The time arrived for the opening of bids for the purchase of \$315,000.00 Refunding Bonds. The Controller reported that no bids had been received.

Affidavit of Advertising the sale of the bonds was submitted by the Controller.

A Resolution for the distribution of the money received from the sale of the \$315,000.00 Refunding Bonds if purchased by the State, insisting the money be used for welfare, exclusively, and not including any salaries, was read. Governor Brucker insisting that this Resolution be adopted by the Board before the State Administrative Board would interest itself in the purchas of the Bonds. 1

Hatzenbuhler under date of December 31, 1931, for cost of ventilators \$326.00 and extra labor of \$209.36, in connection with the installation and completion of this part of the Hatzenbuhler contract which is very necessary and essential to allowing the roofing contractor to complete his work at this time.

F. J. Hatzenbuhler also presented a proposition under date of January 2nd, 1932, for heating of the building during the winter months at a cost of \$2,543.45.

Evans moved and Ullrich seconded that the proposition of Hatzenbuhler for the installation of ventilators, permitting the roofing contractor to complete his work and that Hatzenbuhler proceed with the work and render a bill for the extra work, not to exceed \$209.36. Motion carried. (see marginal correction)

Pingel moved and Sherbeck seconded that the item of caulking, cost \$285.00 according to sub-contractor, be eliminated at this time. Motion carried.

Kent moved and Heins seconded that the form of agreement to be entered into with sub-contractors be accepted and the Chairman of the Board and Clerk be authorized to sign agreements with sub-contractors for the roofing and pointing up of the stone work. Motion carried.

A communication from the Gray Electric Company, under date of December 29, 1931, terminating their contract on the Macomb County Building was read.

Henderson moved and Dr. Heine seconded that the communication be received and filed. Motion carried.

Pingel moved and Sherbeck seconded that the proposal of Hatzenbuhler under date of January 2nd for heating of the Building at a cost of \$2,543.45/be received and filed and the Building Committee make further investigation and have power to act in providing temporary heating to protect the building at a much lower expense./ Motion carried. (see marginal correction)

The Chairman added Supervisor Matthews to serve on the Building Committee.

Dr. Heine, Chairman of the Contagious Committee, recommended that medical contracts incorporating the care of infectious and contagious diseases; the cost of such care being charged back to the General Fund of the County by the doctors.

Nunneley moved and Sherbeck seconded that the recommendation of the Contagious Committee be concurred in and power be given the Superintendents of the Poor to contract for the expense of caring for infectious and contagious diseases. Motion carried.



Messrs. Capt. LaCroix, Don D. Williams and Robert J. Folsom representing the newly appointed Soldiers Relief Commission, by Probate Judge, Chas. H. Hummrich, were present and informed the Board of their intention to co-operate in the relief of indigent veterans of the various organizations the Commission represented and asked what appropriation had been made for this Commission at the annual fall meeting. They were informed that One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars had been appropriated. It was the intent of the representatives that an appropriation of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars should have been made and that they would proceed with their activity and make further report and request at the next meeting of the Board.

REPORT OF THE LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

Re: F. O. Petitions on Taxation.

#### TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

The Legislative Committee to whom the Farmer Organization Petitions on Taxation were referred, at the December 10th meeting of the Board of Supervisors, have met and report as follows:

After a careful perusal of the questions contained in the petitions and the division of support to the answers, we are of the opinion that any recommendation or endorsement by the Board of Supervisors should be made on an unanimous support by the Farmer Organizations.

There is much merit in the idea of the organization for some plan and performance, to accomplish a reduction in property tax and should have the assistance and support of the Board of Supervisors.

Since the submission of the petitions, known as the Gassel Plan, the Committee is informed that the Michigan Farmer is circulating petitions for signers, in every Township in all Counties of the State for submission of a referendum vote, amending ARTICLE X of the State Constitution to accomplish the aim of the Macomb County Farmer Organization and the local organizations are accepting and supporting the latter plan.

The Committee recommends the support of the Board of Supervisors to any movement that will equitably reduce property tax for Farm and Home Owners.

Development of Manufacturing Industry has made many changes in the mode of living and the Laws that governed years ago, or at the commencement, are now antiquated, we believe. At the beginning we were a State of agricultural people, producing practically all the wealth from the ground and property bore the tax. Now we have industry producing about 80 per cent of the wealth and property still bearing practically all the tax.

Some change must be made to have industry take its proportionate share of tax and relieve Farm and Home; but any advocacy of refusing to pay taxes is not contributing to good government. The needs of today are for a system of taxation that will be upbuilding. Axioms quoted years ago are applicable for present day tax problems for "He who goes borrowing goes a sorrowing" and "It is hard for an empty bag to stand upright."

January 11, 1932

Macomb County Building Committee c/o Mr. Isaac A. Hartung, Clerk Mount Clemens, Michigan

Gentlemen:

In order to clear the record and to settle any dispute or controversy that there may be respecting the purpose and intent of our letter dated January 9 in error, intended to be January 2, at the time of delivery to your Board, in which the following language was used:

> "In connection with your proposal, it is further understood that this will be a separate and distinct contract and have no connection whatsoever with our original contract, which, under this date, I am advising is cancelled, effective, January 9th, 1932, and the amount set forth above for this work is to be paid for by you upon the completion of this separate contract."

I wish to state as follows: The above quoted language appeared in a letter submitting a proposal for temporary beat, and it was our intention at that time to advise you of the cancellation of the principal contract, to become effective on the 9th of January, and another letter calling attention to the provision of the contract permitting us to cancel because of serious losses sustained by me because of default in payment of estimates, being contrary to article 23 in general specifications, was prepared by us but not mailed. We thereafter concluded that we would not mail the letter of cancellation of the contract, as stated in the quoted language above, we concluded thereafter no to do so and that is our position now. Your committee has further evidence of the true construction of our letter by our having signed the agreement for work in connection with the roofing, which expressly contains the statement that our original contract has not been cancelled.

