions we have investigated several types of buildings. We have been at Flint, Michigan, and gone through the County building, which has been built within the last two years. We find it very complete, but upon going through the building we find that several changes could be made that would benefit us when we build. We have also looked at several other types of building such as, schools, apartments and bank buildings, which only give us an idea of construction, not being the types that would answer our purpose. You must understand that a County Building is not built every day, and it is hard to find new types of buildings such as we are in demand for.

We have also gone over the present site very carefully and we are convinced that a building could be built on this site to meet our needs for the next fifty years, providing there is none of the land taken away for any other purpose. We have allowed thirty feet for widening of Gratiot in the front, but have not allowed for any of the other streets.

As to selecting an architect for this particular job the Building Committee cannot agree upon any one man. Each member has selected one, and we are submitting the three names to the Board for their consideration. We have investigated the three following architects:-

George J.Haas Malcolmson & Higginbothans Frederick D.Madison.

and find that any one of the three is very reliable and responsible. We are making this report for the reason of giving each architect time to appear before this Board at our next Meeting for a thirty minute talk, and are recommending that this Board vote by ballot which one of the three architects we should employ. It will not cost us any more now for an architect than it will later on, and this Committee could work more intelligently with the advice of an architect. It will probably be some time before we build our Building, but now is the time to lay our plans, and work out details so we will know when the time comes to build our building what we want.

Hoping this will meet with your approval.

An Engineer of the State Department followed Dr. Griswold and suggested another plan which would not be radically different from the master plan laid out by the County Drain Department.

That the change in the system would allow the people seeking relief to file a new petition and not cause them to wait the full year, as required by statute, to get relief by the present plan.

Mr. Hagen moved that the Board extend an invitation to the persons interested in the matter of sanitary drain relief for Roseville, to attend the next regular meeting to be held May 10th to discuss this matter further. The motion was supported and carried.

The invitation was accepted with thanks to the Board.

A letter from Edw. D. Millar dated April 23 relative to the 9 mi Halfway Drain Fund was read by the Clerk.

Some of these claims are questioned and some are open to argument as to the correctness of the amounts, but Centerline Relief and Nine Mile Halfway are correct.

The Clinton River, Bear Creek, and Red Run Drain now known as the Oakland Macomb Drain, as an Inter-County Drain, and is under the direct jurisdiction of the Inter-County Drainage Board. Hoad, Decker, Shoecraft and Drury, were appointed consulting Engineers for the project by the Inter-County Drainage Board. The field work has been done partly by the Oakland County Drain Engineering Staff, and partly by the Macomb County Drain Engineering Staff. Our expenditure to date runs to \$25,000, but it must be borne in mind that this will all come back to us.

At present, no work is being done on this project by Macomb County.

No new work has been given to outside engineers, since the establishment of the Drain Commissioner's Engineering Department, and this department is making money for/the taxpayers, and has shown an approximate profit of \$10,000 annually during 1926 and 1927, after paying expenses, including office and field equipment, and Drain Engineer's salary.

He stated that facts and figures presented by other counties to the State Tax Commission were so convincing that in the opinion of the committee the figures as recommended by the State Tax Commission for this County are just, and the Board of Supervisors should feel satisfied if the figures remain as they are at present. He stated that Macomb County was considered a part of the industrial area around Detroit, which fact could not be disputed, and was taken into consideration by the State Tax Commission when the valuation was recommended for assessment.

Mr. Kent, the other member of the Committee supported Mr. Miller's remarks.

The question of the tax report to be made out by each supervisor for the State Tax Commission as required by an Act of the 1927 Legislature, being Section 4, Act No. 360, was discussed.

He praised the management of the County Infirmary and stated that the cost of operating the institution was less according to figures than any other Infirmary he had come in contact with. He stated that it was not the best building but that its cleanliness and up keep was second to none

in the State.

On motion by Mr. Priest, duly supported-That the date for the tour be set for Friday of this week.

Carried.

Mr. Scheunemann stated to the Board that 32 miles of Road has been added to the County Highway system the past year and that some of the Highways have had no drainage attention for the past ten or twelve years.

