Bedard read as a report, the following letter from Harry J. Fuller, County Surveyor

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Macomb County, Michigan

Hentlemen:-

The terms of agreement reached between the Committee appointed by your Honorable Chairman and myself, regarding the making of the map of Macomb County, are as follows:

I agree to furnush all labor and materials, make all necessary drawings and tracings of the map required for record, at a cost of Eighteen Hundred Seventy-five (\$1875.00) Dollars (which is at the rate of \$125.00 per township), and the right to sell the first two hundred (200) copies of the said map, exclusive of copies that are necessary for the County for record. The County is to pay for the cost of printing (500) five hundred copies, said cost not to exceed Three Hundred Twenty (\$320.00) Dollars.

The rights for any further sales will then revert to the County of Macomb.

I further agree to keep said map up-to-date during my term of office as

County Surveyor.

Signed

Harry J. Fuller, County Surveyor.

Kent moved and Weber seconded that the matter of making a County map be laid on the table.

Kern, Chairman of the Special Committee to investigate and readjust salaries in Prosecuting Attorney's office and disposition of the office of Friend of the Court made the following report:

The Committee appointed to investigate and recommend changes in the Prosecuting Attorney's office, Friend of the Court, and the Attorney for the Drain Commissioner, respectfully suggest and recommend the following changes:

1. That the salary to be paid the Prosecuting Attorney be considered by a Committee appointed by the Board of Supervisors not later than April, 1930.

- 2. That the minimum salary to be paid the first Assistant Prosecuting Attorney to be Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) per year. That the maximum salary to be paid the first Assistant Prosecuting Attorney be Four Thousand Dollars, (\$4000.) per year.
- 3. That a Friend of the Court be employed, and we especially recommend some capable woman, at a salary of One Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$1500.) per year, and such travelling expenses that may be incurred in the performance of duties that may take the Friend of the Court outside of the County of Macomb.
- 4. That suitable office space with furniture such as desk, typewriter, files, chairs and the necessary forms be provided, by the County.
- 5. That all the foregoing be required to give their full time to the position and not be permitted to carry on private business.
- 6. That the Prosecuting Attorney also act as Attorney for the Board of Supervisors and as Attorney for the Drain Commissioner without extra compensation.
- 7. That as soon as the Prosecuting Attorney recommends a necessity for same, a third Assistant Prosecuting, on a part time basis, be employed on the south end of Macomb County to handle miscellaneous matters to prevent the same from taking up the time of the Prosecuting Attorney at such salary as the Prosecuting Attorney may recommend.
- 8. That the Prosecuting Attorney be authorized to retain special Council on such drains where special council in now being employed, until such time as said drains are completed.
- 9. That the Prosecuting Attorney may upon the recommendation of the Drain Committee and the County Drain Commissioner appoint a special assistant to the Prosecuting Attorney to be assigned to drain work only, at a salary not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars, (\$3000.00) per year. If said salary be paid out of the General Fund of the County, the County Drain Commissioner be instructed that when the services of this Special Prosecutor are required on a Drain, the County Drain Commissioner will charge such drainage district for such services. The money, so collected, shall be placed in the General Fund of the County to reimburse said General Fund for money so advanced.

That the Friend of the Court's department be organized as a separate department to have the following specific powers and duties:

- 1. To have charge of receiving and disbursing alimony, temporary and permanent, paid by order of the Circuit Court.
- 2. To enforce support orders and bonds given in connection therewith in cases involving children born out of wedlock.
- 3. To enforce all delinquent payments of alimony duly ordered and decreed by the Circuit Court; and to prosecute defendants in said Court for any non-payment thereof.
- 4. To ascertain in the case of dependent minor children of divorced parents whether the money decreed them by the Court is being properly applied for their support, maintenance, and education; and whether said children are being properly cared for by their custodian.
- 5. To represent wives of minor children of divorced parents in matters affecting the welfare of said children.

The following is the amended Recommendations and Plan of operation of War Board and Committee report.