Agreement F. J. Hatzenbuhler

The Clerk read a form of Resolution/prepared by the Prosecuting Attorney covering certain work that was necessary for the completion of the roof on the County Building.

The Finance Committee presented a report covering its actions from September 8th, 1931, to January 11th, 1932, and made the following recommendations.

We recommend that when a supervisor is attending a meeting of the Board of Supervisors or a Committee meeting of the Board, on the same day when such supervisor is called to testify in the Probate Court, for which he receives a fee, that the supervisor eliminate from his claim to the County, one of the amounts (\$5.00) from his claim. In other words the supervisors are to receive pay for only one service rendered to the County for that day.

Further, that no fee be paid to any County employee receiving a salary, for any services performed, for the County, in addition to their regular salary, except that such reasonable expenses may be allowed that have been incurred in connection with the performance of some special service for the county; that the Finance Committee shall determine such reasonable expense to be allowed when the claim is presented for consideration.

Further, that attorneys appointed by a Circuit Judge to defend persons charged with a criminal offense and being tried in the Circuit Court shall receive the following fees for their services:

\$12.50 for each one-half day's service in court during trial

\$25.00 for each full day's service in court

\$25.00 for all services in preparation of the case

That in no case shall the cost of such service exceed \$75.00 in any one case.

Further that when the Judge of Probate authorizes the Sheriff or other County employee, who is receiving a salary, to transport a patient or patients to a State Institution, that no additional fee be allowed for such services, except the following:

Ten cents per mile traveled for use of automobile

Reasonable and necessary expenses incurred

Jan. 11th, 1932

When an insane or other person is transported to a State Institution and the services of an extra person is absolutely necessary, the fee to be allowed for the extra person shall be \$4.00, including his or her expenses.

We do recommend that this report be accepted and recommendations adopted.





The following letter from Geo. J. Haas, under date of March 8th, was read:

Mar. 8, 1932

Macomb County Board of Supervisors Mt. Clemens, Michigan

Att: I. A. Hartung, County Clerk

Gentlemen:

I am writing this letter as an urgent appeal for money due me for Architectural work on the Macomb County Building. As you know, it has been many months now since I have had any money whatsoever on this job, and quite certain that you know I have not taken the attitute that some of the people on the job have taken, such as canceling contract and etc.

I have co-operated in every way in checking up on the job, making trips to the job and to many meetings, all of which I have been spending my own money for, also have spent the money in the office to keep the job up to date. All my shop drawings and full size details were finished a couple months previous to all the contractors, so that work could be installed at the specified time. At the time the question of spending money for roofing, pointing, and caulking and general protection of the building came up, I made no objection to those contractors bills being paid first, even though I had at that time, considerable amount of money coming to me.

The point has been raised that my bill be placed in the same classification as that of the contractors. I am satisfied that you realize that attitude is not a fair one, as my bill is for professional services and not a building contract obligation, and further than that, my contract was signed and dated Jan. 17, 1929, a year in advance of all other contracts, that alone proves that my bill should not be classed with the others, and that it should be paid before the others. Also, the preliminary work on the job was done several years in advance of that date, In reading this contract over you will see that money held back from the contractors is to be no reason for holding back money from the Architect. Surely there is no legitimate reason for hesitating to pay this bill, which deserves priority on other bills on this job, when there is plenty of money in the building fund, to take care of it, and I am positive your County Prosecutor whould have no objection to paying it.

My bill for \$7074.76 has been on file since Jan. 3rd, 1932, of which I am satisfied that you retain \$1000.00 for uncompleted Supervision, when the job goes ahead, this amount is surely sufficient to cover the two or three months Supervision which will be needed, thus leaving a balance of \$6064.76.

If you cannot see your way clear at this time to pay the entire amount

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which is certainly due, won't you please favor me with at least \$4000.00 of the amount. I am very badly in need of money, and would have probably been able to get over this bad period if I had not already invested my own cash in the job, but that expense, together with a death in the family and other unforseen expenses, makes it necessary for me to appeal to you in this manner. It is extreme urgency that causes me to write you a letter of this type at this time.

I thank you in advance for your full consideration of this matter.

A delegation of about twenty-five members of the Macomb County Taxpayers Association appeared before the Board. Mr. Charles E. Doll, Sr., acting as spokesman. 
Drain Commissioner Eckstein, addressed the Board on the recent decision of the Supreme Court affecting the Nine-Mile Halfway Drain and Disposal Plant. A serious condition was arising because of the abandonment of the Disposal Plant; that a great amount of money had been invested in this plant and now had been ordered closed. He had consulted the State Health Department without receiving any constructive advice as to what to do. He felt that it might be wise to secure additional counsel to help solve the situation which was a bad one. Drain Commissioner Eckstein, informed the Board that there was, approximately, \$21,000.00 in the particular fund for Running the plant and about \$5,300.00 of outstanding bills, but the order of the Supreme Court, regardless of health conditions or otherwise was to close the plant.

us in the position that we are directly responsible (without qualification) with the fates, fortunes and the very existence of the taxpayers and business enterprises of Macomb County. This grave responsibility is ours, we dare not falter.

At the very outset, I wish you to know that the Chairmanship of this body was not of my own choosing, however, I have accepted the Honor, full well knowing the position in which I am placed and the incumbent duties I must perform.

"Simple duty hath no place for fear," neither do I fear the consequences of the following recommendations I now make to you, they are an expression of my sincerest hopes that, if followed, they will go a long way in relieving the present distressing situations growing out of the economic depression so prevalent in this section of our great Commonwealth.