He called this to the Boards attention so that they would have this information when they consider the Commissions request and recommendation for an increase in Road Maintenance Fund this year over the amount appropriated last year.

On motion by Mr. Miller, duly supported-That the Board adjourn until tomorrow morning at 9:30 A.M.

Carried.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Board of Supervisors met at the Court House in the City of Mt. Clemens on Thursday the 11th day of October A.D. 1928.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Mr. Streit.

The roll was called by the lerk, who announced that a quorum was present.

The Minutes of yesterdays proceedings were read and approved.

The Drain Commissioners Monthly report of Drain Funds and Revolving Funds and the Engineering Fund for July and August and September 1928 was read.

On motion by Mr. Licht, duly supported-That the report be accepted and filed. Carried.

Mr. Max Vandegeyn, Village Manager of Roseville, Michigan, appeared before the Board to complain about the bad condition of Frazho Road on account of the construction of Martin Drain and requested the Board to take steps to avoid the same result to repeat and leave Frazho Road in the same condition as the Nine Mile Road was left at the completion of the Nine Mile Halfway Drain..

On motion by Mr. Licht, duly supported-That the complaint of Mr. Vandegeyn be referred to the Drain Committee for immediate attention, and said Committee to request the Drain Commissioner not to pay the contractors in full, but to retain a sufficient sum of money to assure the Drain Commissioner that the Highway will be put in proper condition before the Drain is accepted and contractors released.

Carried.

Mr. Paul C. Ullrich of the Macomb Township Improvement Association with other representatives of the Association appeared before the Board. Mr. Ullrich stated that the Macomb County Improvement Association was instrumental in the movement that brought about the present Grand Jury Investigation of the Road and Drain Office and since the Association was

necessarily put to a large expense in this matter, which was a benefit to the entire County, they did not feel that they should assume the entire cost, and presented two bills for legal services amounting to \$516.50, which they felt the Board of Supervisors should allow.

The Chairman interrupted Mr. "Ilrich by stating " That he felt it would be the duty of the County to assume the obligation if the result of the investigation proved any of the allegations to warrant it, and that before he would vote on the matter he would want an opinion from the Prosecuting Attorney and he felt that the rest of the Board feel the same as he about the matter."

Following further remarks by Mr. Ullrich and other members of the Association, Mr. Licht moved that the matter of the Boards authority to ssume such an obligation be referred to the Prosecuting Attorney for an opinion.

The bills presented were for legal service rendered to the Association and its members by Alvin Wolfson, Mt. Clemens Attorney for \$416.50 and Clark, Klein, Ferris and Cook, a firm of Detroit Attorneys for \$100.00.

The motion was supported and carried.

The bills were presented to the Prosecuting Attorney who stated that he would try to have an opinion by Tuesday of next week.

On motion by Mr. Brewer duly supported, the Board took a recess until 2 P/M/Carried.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Meeting was called to order by the Chairman, Mr. Streit.

The roll was called by the Clerk, who announced that a quorum was present.

Mr. Witt and Mr. Burgess Representatives of the Macomb County Crippled Childrens Society appeared before the Board.

Mr. Witt made a few remarks about the work of the Society and introduced Miss Thompson, who read a report of the society's activities in the County during the past year.

Mr. Witt requested the Board to make an appropriation for the Society for 1929.

On motion by Mr. Hagen, duly supported-That the report beaccepted and filed and that the matter of the appropriation be referred to the Appropriation Committee.

Carried.

Mr. Hagen stated the two drain orderes of T.H.Scott for \$20.00 and \$30.00 respectively, were referred to the Drain Committee at the last session. He stated that the Committee felt that since Mr. Millar County Drain Commissioner, promised T.H.Scott an additional sum for overtime, the Committee would recommend that a check be issued for the orders.

On motion by Mr. Licht, duly supported, -That the report be accepted and the clerk be authorized to issue check for the amounts.

Carried.