SKETCH OF THE HISTORY OF THE PATRIOTIC FUND

In october 1918 The Macomb County War Board organized the campaign for the Macomb County Contribution to the Welfard Work among the soldiers. This was for the seven welfare organizations, the Young Men's Christian Association, The Young Women's Christian Association, The War Camp Community Service, The Knights of Columbus, The Jewish Welfare Relief, The American Library Association and the Salvation Army. This Campaign, under the direction of Mr. John S. Paganetti was to raise \$45,000.00 which was afterward increased to take care of other similar calls for relief. When the War was over and the calls on the Fund had ceased, there was left in the hands of the War Board about Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars. This fund under skillful and capable management has grown to some \$17,000.00. At various times during all these years, efforts have been made to secure possession of this Fund but the Macomb County War Board have guarded it closely. They have not seen at any time in any of the proposed uses of the Fund a reasonable or definite plan carrying out the basic idea of the Fund that above all this Fund was to be used for the benefit of all Some of the plans suggested were for the those taking part in the Great War. benefit of the veteran but in no case was the plan broad enough to induce the War Board to use this money and so it has accumulated in their hands. What the final disposition of it might be has been a matter of considerable interest to those in Macomb County who helped raise this Fund and who have watched its growth. As the years pass this Fund will continue to grow and it might eventually get into new hands and be used up in some other way than that for which it was raised.

Some time ago a committee consisting of Lee Bedell, Frank J. Hirt, Paul J. Ullrich, Fred J. Cromie and Henry O. Chapoton was appointed by the Macomb County Bankers Club to consider the situation of the Fund and to see what possible use might be made of it. This committee has had many meetings and has been working with a committee of the American Legion Post of Mount Clemens, consisting of Clifford A. John, R. I. Winslow, Dr. H. G. Berry and Mary Wilkinson. In considering the various ways in which this Fund might be used to help the veteran (by this is meant all enlisted men and women) the matter of helping him when he is sick comes naturally to the front. In sickness serious enough to require a visit to a hospital, there are several matters to be considered; the doctor's bill, the cost of medicine, the loss of time and hospital bill. This hospital bill is the one which is expected to be paid immediately. So a real help to the veteran would be an arrangement by which all of the hospital expenses or at least a considerable part thereof could be paid.

After lengthly and careful consideration over a period of some three years the joint committee of the Bankers Club and the American Legion recommended to the Macomb County War Board a Hospitalization Plan. This the Macomb County War Board took up at a meeting held August 19th, 1929 and after some changes in detail, adopted it by an unanimous vote and authorized the Bankers-American Legion Committee to present the Plan to the Board of Supervisors of Macomb County.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- I. We desire that this Patriotic Fund be turned into a Hospitalization Fund.
- 2. That the income therefrom be devoted to the payment of the hospital expenses of any member of the former duly enlisted personnel of the United States Army, Navy, Marine or Nurse corps, hereinafter called veterans who participated in the World War, chronic cases excepted.
- 3. That the amount of the benefit to be given to any person shall be limited to one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) in any one year.
- 4. That to be eligible for a benefit under this Fund the veteran shall have lived in Macomb County for at least a year immediately proceeding his going to the hospital.
- 5. That the veteral shall have the privilege of going to any hospital he wishes, whether inside or outside of Macomb County.
- 6. That the financial status of the veteran is not be considered in connection with this grant of the benefit.
 - 7. That this plan shall be effective January 1, 1930.
- 8. That a Board of five composed of ex-service men, two of whom shall be regular licensed physicians if available, shall be appointed by the American Legion to act with the legislative committee of the Board of Supervisors in a consulting and advisory capacity in determining the need of the hospitalization and the eligibility of the claimant as above set forth.