#### CONTROLLER'S OFFICE

1. First consideration in this distressing time should be for strict economy and efficiency of administration. I here recommend a drastic change in the accounting system of the County. These two fundamentals to be accomplished by abolishing the office of Controller, and the transfer of the duties of that office under the direct supervision of the County Clerk with full power to direct the bookeeping system as the County's needs demands, a saving amounting to thousands of Dollars will result therefrom.

#### COUNTY ROAD COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE

2. Further continuing a policy of economy, retrenchment and efficiency this body should, in accordance with the Statutes of this State as made and provided, reorganize the Board of County Road Commissioners. As soon as possible under the existing statues the terms of the members of said Board of County Road Commissioners should be made appointive instead of elective. Further economy may be accomplished by reducing the membership of said Board from three to one. Following a plan successful in other counties would be to designate a Board consisting of one member appointed by a majority vote of the Supervisors of Macomb County with a salary commensurate with such duties, and two Supervisors to serve without pay as an advisory committee to such County Road Commissioner. The details as to the length of the terms and the salary of the one Road Commissioner to be worked out and finally decided upon after a public hearing of the representative taxpayers of Macomb County.

#### COUNTY DRAIN COMMISSIONER

3. Due to the construction of the Nine Mile and Martin Drains, the good faith and Credit of Macomb County is at stake. May I not at this point recommend to the Legislative Committee of this Board that they draft a bill to present to the next session of the Legislature, abolishing the office of Drain Commissioner and the transferring of the duties of said office to that of the Road Commissioner, who in turn will have the services of the County Road Engineer, one familiar with the County's road and sanitation projects, thus eliminating duplication in plans and estimates needed in the system of Macomb County's Roads, Sewers and Drains. This consolidation of Departments would result in a tremendous saving to the taxpayers.

4. It is with reluctance that one approaches this next project for consideration. While hundreds upon hundreds of our fellow taxpayers have lost, or stand to lose, their homes, Macomb County stands to lose its home, "The County Building." The paramount issue now, is not "should we have started this structure?" But! "having started it, we must carry on." To the Building Committee of this Honorable Board it is strongly urged that they endeavor to interest some construction firm to finish at least three or four floors, sufficient to house our County offices. From a patriotic standpoint private capital might be obtained to finance same on a basis the same as rentals are now being paid.

#### CONCLUSION

May I not in closing suggest that this Board meet with the heads of each and every County office, and without fear and compunction urge, if needs be insist, upon a program of most rigid economy. Such a straight forward attitude cannot fail to produce results. We stand as servants of a people destitute. We must not fail. With the co-operation of every County official and their subordinates, Macomb County cannot fail.

Referring to Paragraph Two of your letter, in my opinion the items therein specified claimed by Mr. Haas in the amounts of \$395.46 and \$100.00 should not be paid for the reason that they are based upon items claimed to be due the contractors, which in my opinion are not due them. Article Twelve of the Architect's Contract provides for arbitration of disputed items between the architect and the county, which method of determining the validity of these claims is open to both parties.

Referring to Paragraph Four of your letter, in my opinion no payment should be made to contractors until a final determination of the total amounts due the contractors has been arrived at, either by an agreement between the contractors and the Board of Supervisors, or by proper court action.

Replying to your letter of March 16, please be advised as follows:

Referring to Paragraph Two of your letter, please be advised that in my opinion no payment should be made to contractors or subcontractors until the total amounts due these sub-contractors and contractors is arrived at either by agreement between the contractors and the Board of Supervisors, or by proper court action.

Regarding the architect's claim which is referred to in the same Paragraph, please be advised that in my opinion payments to the architect should be limited to \$2132.88, for the reason that in addition to the items of \$395.46 and \$100.00 referred to in my other letter of even date, there is an item in the architect's bill of \$3446.42, covering the following items: "To professional services for architect's plans and specifications on the difference between the \$700,000.00 estimate cost and \$604,266.00, which is \$95,734.00. Sixty percent of six per cent of \$95,734.00." This item is open to arbitration under Article Twelve of the Contract between the architect and the County, if either side wishes to take advantage of it. By deducting from the amount claimed by the architect to be due, namely, \$6074.76, the items of \$3446.42 and \$395.46 and \$100.00, the figure mentioned of \$2132.88 is arrived at.

In the event that the architect has been paid any moneys on his claim for services covering the difference between the \$700,000.00 estimate and the contract price, these moneys should be deducted from from the \$2132.88 until a final determination either through arbitration or court action of the amount due the architect is arrived at.

Referring to the last two Paragraphs in your letter of March 16, please be advised that I find nothing in the statutes that make the architect's claim a prior one.

The Clerk read a letter from the Controller under date of March 31st and minutes of the Finance Committee of March 18th, 19th, which referred to claim of Bert Engelbrecht as County Drain Commissioner. Dr. Heine moved and Ullrich seconded that the report be received and filed. Motion carried.

Pingel moved and Dr. Heine seconded that the Treasurer and Controller prepare a report, immediately, proportioning the tax collections to date and estimated tax collections to the various budgets as set up for 1932. A copy of the same to be furnished each Supervisor. Motion carried.

The following letter from the Controller, under date of April 12th, was read:

April 12, 1932

Mr. Isaac A. Hartung County Clerk Mt. Clemens, Michigan

Dear Mr. Hartung:

Pursuant to the request of the Finance Committee, I make the following report in connection with the contagious disease account.

The Budget Committee, in preparing the appropriations for the various departments and accounts, provided \$2,000.00 for the contagious disease account for the year 1932. From past years' expenditures out of this fund it appeared that \$2,000.00 would be sufficient to carry on this work for the year 1932.