Mr. Hagen stated that the Drain Committee met with the County Drain Commissioner on the matter RE: MARTIN DRAIN condition referred to by Mr. Vandegeyn and reports as follows:

The Drain Commissioner promised that he would see to it that the work by the contractors would be satisfactory before full payment is made. He stated further that the Village of Roseville has an agreement that gives to the Village the final word of acceptance of the work before payment is made in full .

The Chairman thanked the Committee for their immediate action and report which was ordered accepted.

The following request signed by fourteen members of the Board was offered.

TO THE HONORABLE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

On Friday February 17th, 1928, there was a recommendation given to the Board of Supervisors of three architects to be selected by the Board. Carried.

The Auditing Committee (Building Committee) made the following report:

To the Chairman and Honorable Members of the Macomb County Board of Supervisors:

The Building and Auditing Committee respectfully represents as follows:-

That during the year 1928, January to December, inclusive, counting the bills which have been paid and the bills which have been received and filed for services rendered during the year but not yet actually paid, this County will have paid out the sum of approximately \$9,401.53 for Stenographic services rendered in the Circuit Court, Probate Court and Justice Courts for County work. This includes the salary paid to the Circuit Court Reporter and all fees for special stenographic services.

After a thorough investigation and careful study your committee feels that a considerable saving to the County can be affected and do away with the fee system and employ a full time County Stenographer with the understanding that the Circuit Court Stenographer and the County Stenographer will handle all Circuit Court Stenographic work, all Probate Court Stenographic work, all Justice Court Stenographic work, and all Coroner's inquests Stenographic work, together with such special work as they may be called upon to render the office of the Prosecuting Attorney, Circuit Judge, or any other County Office, all Sport work to be covered by their salary and no special or statutory fees to be paid by the County for such work.

The Committee therefore recommends; First, that John F. Donaldson, Circuit Court Stenographer be paid an annual salary of \$2500.00, said salary to be in place of all fees chargeable against the County covered by the foregoing paragraphs; Second, that this Committee be authorized to employ a County Stenographer to be paid an annual salary of as \$2500.00. The duties of said County Stenographer to be/set forth in the foregoing paragraphs. Said Stenographer to be employed with the approval of the Circuit Judge and the Prosecuting Attorney and to be a competent stenographer capable of taking Circuit Court

stenographic work for any Judge or additional Judge that may be sitting in this ^Circuit, and said salary being in lieu of all fees chargeable against the ^County for any work mentioned in the foregoing paragraphs; Third, That Wilbur F.Held be paid the salary of \$125.00 per month, said salary to be in lieu of all fees of any kind heretofore allowed orcovered by any of the work mentioned in the foregoing paragraphs; Fourth, That these recommendations take effect on January 1, A.D. 1929.

Mr. Hagen of the Drain Committee reported as follows, the minutes of a meeting of the Drain Committee held December 27, 1928.

Minutes of Meeting of the Drainage Committee held at the Drain Commissioner's Office at 9:00 A.M. on Thursday, December 27, 1928.

Present: W.J. Hagen, Clifford and David Schoenfeldt and the Drain Commissioner.

The question of bids on the North Lorraine Arm Drain was discussed and on motion by Clifford A.John, it was decided to reject all bids and to re-advertise the letting of the Drain.

Carried.

It was proposed by Clifford A. John, that a recommendation be handed to the Board of Supervisors that bills from Walter J. Lehner for Engineering re: various drains amounting to \$1,999.79 be paid.

Carried.

Motion was made by D. Schoenfeldt that an amount of \$2000.00 be held back from the Steve Healy on his Martin Drain Contract until/road has been repaired by him and same approved by the Drain Engineer and the Village Engineer.

Carried.

On motion by Mr. Miller, duly supported-That the report be accepted and adopted with the exception of Walter J.Lehner's bill for \$1999.79. Said bill to be laid on the table until January 10th, so that the funds out of which the item on Walter J.Lehner's bill, can be investigated.

Carried.

The ^Building Committee by Mr. Miller reported and the Committee recommends that a part of the Northwest room on the third floor of the Court House be assigned to the County Surveyor as his office, commencing January 1st, 1929.