PLAN FOR OPERATION

We direct that this Fund be tendered immediately to Macomb County upon the acceptance of these conditions by the Board of Supervisors:

- A. That a part of the Fund shall be spend in suitable and permanent memorial tablets or plaques in a prominent place in the new County Building containing the names of all those from Macomb County, who served in the Great War.
- B. That a part of the Fund shall be used in the furnishing, equipping and maintaining of a room or rooms in the new County Building to be known as the Veterans' Rooms, or by some other similar title.
- C. That these rooms shall be furnished for the free use of all Veterans Organizations, where they may maintain books, files and headquarters.
- D. That the rooms may be used for public meetings at such times as they are not in use by Veterans Organizations.
- E. That the County shall assume on its part, the annual budgeting of a hospitalization fund amounting to 6% upon the principal of the Patriotic Fund turned over to it. This amount is to be administered by the County Officials for hospitalization substantially as outlined in Recommendations one to eight above, and in consideration of the donation of this Fund, this annual appropriation shall be continued by the County from year to year, as long as there shall be any need for it.

Mr. Rosso's remarks were much appreciated by the Committee who have been appointed to investigate this proposition, inviting Mr. Rosso to accompany them on their investigation visit to Oakland County.

To the Honorable Chairman and Board of Supervisors.

Gentlemen:

We have gone into the matter of raising the money by one quarter mill tax, when passed by two-thirds vote of the Board of Supervisors. There is no doubt that this is the time to start a County Air Port, but the tax at this time is far beyond the average tax rate in the state. In some parts of the County, people are on the verge of losing their property, and in many cases have lost their property.

If this money could be raised in some other way, besides a tax on a man's home, it would be going a long way in the right direction. If the Board of Supervisors believe that a County Airport is necessary at this time, then it should be submitted to a vote of the people.

We also believe that there is available property suitable for an airport, that could be leased for the next two or three years very reasonably. We would dare say for the taxes of this property. By that time the mill tax for the county would be paid, and it would be much easier to raise money at that time for an airport.

- "1. Must all special taxes (road, drain, etc.,) be spread on the original tax roll by the assession officer.
- 2. In settling with the County Treasurer, must all Townships in the County settle in full.
- 3. If a Township Treasurer wants to settle in full, must the County Treasurer accept settlement in full even though other Townships do not settle in the same way."

The annual report of the Drain Commissioner was presented in printed form to each Supervisor for his own perusal.

Heins moved and Brewer seconded that report be received and filed. Motion carried.

A letter dated October 15, 1929, from the Drain Commissioner addressed to the County Treasurer, Clerk and Accountant was read. The Road Committee made the following report on vacating road plant No. 4, for industrial site.

County Board of Supervisors Macomb Count, Michigan

Gentlemen:

We, the ROAD COMMITTEE, have investigated the proposition as submitted by the Industrial Committee of the Mount Clemens Board of Commerce.

Our investigation shows that Macomb County will receive an industry which will represent an investment of approximately One Million Dollars, which is a matter of cold business.

The amount received out of taxes, in a few years, will greatly exceed the investment of the County on the site which they request.

Further, however, and perhaps of greater importance, is the matter of employment offered to our laboring people of the County, who at the present time, find it necessary to go out of the County for a livelihood.

Further, we find that the City of Mount Clemens, in its Industrial Program is further prepared to make available fifteen (15) acres of land adjoining the County property (valued at approximately \$45,000.00) in addition to making a five-year rebate on City taxes and water (approximately \$25,000.00)

We also find that by acquiring this industry, it will be a duplication of the present Mount Clemens Pottery Company, which now employs seven hundred people (700) four hundred (400) of whom come from the County, with an annual payroll of Eight Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$800,000.00), as well as acquiring the Louis Stetson China Company now located in Chicago, which will employ, in addition to the manufacturing unit mentioned above, from one hundred fifty to two hundred people.

These activities, in our opinion, in addition to placing upon our tax roll an investment representing more than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) in these two manufacturing units, will create more home-building, and other lines of building activities, throughout the entire area.

Your ROAD COMMITTEE of the Board of Supervisors suggests that the County make available the property now owned by the County, adjoining the Mount Clemens Pottery Company, on condition that these operations be completed in twelve (12) months time, or which include buildings of approximately 50,000 square feet.

We suggest that a trust deed could be issued pending the fulfillment of the above mentioned conditions, and that further, two acres of land, reasonably located for the purposes for which it is needed, be made available, without cost, to the County to care for future housing needs of the County Road Commission.

Also if such a deal is consumated, the county is to have the use of the present building for at least one year.