Since it has been determined by the Prosecuting Attorney for the Poor Department there are many claims previously paid by the Poor Commission out of the poor fund that come under the classification of a contagious disease, and the Poor Commission insist that claims coming under the heading of a contagious disease, even though they were previously allowed by the Poor Commission, should be paid out of the contagious disease account of the general fund.

You will notice in my report of Cash Disbursements and Bills Payable for Quarter Ending March 31, 1932, that against the budget of \$2,000.00, claims amounting to \$1,888.30 have been paid. There are bills payable amounting to \$532.69 which are payable out of this fund, but to date I have not issued checks for this amount. If this amount is paid the total expenditure will amount to \$2,420.99 which will result in an overdraft of \$420.99 as of March 1, 1932.

When the appropriation for the Poor Department was made for the year 1932, the items previously paid out of the poor fund, even though they are now determined as contagious disease items, the supervisors took into consideration such expenditures when they provided \$200,000.00 for the year, but since the items are not to be paid out of the poor fund, some provision should be made to pay all the contagious disease items from the general fund. This can be done by transferring a certain amount from the Poor Department appropriation of \$200,000.00 to the contagious disease account of the general fund to meet these claims, but if the supervisors determine some other plan to provide funds for the contagious disease account to meet the 1932 expenditures, we will carry out their wishes. 29

A letter from the Controller, under date of April 11th, asking the Board of Supervisors to consider and dispose of a claim of \$155.00 of Clifford A. John, in Drain Case, Henkel Bros., vs., The County Drain Commissioner, for services rendered in 193%, was read.

Matthews moved and Messmore seconded that the claim of Clifford A. John, amount \$155.00, be allowed and ordered paid, since the opinion of the Prosecuting Attorney, under date of April 8th, was a regular one and should be paid out of the General Fund, in cash. Motion carried.

Mr. Leo Jean addressed the Board, verbally presenting a claim for eighteen (18) days pay. He also presented the following letter and affidavit:

#### Gentlemen:

This is a matter concerning the welfare Dept of the County of Macomb. A Mrs. Halon living on Donald St., East Detroit, was attended by Mr. Grimes also of East Detroit, for confinement. After the confinement Dr. Grimes told Mr. Halon that as he was on the welfare list, it could not be included and therefore the Dr. should receive other remuneration. Mr. Halon signed a promissory note in favor of Dr. Grimes in the sum of \$35.00. A Supervisor of East Detroit noticed the account and inquired of Mr. Schelling the welfare agent in that section, if Mr. Halon was on the welfare list and was told that he was not. The records show that Mr. Halon was a welfare charge since Sept., 1931. The entire matter was referred to Mr. Hanley who also inquired as to the truth about Mr. Halon and he also was informed that Mr. Halon was not a welfare charge. Mr. Hanley then made his own investigation and found Mr. Hanlon and family on the records. Mr. Hanley then asked Mr. Benz of the Welfare Dept., to have the note filed in Mt. Clemens office, which was done.

The records will show that Dr. Grimes is paid \$2,500.00 per year for his services to the indigents of his section, and is not supposed to receive any other remuneration. In the event of monies or notes being given for aid, they are supposed to be made out in the name of the County and in the name of the proper officers and filed in the office of same.

An affidavit on file that can be produced when requested for, will show just what Mr. Halon action has been, and at no time has he ever denied that he was a welfare charge. The only denial has come from Mr. Schelling.

A meeting of the finance comm, welfare comm, and the Poor commission was held about Apr. 1st and the Poor Comm, were instructed to cancel Dr. Grimes contract on or before April 4th. This has not been done to date, to my knowledge.

The action of Dr. Grimes, Mr. Schelling and other officials connected with this deal is either a high-handed gesture or an ignorant one. The entire affair has all the earmarks now of being whitewashed to save somebody's skin, and for this reason should receive a thorough investigation.

As one taxpayer of this County, I would ask this honorable Board for the dismissal of the entire Board of County Poor Commissioners.

I am sure that there are other men as well able to carry on this work, in an honest and fair manner. It is now time for some care to be taken of the taxpayers money and especially in the welfare dept.

Deponent further says that Mr. George Simmons returned to the office and instructed said deponent to call on Dr. Grimes in the office located at the Kaiser Buklding in East Detroit to sign a note. Dr. Grimes prepared the note in the sum of \$35.00 (Thirty-five Dollars) and requested said deponent to sign same. Deponent further says that Dr. Grimes gave him a paper to deliver to Mr. Schelling and informed said deponent that Mr. Schelling would explain the reason for requesting him to sign a note for services rendered. When said deponent appeared before Mr. Schelling and stated that he was unable to pay for this service because of other obligations, Mr. Schelling informed said deponent that he would fix this matter up so that he would not have to pay

Immediately upon having his attention called to the error Dr. Grimes surrendered the notes to the Superintendents of the Poor and has discontinued the above practice.

Your committee has carefully investigated the charges made and in the absence of conclusive proof of any irregularities recommend to the Board that no further action be taken at this time.

The Clerk read two letters from the Prosecuting Attorney, under date of April 16th, pertaining to Nine Mile Halfway Drain Supreme Court litigation, as follows:

April 16th, 1932

Macomb County Board of Supervisors Mount Clemens, Michigan

Dear Sirs:

adopted.

Since by resolution passed by the Board of Supervisors of this County this office has been delegated as counsel for the Drain Office, our position in that capacity is that we are working for the interests of the taxpayers at large under the supervision of your Board. Therefore, inasmuch as the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain case affects the pocketbooks of the taxpayers at large in the County to the extent of hundreds of thousands of dollars, and inasmuch as your Board of Supervisors are the direct representatives of the taxpayers at large in this County, we are now asking your Board to pass a resolution instructing this office whether or not to proceed with a re-hearing in the Supreme Court of the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain case.

In order that you will be in a position to consider the matter we herewith briefly and in substance outline to you the situation as it is today.