On motion by Mr. Hagen, duly supported-That the report be accepted and adopted. Carried.

Mr. William Kruse, County Treasurer elect, asked the Board of Supervisors to consider the matter of providing his office with Burglary and Holdup insurance. He suggested that a bond in the sum of \$10,000.00 be provided for the protection.

On motion by Mr. John, duly supported-That Mr. Kruse be and is hereby authorized to arrange for Burglary and Holdup Insurance for his office in the sum of \$10,000.00.

Carried.

Mr. Kruse requested that the First National Bank of Centerline, Mich be designated as a County Depository.

On motion by Mr. Licht, duly supported-That the First National Bank of Centerline be designated a County Depository on the same condition with other banks of the County so designated.

Carried.

On motion by Mr. Conner, duly supported-That the names of the applicants, who filed as candidates for the office of County Road Commissioner, which office is to be filled by this Board on account of the vacancy in said office cause by the death of John R. Taylor, who was elected to the said office at the general election held November 6th, 1928 for a term of six years commencing January 1st, 1929 and ending December 31st, 1934, be read and presented to the Board.

Carried.

The following named persons filed their application with the Clerk, as candidates to be considered by the Board of Supervisors in selecting a member to the Board of County Road Commissioners, to fill the vacancy on said Board:

- 3. Wm. J.Hagen

Joseph Meehan, one of the candidates, who filed his application, arose from the audience and publicly requested that his name as a candidate be withdrawn.

The Chairman asked whether or not there were any objection to having the name of Joseph Meehan withdrawn.

There being no objection, the name was withdrawn leaving eight candidates in the field out of which one was to be selected.

On motion by Mr. Weber, duly supported-That we proceed to elect a member to the Board of County Road Commissioners for Macomb County, to fill the vacancy of said office, and that the Chairman appoint two tellers.

Carried.

Mr. Abraham of Clinton Township questioned the legality of the name of William J. Hagen to be considered in the election, for the reason that Mr. Hagen is a member of the Board of Supervisors.

The Chairman summoned James E.Spier, Prosecuting Attorney, to the meeting, to give his opinion on the question raised by Mr. Abraham.

Mr. Spier stated that his opinion to the fact that Mr. Hagen was a member of this Board did not disqualify him to be a candidate, but that if he was elected to the office,

he would be obliged to resign as a member of the Supervisors before he could qualify as a member of the Road Commission.

 M_{r} . Spier was asked whether or not this Board could elect a person to fill the six year term at this meeting or whether this election would fill the vacancy for the balance of this term.

Mr. Spier stated that in his opinion their election today would be for the full term of the vacancy to which Mr. Taylor was elected.

On motion by Mr. Schoenfeldt, duly supported-That after the second ballot, that all except the three receiving the highest number of votes be eliminated and that there must be a majority vote to elect.

Carried.

Mr. Hagen being a Candidate to the office, requested that he be excused from voting.

On motion by Mr. Rosso, duly supported-That Mr. Hagen be excused from voting as requested.

Carried.

The Chairman appointed Messrs. Evans and Licht as tellers of the election.

Ballots having been prepared with all the names of candidates printed thereon with instruction to vote for one candidate as a member of the Road Commission, these were passed to each member of the Board by the Tellers.

The ballots were collected and the Chairman asked if all have voted, and announced that the ballot was closed.

There being no objections the name was withdrawn.

The names of the two remaining candidates were then placed on a black board with instructions to the members that Wm. J. Hagen and Harry W. V. Lumley were the only candidates to be voted for in this election.

The result of the fifth ballot taken in the same manner as the first, second, third and fourth resulted as follows:

The Chairman announced that Harry W.V.Lumley be declared duly elected to fill the vacancy on the County Road Commission of Macomb County, caused by the death of John R. Taylor, County Road Commissioner elect.

There being no further business to come before the meeting, on motion by Mr. Weber, duly supported, the meeting adjourned until January 10th, 1929.