The Mount Clemens Board of Commerce assures us that it will be glad to

confer with the Board of Supervisors, to explain anything further on this matter.

The Leader Press Company's bill, amount \$6,566.30 under date of June 1, 1929 for the printing of the canvass of the election November 6, 1928 was presented to the Board by Chairman Streit who had been called in the conference by the Auditing Committee before whom this bill had been discussed for several months as to 0 K'ing the same for payment or not. Mr. Streit went into a lengthy history of this account and explained that it was a hard matter for the committee to arrive at a decision as to whether the 10% reduction offer made by Mr. Price at a recent meeting of the committee be accepted in final settlement. After further discussion as to who might be responsible for the incurring of such great amount, Mr. Schoenfeldt moved and Brewer seconded that the Clerk notify the Leader Press Company, that an offer of \$4500.00 be made, in full settlement, of the claim of \$6566.30; also to inform the printing company that it was the sense of the Board that this would be the last offer of settlement. Motion carried.

The Committee, to whom was referred the investigation of plan used in Oakland County for employing the unemployed and short-time prisoners at the jail, made the following report:

"Your Committee appointed for the purpose of investigating the system in operation in Oakland County, with reference to employment of County prisoners and citizens applying for county relief, wishes to report as follows:

On Friday, October 11, 1929, the committee went to Pontiac and inspected the cement block plant dormitory central storage plant operated by Oakland County in that City. The committee was shown every consideration by the Officials in charge, and we found a modern plant wherein cement blocks were manufactured by county prisoners and worthy residents of the county who were unable to procure employment otherwise. The plant has been in operation since March 1, 1929, and is managed and is under the supervision of the County Auditors. It is run in a businesslike and efficient manner, and since the beginning has shown a profit.

As part of the plant and a unit thereof, is the purchasing department through which the purchase of all supplies for the county and the poor is made at wholesale prices, and distributed to various parts of the county as the needs require. Volume purchases permit an advantageous price and a store room is used to keep the supplies until they are required for use. This entire plant has been built under the supervision of the Board of Supervisors by the unemployed and prison labor. These buildings by reason of the employment of prisoners, will not cost to exceed 30%, or a saving of nearly 25% on the total cost. The building now in operation cost \$175,000.00. This figure includes

deep wells, steam equipment, refrigeration, etc. About 60 prisoners are housed at the dormitory. These men are short time prisoners transferred from the County jail, and are employed at the cement block plant, the informary, contagious hospital, the tuberculosis sanitarium and in other outdoor work.

The inspection and investigation by the committee convinces us more than ever that there is need for such an institution in Macomb County, and that it can be maintained and operated with profit to the county. There are many details which are yet to be worked out, and we would recommend that the committee be continued, and that further investigation and a complete report be made at the next session of the Board.

Warner, Drain Engineer, addressed to Mr. Bert Englebrecht, Drain Commissioner, was read in which the communication stated it was necessary that some repairs be made to Spruce Street drain in order to avoid probable damage cases against the County. This particular drain is considerable over-drawn in its funds, but it was imperative that some repairs be made.

Hagen moved and Beier seconded that the report be received and the Drain Department authorized to make repairs not to exceed \$150.00.

Essig, Chairman of the Printing Committee, stated that there was nothing to be reported at this time and asked that his report be received at a later meeting. Supervisor Lingemann reported that many complaints had come to him about a County employee of the Drain Department using a County car after hours and presumably for personal business. It was explained by Supervisor Lingemann that this particular employee working in the Right-of-Way Department was compelled frequently to make calls in the evening and night time in order to see the people to secure their signatures to petitions and that the use of the car was a legitimate one, but in order to avoid further criticism, he suggested that the salary of the Right-of-Way man be increased to \$8.00 per day and employee to use his own car. Inasmuch, as a Budget Committee had been recently appointed to investigate and report on all employee's salaries, the Chairman suggested that no action be taken and report referred to the Budget Committee.

No further business coming before the Board, Kent moved and Hein seconded that adjournment be taken until December 10th, at 10:00 o'clock, 1929. Motion carried.