The Plaintiffs are comprised of approximately seventyfive taxpayers in the assessment district affected by the drain and Lake Township, a municipality through which the drain runs. The Defendants are the Drain Commissioner, County Treasurer and the City of East Detroit, Township of Warren, Township of Erin and Village of Centerline. This office represents the Drain Commissioner and the County Treasurer. The other Defendants are represented by Mr. Charles Retzlaff for the City of East Detroit, Mr. Clifford John for the Township of Warren, and Mr. Bert V. Nunneley for the Township of Erin.

The Plaintiffs, in their bill of complaint, ask for the following relief, among other things, and it is this relief with which we are chiefly concerned, namely:

(1) And it is further ordered, adjudged and decreed that the defendants the drain commissioner of Macomb County, Michigan, and his successors in office, treasurer of Macomb County, Michigan, and his successors in office, are hereby perpetually restrained and enjoined from using or applying any of the funds raised by assessments against plaintiffs or against the lands and property of plaintiffs, toward the maintenance of said disposal plant, filtration beds or mechanical devices to purify the flow of said drain.

(2) It is further ordered, adjudged and decreed that the defendant treasurer of the County of Macomb and State of Michigan, and his successors in office, as such county treasurer, refund to plaintiffs, their assigns and grantees, any and all of the drain assessments above referred to, which are shown to have been paid by the records of said treasurer of said County of Macomb, together with interest on all sums so paid at the legal rate of interest from the date of payment

(3) And it is further ordered, adjudged and decreed that the defendants George P. Eckstein, drain commissioner of the County of Macomb of the State of Michigan, and his successors in office, and his and their agents and employees, the City of East Detroit, a municipal corporation, the Village of Center Line, a municipal corporation, the Township of Erin, and the Township of Warren, all in the County of Macomb and State of Michigan, and their respective agents and employees, be and are hereby perpetually enjoined and restrained from connecting any branch, lateral, or intersecting drains, branch drains, or sewers, with said Nihe Mile-Halfway Drain, and from increasing the overflow and inundation of the streets, highways, culverts and lands of plaintiffs.

It is these things that Plaintiffs have in their proposed decree which they have asked the Supreme Court to sign and which relief, under the opinion of the Supreme Court as it now stands, can be and may be granted by said Court. The purpose of our motion for re-hearing is to have the Court change its decree so that the relief above mentioned cannot be granted. 36

The granting of that relief to the Plaintiffs mean:

(1) That approximately sixteen thousand dollars left over in the disposal plant maintenance fund cannot be used to operate the disposal plant.

(2) That the taxpayers of the County at large would have to pay back to the taxpayers in the assessment district approximately the sum of \$1,200,000, which they have paid on assessments. The granting of this relief by the Supreme Court would necessitate the spreading upon the tax rolls by this Board of Supervisors as a County at large tax a sufficient amount to cover that reimbursement. In other words, it would be requiring the taxpayers of the County at large to pay approximately one-half of the cost of the construction of the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain.

(3) That no more drains or sewers could be connected with the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain.

In view of these facts and circumstances it is our desire to know what this Board of Supervisors, as representatives of the taxpayers at large, wish us to do in the matter. We have proceeded according to what to us was our obvious duty but we will gladly abide by the instructions of the Board.

The validity of the bonds on the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain are not in question as the bondholders are not a party to the action. The validity of the bonds will doubtless be tested by a suit brought by the bondholders after the present case is determined. Of course, it is our opinion that no momey should be paid by the County on the bonds until ordered to do so by the decree of the Court.

In our motion for re-hearing we have urged every possible reason we could for a re-hearing so that out of all the points urged the Supreme Court may find one upon which to grant us the relief we are seeking as set forth in this letter. We are not concerned over the other relief asked for by the Plaintiffs. If granted a re-hearing the only points that we are going to urge are those set forth in this letter.

Dear Sirs:

Another situation growing out of this Nine Mile-Halfway Drain suit is that many taxpayers in the assessment district of the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain and the Martin drain have not filed objections in the the Circuit Court to the decree ordering the sale of their land for nonpayment of the assessment, which is one of the taxes. Perhaps these taxpayers are not aware of the fact that, in order to protect themselves from the sale of their property for what the Supreme Court has already decided is an illegal tax in the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain case, and which feature of the decision will, in our opinion, not be disturbed in the re-hearing and may be similarly dealt with by the Supreme Court in the Martin case, they should file objections at this time in our Circuit Court.

These objections must be filed on or before April 25th and we urge upon this Board the necessity for giving widespread publicity to the above fact.

A representative from this office will confer with the Auditor General immediately to try to secure his consent to eliminate from the sale the properties affected, the owners of which are without representation. The results of our conference with the Auditor General will be available Tuesday on Mr. Nunneley's return from Lansing.

to First; As/the completion of the Building. Meetings have been held with the Architect, Engineer, contractors and Prosecuting Attorney and after a thorough discussion and personal inspection of the building the Committee concluded that, with the building so near completion on the original contracts, the most economical and practical action to take now would be to complete the whole building and to use only such floors as are necessary to house all County Offices. By rearranging the offices only part of the building is required and this would materially reduce running expenses under the present heavy rentals and reduce inconvenience to the public of having County offices in several buildings.

In October of last year a revised Financial and Progress Report for the completion of part of the building showed an expense of more than \$7,500.00 for interruption of the building program, for 1 day to 6 months. Six months

The Committee, therefore, recommends to the Board of Supervisors the completion of the entire building on the tabulation herewith given and as contained in a resolution for a special Bond election for \$200,000.00 (copy of resolution part of our report and attached.)

The Building Committee is convinced that a further delay will entail loss by deterioration that will exceed by thousands of dollars the amount now asked by contractors and if delay is continued litigation is sure to follow, the expense of which is undeterminable at this time.

#### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, after a thorough investigation of matters pertaining to the present status of the County Building; and

WHEREAS, after consultations with the architect, mechanical engineer and the various contractors whose bids were accepted on the County Building; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined after this investigation and these consultations by the Building Committee of this Board of Supervisors that the only practical and economical solution of the problems in relation to the County Building is to recommend to the Board of Supervisors the completion of the original contracts,; and

WHEREAS the contractors show a disposition to adhere closely to

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their original bids and a disposition not to make any unreasonable demands on the County at this time; and

WHEREAS, since the last special election for a bond issue to complete the contracts the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) asked for has been reduced to Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$290,000.00) by the payment of the mill tax and the delinquent mill tax; and

WHEREAS it appears that there is no other way the County can legally raise money to complete these contracts other than by a vote of the people authorizing a bond issue;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Building Committee of the Macomb County Board of Supervisors hereby recommend to the Board of Supervisors of Macomb County that the Board call a special election in accordance with the terms of the statutes for the purpose of having the people of Macomb County vote on the proposition of bonding the County for the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$200,000.00) for the purpose of completing the contracts;

FURTHER, that in making this recommendation to the Board the Building Committee wish it understood by the contractors and architect that the County waives no rights it might have as between the contractors, architect and the County either in law or in chancery in the event the figures are now arrived at with the contractors and architect are not accepted by the Board of Supervisors and the voters.

The Contagious Committee made the following report.

# May 6, 1932

At a meeting of the Contagious Disease Committee, held on the above date, there were present:

Omar Henderson, Chairman; Dr. Heine, Mallow, Brewer, Chas. Heins.

The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the matter of providing funds to pay contagious disease claims filed during the year 1932.

Previous to 1932, a considerable number of claims amounting to a large sum of money were paid for contagious disease items out of the poor fund, and when the appropriation for the poor fund was made at the annual October session, contagious disease claims were considered and funds provided in the poor fund. But a ruling by the Prosecuting Attorney points out that contagious disease claims should not be paid out of the poor fund, and it is the intention of this committee to provide funds so that all contagious disease claims will be paid out of a se-

parate fund.

At the present time, the County is paying on an average of \$1,500.00 for contagious disease patients hospitalized in the American Legion Hospital, Detroit Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Oakland County T. B. Hospital. In addition, other contagious disease claims, previously paid out of the poor and general funds, amount to approximately \$600,00 per month, or in other words, the contagious claims amount to approximately \$2,100.00 per month, so that a fund of \$25,000.00 must be provided to meet the claims payable during the year.

On motion of Dr. Heine, supported by Mallow, that he recommend to the Budget and Appropriation Committees that \$25,000.00 be transferred from the poor fund to the Contagious disease account of the general fund as an appropriation for the year 1932. The motion carried.

On motion by Brewer, supported by Mallow, this meeting adjourn.

Dr. Heine, Chairman of the Contagious Committee, informed the Board that the Kings Daughters organization, which had for several years been carrying on T. B., clinics, would have to seek new quarters and was asking the County to provide the same.

The Superintendents of the Poor presented the following communication and an itemized report of their operations.

May 6, 1932

To the Board of Supervisors Macomb County, Michigan

#### Gentlemen:

PB:CS

To give the members of your Board an outline of the problem now faced by this County in the caring for unemployed, and how this problem was met during the last winter, the attached report of activities and expenditures of this office and voluntary organizations operating in the south half of the county, is submitted for your information. It is hoped that it will give you an understanding of this problem of caring for the unfortunate of this County.

The lack of detail information prevents the reporting of the activities of the north half of the County. In all due credit we wish to state that much was done in the northern communities by Rotary, E xchange and local relief organizations to aid the unfortunate unemployed.

There are many things left undone and only time and better financial conditions will permit perfection of relief work in this County. The present condition is an emergency far more drastic than war because the children who are not to blame, must suffer for the shortcomings of their parents and our present social system in general.

We ask your cooperation in trying to carry on during the next trying year this county has ever experienced. We realize that it is often difficult to abide by the recommendations of this office when it effects people in your own Township, but unless expense is kept to a minimum a complete breakdown in relief work during next winter is unavoidable.



Your Special Committee, composed of the Finance, Budget and Appropriations Committee, having considered the matter of the 1932 appropriations and departmental budget for the balance of the year as compared with the estimated income from tax collections and other revenues. We have come to the conclusion that some reductions were necessary in various items to accomplish this end.

The appropriations for the year 1932 as fixed in October 1931 totaled \$108,013.41. All the items in the appropriations are more or less fixed charges, but we were able to make adjustments which we believe are fair to effect a savings of \$1,400.00 on an annual basis.

The departmental budget, according to our revised figures, was reduced from \$239,235.15 to \$204,312.00. This is a saving of \$34,923.15 on the basis of an annual expenditure.

Considering that four months business has been transacted for which payment has been authorized against the appropriations and departmental budgets a savings of approximately \$27,341.34 will be effected if our recommendations are adopted.

We recommend the following proposed annual appropriations effective May 1st, 1932.

The Clerk announced a quorum present and the meeting proceeded to transact business.

Minutes of previous meeting were read and approved.

Chairman Lingemann stated that the special session was called upon solicitation of the Drain Commissioner and Supervisors in the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain district who were desirous that the Board take some action instructing the County Drain Commissioner in arriving at a decision as to whether the Disposal Plant should be continued since the Supreme Court declared the drain fraudulent and wind and to make some disposition of the present claims for labor, etc., now incurred by continuing the operation of the plant since the Supreme Court's decision and if the plant were continued for two or three months longer, as has been requested by the State Department of Health, how would claims for operation be met?

The Board of Supervisors in session May 10th, had passed a Resolution asking the Attorney General for specified instructions on the matter of continuing the Disposal Plant and the Clerk read a reply under date of May 10th, 1932, from the Attorney General which is as follows:

Board of Supervisors of Macomb County Mt. Clemens, Michigan May 10, 1932

Gentlemen:

I am in receipt of a resolution of your body with reference to the operation of the nine mile Halfway sewage disposal plant which calls on me for an opinion on the following questions:

First. Has the county a legal right to use the moneys remaining in the nine Mile Halfway drainage fund in the operation of the plant?

Second. Will the county render itself liable to reimburse anyone for the moneys remaining in said fund?

Third. Will the use and operation of the plant by the county drain commissioner under the direction of the Board in any way prejudice the rights of the county in any litigation to compel the county of Macomb to pay the outstanding nine mile Halfway drain bonds?

As to the first question, I refer to the following words of Justice Potter's opinion in Township of Lake v. Millar, 257 Mich. 135:

"# # # They (Plaintiff) ask that defendant Bert Engelbrecht, drain commissioner of Macomb County, his successors, servants, agents and employees, be restrained from permitting any sewage from the lands lying westerly from the disposal plant, filtration beds, and

mechanical devices to purify the flow of said drain, to pass by or through said drain without first passing through the disposal plant # # #. that by mandatory injunction he be commanded to keep the disposal plant, filtration beds and mechanical devices in constant and continual operation # # #.

"# # # The decree of the trial court is reversed and decree will be entered for plaintiffs."

The opinion of the court would indicate that the disposal plant was to be kept in continual operation. The only moneys available for that purpose at the present time are those remaining in the drain fund. There has been no proceeding to enjoin the use of that fund. In my opinion there is no legal barrier in the way of the use of the moneys in the drain fund to meet the emergency which exists.

Whether the county will or will not be called upon to reimburse anyone for the moneys remaining in the drain fund is a question which is practically impossible to answer with any degree of certainty. In the present situation a very dire and far reaching menace to the health of over 250,000 people will accompany the closing of this disposal plant. The use of some of the funds on hand for a limited period will avert this danger. The county might in a certain contingency be directed to replace in the drain fund just that amount taken. It would appear that the worst that could happen, however, would be the necessity of spreading the amount so taken for the emergency operation of the plant on the general tax roll.

In answer to the last question, it is my own judgment and opinion that the use of part of the moneys remaining in the drain fund to comply with the order of the Commissioner of Health in keeping the disposal plant in operation at this time will not in any way prejudice the rights of the county of Macomb in any litigation pending or hereafter started to compel the county to pay the outstanding nine mile Halfway drain bonds.

The request for an additional \$5.00 was refused by the committees and they informed the welfare committee of our association that the efforts of the Michigan Taxpayers Association in extending relief to the poor of Warren Township was not a saving to the taxpayers of Macomb County and that the efforts and relief work done at the Relief Poor Commissioners are already doing, therefore, the committees would not grant the additional amount requested by the Welfare committee of our association.

## June 27th, 1932

The Welfare committee of our association reported the above mentioned information at a regular meeting of our association, so a resolution was passed that if we are not a saving to the taxpayers of this county and only duplicating what the county is doing for the poor, we will discontinue to operate our Relief Station after July 1st, 1932, unless we are allowed the additional \$5.00 per week which was promised to us by the finance committee of July 1932, but which we have never received.

Our reason for writing is that we promised and obligated ourselves to send a complete report to the poor Commissioners.



Gentlemen:

The Superintendents of the Poor report that they have concurred in your recommendations to pay to the Michigan Taxpayers Association of Van Dyke the sum of \$10.00 per week from March 1st, to July 1st., However the Superintendents of the Poor beliege that they are not vested with the authority to appropriate funds to be placed in the hands of private individuals for dispersement, the laws pertaining to their operation only permits them to spend monies for persons whom they are providing for directly. That such is the intent of the law is clearly shown in that a separate law is compiled for the appropriation of funds for private institutions to do welfare work.

Act 46, of 1925 complies section 8292 to 8294 further states that the Board of Supervisors is to make such appropriations and that such organizations must report direct to the Board of Supervisors.

The Superintendents of the Poor therefore resolved that "They will not allot or cause to be allotted, and will refrain from drawing any vouchers for any amounts to be expended by any Organizations for any purpose whatsoever." They further feel that no monies appropriated for such use of the Superintendents of the Poor should be used wither by them or by anyone else for any other purpose than such expenditures necessary to be made by the Superintendents of the Poor.

We therefore respectfully request your Honorable Body to refund the amount expended on order of the Board of Supervisors and its finance committee for any such causes. In the case of the Taxpayers Association of Van Dyke the sums expended is \$520.00

To comply with the requirements of the law, only those funds may be considered which will be on hand prior to the date of the interest and principal due. Therefore, only three-fourths of the anticipated receipts to be allocated from the weight tax toward the reduction of the taxes for the year of 1933 may be considered at this time. Three fourths of \$156,000.00 equals to \$117,000.00 and therefore, we recommend that \$120,000.00 be applied to reduce the Covert road taxes for the year of 1932.

AUGUST SESSION - 1932

The committee has carefully scrutinized the above budget and is of the opinion that the various items have been reduced to the lowest possible figure consistent with efficient operation of the department. If negotiations are completed for the completion of the Court House, it will be possible to eliminate the rental budget of \$4,400.00. An item of \$20,000.00 has been set up for bituminous resurfacing. We believe this is economical and constructive operation. However, your Honorable Body may consider it advisable to either reduce this item or eliminate it entirely. An item of \$64,000.00 for the maintenance of 382 miles of county roads, an average cost of \$167.53 per mile, compares very favorably with the cost of maintenance of the roads by other counties and the State. the State budget for maintaining of trunk lines in Macomb County shown an item of over \$500.00 per mile.

Honorable Board of Supervisors Macomb County, Michigan

Gentlemen:

Pursuant to request by the Board of Supervisors the Drain Committee has investigated thoroughly the possibility of refunding outstanding drain bonds under the Refunding Act passed at the last session of the Legislature. We have arrived at the conclusion that a refund program at the present time would be impractical and of no assistance to the taxpayers. Our reasons for this conclusion are as follows:

1. There is a grave doubt as to whether or not the drainage bonds outstanding at the present time on practically all of our drains are legal or not due to the fact that the Supreme Court of the State of Michigan in a recent case declared that the Nine Mile-Halfway drainage project was illegal and enjoined the spreading or collecting of assessments. Practically all of our drains at the present time are subject to the same objections that the Nine Mile Drain was subject to, whether such objections are valid or not, so that it is clear that bondholders would be very hesitant about trading any bonds at present for new ones where the new ones spread the payments over a longer period of time. Also, in view of the present uncertain legal status of our drains it is clear, in our opinions, no bond attorney would give an approving opinion of the refunding bonds.

2. The Refunding Act as applied to drains only permits the time of payment of the bonds to be extended to twenty years from the date of issue. Most original issues on the larger drains were for fifteen years so as a matter of practical benefit the taxpayer would get very little. 74

"To prevent a deficiency in the fund available for the payment of such principal and interest requirements, the commission may from time to time prescribe an amount to be levied in excess of the amounts required by any law, charter, ordinance or resolution to be levied, in order to meet such principal and interest payments on outstanding refunding bonds, and the commission may from time to time revise its determination in such regard. the event that the proceeds of any such tax levy shall be insufficient to pay the principal and interest requirements on such bonds as they fall due, the municipality shall provide such additional sums as may be necessary from other revenues and the commission shall prescribe such adjustment in the tax levy for the following year or years as shall be required to rectify such deficiency and to reimburse the general fund of the municipality for such advances."

This section means that the Commission may, if it feels that the schedule of payments prepared under the refunding plan are not sufficient, in view of past and present tax collections, to meet such payments in full, raise the levies under such plan to such an amount as will meet such payments. In view of the fact that the County is mearly 70% delinquent in its tax collections and that most of the people are not paying their drain taxes because of the decision in the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain case, it is not beyond the realm of possibility that the Commission would require levies to be made under the refunding plan which would be in excess of those now made to retire the original bonds.

#### September 12, 1932

The Committee has considered this matter thoroughly and have consulted with Mr. Deyo, Adviser to the State Debt Commission, whose personal views are the same as this Committee. we thus recommend that no refunding plan be attempted for drain bonds this year.

On behalf of the City, I would appreciate it very much if you would clean up the site and put it in proper order. 1. There is no doubt in my opinion that the Board of Supervisors may, if they so desire, pay these

claims for work performed and certified to out of the proceeds of the mill tax levied on hand at the present time. This, however, is a matter of policy to be determined by the Board itself and not by this office.

2. As to whether or not the various contractors could by legal action force the County of Macomb to pay these claims out of any funds, I am extremely douhtful whether they could do so. This is a matter which would involve a number of legal complexities and would only be finally determined by the Court.



Dear Sir:

Pursuant to a recent request by you, I have caused to be listed all the drains in Macomb County on which bonds are outstanding and have examined the proceedings, construction, etc., of each of these drains for the purpose of determining whether or not in my opinion they are legal or illegal drains. By that, I mean whether or not said drains come within the purport of the decision of our Supreme Court in the Nine Mile-Halfway Drain Case.

I have come to the conclusion that the drains hereby listed do come within the purport of the Nine Mile-Halfway decision and that said drains are illegal and void as being beyond the power of the drain commissioner to construct under the law as it existed at the time of their construction and completion. These drains are as follows:

I have included in this list of drains all of the inclosed type used to carry sewage as well as surface drainage as, in my opinion, these fall within the purport of the Nine Mile-Halfway case. I have also included in this list only those drains in which all the proceedings or construction of whatsoever nature were completed before August 28, 1929, this latter date being the date that the Legislature amended the drain law so as to include sewers within the meaning of the word "drain", so that there is at least some question as to those drains which were completed in any respect after August 28, 1929. 95

It is my opinion that the taxes levied for the above listed drains are illegal and void and that the projects themselves are illegal and void as being beyond the power of the drain commissioner to construct in view of the laws that then existed.

To the Chairman and Members of the Board of Supervisors:

The 1933 Departmental budget, as proposed, amounts to \$189,783.44 comparing this with the 1932 Budget of \$214,343.72 as revised, a deduction of \$24,560.28 is shown. The Budget, as set up, we feel will reduce the cost of the county government without destroying any of the necessary services.

The Budget for the year 1930 was \$267,423.11, which figure does not include a rent item of \$19,376.44 now in the Budget, so for comparison if we added this figure to the 1930 Budget, it would give a total of \$286,799.55 as against this budget of \$189,783.44, giving a reduction of \$97,016.11 or 33% over the last three years.

The 1931 Budget including rents was \$271,796.30 as compared with \$189,783.44 proposed for 1933, a reduction of \$82,012.86 or 30%.

The 1932 Budget as adopted by the Board in October 1931 was \$239,235.15. This was revised as of May 1, 1932 reducing to total of \$204,312.00 on a yearly basis, inasmuch as the County will operate on this budget for only eight months, the actual budget for the year 1932 amounts to \$214,343.72.

This is to inform you of a correction to be made in the tax warrant charging Lake Township for 1932 taxes. The State and County rejected tax is to be reduced from \$44,043,91 to \$35,734.65, a deduction of \$8,309.27, consisting of the following items:
