To the Honorable Board of Supervisors: At a meeting of the Special Classification Committee held on January 7, 1947, the following members were present: Hill, Chairman, Lemmon and Verkler.

The committee met at the request of several department heads.

Mr. Brown, County Clerk, appeared before the committee with the request that the position in his budget classified as Stenographer-Clerk II with a maximum salary of \$180.00 a month be changed to Typist-Clerk I with a maximum salary of \$150.00 per month.

The County Treasurer, Mr. Miller, appeared before the committee to discuss the possibility of reducing his department by one deputy and changing this position to General Clerk IV at a maximum salary of \$250.00 per month instead of \$270.00 for deputy. He also suggested that some change should be made in the position of Account Clerk II.

A communication from the Welfare Department was read to the committee referring to the following classifications in their department: Account Clerk II -- Mrs. Gertrude High, who has filled this position for some time retired as of January 1st. The Social Welfare Board felt that because of her experience, Miss Voiland, now in the position of Stenographer-Clerk I, would be able to fill the classification vacated. They have asked to place her in this position for a trial of three months at a beginning salary of \$165.00 per month. The maximum salary for Account Clerk II is \$190.00 per month. If, after six months her work proves satisfactory, she will be permanently classified in this position. Stenographer-Clerk II The employee holding this classification resigned as of November 30th and the department has engaged Mrs. Thora Garrison to partially fill this vacancy and also to be trained as an intake interviewer. Mrs. Garrison has worked at the County Hospital as a registered nurse for a period of 52 years prior to December 31, 1944. They are asking that this classification of Stenographer-Clerk II be changed to Intake Interviewer with a maximum salary of \$175.00 per month, Mrs. Garrison to receive \$150.00 as a starting salary.

The Register of Deeds, Mr. Tegeder, asked permission to fill a vacancy in his department under the classification of General Clerk II, having a minimum salary of \$120.00 per month to a maximum of \$170.00 per month, with an applicant who has had two years previous experience in typing and general office work. He wished to start this employee at a salary of \$140.00 per month.

Mr. Sherwood Bennett Controller, County Building Mount Clemens, Michigan

Dear Mr. Bernett:

I have your letter of January 6, 1947, requesting an opinion from this office interpreting the contract of September 2, 1944, between the County of Macomb and the firm of Harley, Ellington and Day and covering the proposed construction of the Martha T. Berry Memorial Hospital.

You state in your letter, and enclose the supporting invoice of Harley, Ellington and Day, that the estimated cost of the building and its equipment was \$758,000.00. However, you also state that in April of 1946 the Building Committee of the Board of Supervisors "at a meeting attended by representatives of the architect voted to have plans drawn holding the cost to \$515,000.00. This recommendation was later approved by the Board of Supervisors and the architect was instructed to proceed." I also understood by conference with you that the only alteration in the plan was to delate one wing from the plan was originally submitted.

You specifically ask:

"The Building Committee would like your opinion as to whether or not the County would be liable at the present time to pay to the architect on the basis of his estimated cost or could payment be made on the basis of \$515,000.00?"

A study of the copy of the contract submitted by you discloses the following pertinent provisions.

Article 2: The owners agree to pay the architects for the performance of the aforementioned services in current funds, as follows:

- (a) A fee of Five Per Cent (5%) of the aggregate cost of all building construction and mechanical work, furnishings, equipment, etc.
- (e) The "Aggregate Cost" above referred to and on which the Architects fee shall be based, shall be construed as the actual total amount of money or other consideration expanded in "the work" including all items entering therein, as represented by the total money or other consideration paid to contractors, manufacturers or suppliers upon Architects' certificates or through direct disbursement by the Owners. The "Aggregate Cost" shall not include Architects' fees, reimbursement for Resident Superintendent's salary, nor reimbursement for travel, subsistence or other incidental expenses above referred to.

In case the project is not actually constructed, "Aggregate Cost" shall represent the aggregate of the lowest tenders for "the work" received from responsible contractors, manufacturers or suppliers, or if such tenders have not been received, the "Aggregate Cost" of "The Work" shall be based on estimates prepared by the Architects.

Article 3: Payments on account of services rendered by the Architects shall become due and payable to them by the Owners in the following manner:

Opinion of the Prosecuting Attorney - continued:

- (a) Upon completion of the "Preliminary Studies," and Basic Drawings, as stated under Section (b) Article 1, a sum equal to Twenty-five Per cent (25%) of the basic Five Per Cent (5%) fee as described in Section (a) of Article 2.
- (b) Upon completion of the "Working Drawings" and "Specifications" as stated under Section (c), Article 1, an additional sum equal to Fifty Per Cent (50%) of the basic fee of Five Per Cent (5%) as described in Section (a) of Article 2, computed upon the estimated cost of "the work," or if proposals have been received or contracts awarded, then computed upon the aggregate of the lowest bona fide proposals or contract amounts for "the work."

Article 6:

(b) The payment for services as outlined under Article 3, Sec. (a) shall be computed on a limited cost of building of FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$500,000.00). The overall payment for complete services, however, when such work is ordered to proceed by Owners shall be computed upon the estimated cost of "the whole work" or if proposals have been received or contracts awarded, then computed on the lowest bona fide proposals or contract amounts of the work, all as described under Article 3.

Under paragraph (a) of Article 2 the County is liable for a fee of 5% of the ultimate cost of the building, but your question is limited to the payments now due and payable. The invoice specifically bills the county for the payments specified in Paragraphs (a) and (b) of Article 3.

The payment under paragraph (a) of Article 3 is to be computed on a limited cost of building of \$500,000.00. In the invoice the payment demanded is based on the full estimated cost of \$758,000. This is in error because the contract appears to be quite explicit on this point.

The payment under paragraph (b) of Article 3 is to be based on the "estimated cost of the work." "The Work" as used refers to the actual cost of the completed building. Although the architects have apparently visualized a completed building to cost \$758,000.00 still the Board of Supervisors has by its action limited this estimated cost to \$515,000.00 and since the representatives of the architects were present at the meeting of the Building Committee when recommendation to the Supervisors was prepared, it can be assumed that they acquiesced therein,

However, as the matter now stands plans are under way to build a hospital costing not more than \$515,000.00. If these plans are carried through and the costs held to that figure, then the architects will be entitled to a 5% fee of that amount. In reality it would logically appear that the estimated cost as it now stands is \$515,000.00 and payment under paragraph (b) of Article 3 should be computed on that figure.

CONCLUSION: That the following payments are now due and payable under Erticle 3:

- (a) 25% of 5% of \$500,000.00
- (b) 50% of 5% of \$515,000.00

Note, however, that these figures do not include equipment and that the architects can add to them the estimated cost of any planned equipment.

REDEMPTION OF COVERT ROAD BONDS

Among the outstanding County Covert Road Bonds, we have bonds in the amount of \$180,000.00, that carry an interest rate of 4-3/4% or a total amount of \$8,550.00 in interest per year. These bonds are callable at any interest bearing date, which is May 1 and November 1 of each year, by first advertising for tenders and then advertising for the redemption of same, at least 30 days prior to any interest date; the next date of which is May 1, 1947.

There is a substantial balance in the Covert Redemption Fund, although the particular Road Districts of which these bonds are a part of, show either a small overdraft or a small balance. We think it good business to call the entire amount of \$180,000.00 for payment at this time. This would mean a large savings in interest over a period of years.

If these bonds are not called for payment and are refunded at a lower rate of interest, they will not expire until 1954 and 1959 respectively.

The following is a list of Districts and Amounts of bonds that can be called for payment at this particular time.

In addition to the \$180,000.00, we have \$86,000.00 in bonds that are due May 1, 1947, which would make the total call \$266,000.00 and thereby reducing the County Covert Road Bonded Indebtedness from \$1,207,000.00 to \$941,000.00, which is the lowest since 1918.

We respectfully recommend and request that the Board of Supervisors authorize the calling of the aforesaid bonds.

Summing up the accomplishments of this Department for the year 1946, we are pleased to report considerably more progress than in 1945. While a tabulation of the work completed will be complimentary, a quick glance at the work to be done will make past efforts seem puny. However, it must be remembered that 1946 was still a year of shortages, uncertainties and labor unrest. It must also be remembered that roads and bridges will become worn out with age, and obsolete with traffic demands. Further, under present financial restrictions this obsolescence cannot be adequately corrected to care for the traffic needs of tomorrow and, Gentlemen, that tomorrow is not as far distant as a wishful thinking attitude would try to make us believe. When a highway is averaging over 1,000 vehicles per day, as are a goodly number of the main county roads, that tomorrow is here. Also, the demand and need for services on the so-called McNitt Roads is taxing our resources to the utmost, when consideration is given the fact that the traffic load on a great number of these roads is as high as that experienced on the so-called county roads less than a decade ago.

We are operating on a stop-gap procedure at present, endeavoring to correct the more hazardous conditions and catch up on the War-delayed operations. As for example: In 1946 our forces cleaned out over 85 miles of county road and outlet ditches and cleaned up the roadside by brushing on 50 miles. These same men mined, processed and hauled to the various roads a total of over 105,000 cubic yards of gravel (this would be an equivalent of 55 miles of 20-foot gravel surface 6" thick). This includes the complete regrading and gravelling of 12 Mile Road from Dequindre to M-53 - 3 miles - and the 22 Mile Road (Waldenburg Road) from M-53 East 4 miles. This is an increase of 25,000 cubic yards over 1945 production, made possible by the new Gravel Plant delivered late in 1945. Our asphalt roads were hard hit in last Spring's breakup, and a considerable mileage was a total loss as far as being a satisfactory riding surface. This condition should be no reflection on the merit of this type of road as practically all of it had been in use over 15 years. As a cost comparison, 3" asphaltic concrete in place in 1950 cost approximately 35¢ per square yard. The same materials now cost approximately 65¢ per square yard.

In 1946 we recapped the following roads with asphaltic concrete: North Avenue, from Five Points to 35 Mile Road - 4 miles; Nine Mile Road, from Hayes to Hoover - 2½ miles; Chicago Road, from Ryan to Dequindre - 1 mile; and Masonic Boulevard, from M-97 East 1/2 Mile - a total of 8 miles, and using eleven carloads of asphaltic cement. Using an oil aggregate plant-mix material, we resurfaced 1½ miles on Runyan Road. Using road-mix procedure, a bitu-minous material was placed on the following: St. Clair Street, Romeo, West 3 miles; North Avenue, Armada, North 3 miles; Armada-Ridge Road - 3 miles; Hamon Road in Harrison Township - 1 mile; South River Road - 1/2 mile; and Lake Shore Drive - 1/2 mile. This made a total of 12½ miles of oil mix, using 18 carloads of slow-curing asphaltic oil. We also placed 3 miles of sealcoat on Division Road from North Avenue West, and 3 miles on 11 Mile Road between Dequindre and M-53 (or Van Dyke Avenue) using tar as a bitumen. This makes a total of 26½ miles of bituminous resurfacing completed in 1946.

We find bituminous treatment a big improvement over gravel, both from an economic view and in the convenience to the property owners by alleviating the dust nuisance. This Board would like to increase its bituminous program, but it must be explained that this Season is very short - from 16 to 18 weeks - and it is impossible to average more than 3 carloads per week with the county forces. Someone has suggested that in order to improve a greater mileage, some of this work be done under contract. This would be fine but for the fact that the county forces can do this work a great deal cheaper then private contractors and our present budget will allow but very little work done under the contract system. We are continually receiving petitions to black-top this or that road in the county, but the financial picture necessitates taking care of those roads which in our opinion are most necessary from a traffic and economic standpoint. We would certainly like to have as much of the gravel road maintenance eliminated as we possibly can, but a quick glance at our 1946 budget expenditures, which show a disbursement of approximately \$40,000.00 more than our income, proves conclusively that we cannot continue very long when our surplus is being drawn on at that rate. It is quite simple to present a petition signed by every property owner to have some particular road black-topped, especially where no effort is made to participate in the cost of that improvement. Property owners or the local governmental unit should be willing to contribute toward some of the cost of these projects because of the convenience and improvement to their property. That cost is not slight, varying from \$2,000.00 per mile for a 20-foot width of prime and double seal surface treatment, effective only for light traffic, with the cost running up to \$7,000.00 per mile for the same width using hot-laid asphaltic concrete. This does not include grade and base correcting or reinforcing. This coming year we are hopeful of black-topping about 30 miles in various parts of the county. We also anticipate using considerable calcium chloride liquor, as past performance of this material has proved it economically sound as a stabilizing agent.

The drainage costs are mounting and replacement of bridges and culverts will begin to make heavy inroads in our resources. In 1946 we replaced one 24-foot span concrete bridge on Lindsey Road and repaired several other structures. Our program for 1947 will include two bridges on the Federal Aid Secondary System - one on Romeo-Plank Road and one on Marine City Highway, 1s miles East of Meade. These will be Government participating projects. Also, we hope to relocate and replace the deplorably unsafe structure at the corner of Elm and 33 Mile Roads, approximately 1/2 mile North of Romeo. Further, we intend to continue on our ditch cleaning program and hope to increase the mileage we completed in 1946. We will have additional equipment for this type of work and with the proper cooperation of the affected property owners, our 1946 record should be topped.

Materials are still difficult to obtain, especially such items as metal culvert pipe, bridge steel, cement, flake chloride and rock salt. The equipment picture is getting brighter, although it will probably be late in 1948 before we will be able to obtain the needed items of the type wanted and when we want them. However, in 1946 deliveries were made on 5 Ford tractors with mowers; I heavy duty Galion grader; I heavy duty Adems grader; I Northwest 3/4 yard gasoline shovel; I Buckeye 3/4 yard gasoline shovel; I D-6 Caterpillar tractor and LaPlante Choat bulldozer; I loader attachment for Austin-Western grader; 3 Ford dump trucks; 3 International KS-7 dump trucks; 5 Ford pickups; and 1 Ford Stake.

For early 1947 delivery we have on order - 1 Galion heavy duty grader; 1 Austin-Western heavy duty grader; 1 Caterpillar medium duty grader; and 1 Rogers equipment trailer.

Inasmuch as there has been some question regarding expenditures by the State Highway Department in Macomb County, the following may be of some interest. Since 1941 the State Highway Department has expended in Macomb County, or has under contract, approximately \$2,600,000.00, which does not include approximately \$360,000.00 expended on trunkline maintenance or the cost of right-of-way for the various projects. Neither does it include the cost of M-97 extension on the West side of Mount Clemens connecting with North Avenue, regarding which a recent press release from the State Highway Department stating that construction on this belt line will be started in the very near future was made public.

In conclusion, this Board feels that considerable progress is being made in the maintenance of the highway system of Macomb County. All demands for improvement cannot be met under the present financial restrictions. We are anticipating losing the liquor tax aid in May, and although this will be partially offset by the \$25,000.00 grant made by your Honorable Board, there will still be a discrepancy of approximately \$25,000.00. We recommend for your study the financial analysis of Michigan State Highway revenues and expenditures as given in the February, 1947 copy of "Highways and Byways". A brief analysis of 1946 expenditures. which shows a total gross return from Gas and Weight Tax of \$59,000,000.00, out of which \$28,500,000.00 was returned to the State Highway Department, \$22,500,000.00 to the County Road Commissions, and \$8,000,000.00 to the Cities and Villages. Broken down on a mileage basis estimating 107,400 miles total mileage, of which 9,400 miles are State trunklines, 12,000 miles City and Village streets, and 86,000 miles of roads and streets under the jurisdiction of the County Road Commissions. Analyzed further, the County Road System receives 38.2% of the total revenues for maintenance and construction of 80% of the total road and street mileage. As a comparison, the State receives 48.4% for 8.7% of the mileage and the Cities and Villages receive 13.4% for 11.3% of the mileage. This broken down in round figures makes available \$3,030.00 per mile for State trunklines; \$665.00 for City and Village streets; and \$265.00 per mile for County roads. We submit these figures merely as a thought-provoking statement and with no idea of increasing our revenues at the expense of either the State or the Cities and Villages. We do believe, however, that in order to satisfy the demands of both the property owners and the travelling public, additional revenues must be made to the highway industry, with an equitable distribution made of those additional resources. In the meantime, we will endeavor to carry on to the best of our ability, and are appreciative of the fine cooperation and support given us by your Honorable Body.

Following is the Prosecutor's opinion:

Dear Mr. Bennett:

"We have your request in regard to the payment of autopsy fees to Dr. V. H. Wolfson. We quote your statement of facts to indicate the specific question involved:

"Dr. V. H. Wolfson has returned county warrants given him for payment of autopsies performed on orders of the county coroners. The reason for returning these warrants is that he insists that he be paid \$25.00 for each autopsy. The services cover a period from April, 1944 to April 1946. During this period the county Board of Supervisors had an established rate of \$15.00 which was approved each year in the October session at the time of the approval of the county budget. Autopsies were performed by other doctors in the county during this period for which they received the amount allowed of \$15.00. In April, 1946 the Board of Supervisors did increase the allowance to \$25.00 to affect only all cases after that date.'

In annalyzing Dr. Wolfson's claim, it would appear that Dr. Wolfson either knew of the rate established by the Board of Supervisors, or he did not know it. If he did know of the rate, it could then be assumed that he was entering into the contract with the county on that basis and is now prevented from claiming the higher fee.

If he did not personally know of this action of the Board of Supervisors, it still must be held that he was dealing with the county officials on the basis of their authority and their authority was, of course, limited by the Board of Supervisors. The fact that the other doctors performed autopsies during the period in question at the \$15.00 rate would indicate that this rate was accepted by the medical profession, and that they performed their work recognizing that the fee schedule set by the Board of Supervisors was applicable to them.

It is the opinion of this office that Doctor Wolfson was governed by fee schedule set by the Board of Supervisors, and that he is entitled to recover on that basis only, or at the rate of \$15.00 per autopsy."

It was pointed out to the Committee by the Dog Warden that it has in the last several years been very difficult to employ extra deputies to assist him in canvassing the county after June 1st. At the present time, the amount of the penalty, which is 50¢ for male and \$1.00 for female dogs, has been paid to the Dog Warden for securing licenses after June 1st of each year. It is out of this penalty that extra deputies are paid by him.

Motion was made by Schmid and supported by Wagner that the Committee recommend to the Board that effective June 1, 1947, penalty for failure to pay dog tax be \$1.00 for male and \$2.00 for female dogs in addition to the regular license fee and that this change in penalties be advertised in the county newspapers further that the police officials in the various communities in the county be asked to co-operate in catching stray dogs by building small pens in their community and keeping the dogs until the Dog Warden is notified. At a meeting of the Dog Committee held on May 19th, 1947, the following members were present:

The Committee met to go over the opinion recently received from the Prosecuting Attorney covering several questions that were referred to him at the last meeting.

The opinion covers the following questions:

What authority do police officers and dog wardens have to kill unlicensed dogs? It was the opinion of the Prosecutor that no dog could be killed without having been held for a reasonable length of time sometimes considered 72 hours. He further stated that if the dog is licensed, it would be necessary to have a hearing before the Justice of the Peace if the owner objected to the killing of the dog.

Can an unlicensed dog be destroyed where the owner refuses to license the dog but keep it on his property? It is the opinion of the Prosecutor that it would be illegal for any person to trespass on the property of the owner of unlicensed dogs to destroy the dog, however, the refusal to pay the license fee would be the unlawful keeping of an unlicensed dog making the owner liable for a criminal penalty of not to exceed \$100.00 fine or three months in jail or both.

The third question is whether or not municipalities would have the legal right to build dog pens in which they could keep dogs pending their turning them over to the County Dog Warden. The opinion of the Prosecutor was that the statute setting up the powers of a village would give the authority to establish dog pens at their discretion.

Motion was made by Schmid and supported by Stepnitz that Mr. Forbes Duncan be employed as the Dog Warden for one year starting June 1, 1947 and that proper contract be drawn.

Motion carried.

It was brought to the attention of the Committee that through an error the present penalty for failure to purchase a dog license was stated to be 50¢ for male and \$1.00 for female whereas the actual penalty is 50¢ for all dogs.

Motion was made by Wangelin and supported by Powell that the action of this Committee on April 27, 1947 be rescinded and that the Committee recommend to the Board that the penalty after June 1st be \$1.00 for all dogs instead of \$1.00 for male and \$2.00 for female. Motion carried.

The Visiting Nurses Association operating in several communities will continue in their services, part of which will be of advantage to the health unit. Some of their work, however, is bed side care.

The King's Daughters will continue their T. B. Clinic in as much as they are at present doing a very fine job in care and treatment. Dr. Stryker stated that he would set up a system of reporting between his department and the King's Daughters, so that their records would coincide. In addition, the Health Unit will be interested in an educational program and setting up preventative measures for the control of T. B.

The question of personel was discussed with the Board, it was decided that the clerk in the Welfare Office now doing Contagious work, and the County Nurse now doing T. B. work would be transferred to the Health Unit. The Doctor stated, in addition, for the time being, he would be in need of a secretary, one V. D. Nurse, one nurse for general contagious work, one sanitary engineer and a sanatarian. The above staff would be employed as they become available. The Board left the matter of salaries up to Dr. Stryker. a new budget will be prepared and submitted to the Budget Committee at the fall session.

Harrisville, Michigan October 10, 1947

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Macomb County:

In previous communications I have endeavored to furnish you with such information bearing on the progress of the investigation assigned to me relating to laxity and corruption in the field of law enforcement as was compatible with the proper prosecution of the inquiry. In addition to the information so furnished, you have been able to some extent to assess the progress made through court proceedings which have grown out of it.

I believe that it may now be safely stated that at least 90% of the investigation phase of the work has been completed. By this I refer principally to the taking of testimony. More than 12,000 pages of testimony have been taken from about 450 witnesses. In it so many individuals and "business" places have been mentioned that without careful indexing and checking no one could be able to keep in mind the details of the testimony as applied to any particular person or place. For several months most of our time has been occupied with the somewhat dull but very necessary chore of checking transcripts for the aid of indexes and cross-indexes. The parpose of all this, of course, is to make certain that all "leads" are followed through, and that warrants are issued in all those cases, and those cases only, in which there is sufficient evidence of guilt to establish at least probable cause. This type of work is being narrowed to a few lines of investigation which are being completed, one by one, as rapidly as possible. There will then remain the labor of carrying through to a conclusion prosecutions on warrants now pending, or still to be issued.

Among the matters brought to my attention is the practice alleged to be more or less common of school officers being personally interested in dealings or contracts with their districts. Some school officers seem to have profited substantially from selling insurance, coal, milk and other commodities to their districts, in violation of the statutes which make this a Circuit Court offense in districts having a population of more than 4,000.

It does not necessarily follow, however, that I should be expected to take it upon myself to ferret out the extent and details of this type of violation. The facts are in most cases readily ascertainable from the records, and if prosecutions are thought justified in any instance, the usual methods and channels are open for

that purpose. The same reasoning applies with reference to current administration of municipal affairs, some instances of which have been laid before me with the request that I give them attention. I hope the interested parties will bear in mind that the regular law enforcement machinery in the county now seems to be functioning properly, and that it should therefore not be necessary for me to divert my attention to "current events" unless the sheriff or proseucting attorney find that the pertinent facts cannot be fully developed without the special assistance available under the investigative statute.

Dear Mr. Bennett:

We have your oral request for an opinion upon the following questions:

- 1. Whether or not the County Health Department is to be composed of Supervisors, and if not, whether Supervisors may serve on the Board.
- 2. What compensation can be given the County Health Board?

The County Health Departments were provided for by Act No. 306 of the Public Acts of 1927, as last amended by Act No. 198 of the Public Acts of 1941, and is Sections 14.161, et seq., Michigan Statutes Annotated. The following is Section 1:

"Section 1. The Board of Supervisors of any county in the State may provide for a county health department to be paid for out of the general funds of the county. (Provided, That if the county has a department of health the board of supervisors may select a county board of health of five (5) members, who may or may not be members of the board of supervisors, one (1) to serve for one (1) year, one (1) to serve for two (2) years, one (1) to serve for three (3) years, one (1) to serve for four (4) years, and one (1) to serve for five (5) years. The successor of each appointed shall be appointed to serve for five (5) years and may be appointed to succeed himself)."

The statute very specifically states that the Board of Supervisors "may select a County Board of Health of five members who may or may not be members of the Board of Supervisors." From this very specific language, we conclude that the Board may be made up of Supervisors or may not be, or a combination of Supervisors and non-supervisors, depending upon the decision of the Board of Supervisors.

In answer to your second question, it should be noted that the statutes setting up the County Health Board makes no provision for the payment of salaries or per diem to the members of the County Health Board. The statute, however, does say that the County "may provide for a County Health Department to be paid for out of the general funds of the County"

Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution provides:

"The Boards of Supervisors shall have exclusive power to fix
the salaries and compensation of all county officials not otherwise provided for by law ***"

Section 11 of Act 156 of the Public Acts of 1851, as amended and being Section 5.331 of Michigan Statutes Annotated, provides:

"The said several Boards of Supervisors shall have power and they are hereby authorized at any meeting thereof lawfully held; * * * to prescribe and fix the salaries and compensation of all employees of their respective counties where not fixed by law, * * **

It would appear that the members of the County Health Board are either officials, or they are employees of the county. We do not decide which. The act creating their offices does not prescribe their compensation. In either case, the Board of Supervisors has the authority to fix the salaries and compensation.

It is therefore our opinion that the Board of Supervisors has the authority to fix the salaries and compensation to be paid to the members of the County Health Board.

Dear Sir:

You have requested of this office an opinion on the compensation to be allowed to the members of the County Board of Education. We refer you to Section 6 of Act 117 of the Public Acts of 1935 as last amended by Act 245 of the Public Acts of 1941, being Section 15.166 of Michigan Statutes Annotated. We quote:

"Sec. 6. Members of the county board of education shall receive the same per diem compensation and actual and necessary traveling expenses as are allowed to members of the boards of supervisors. Such compensation and expenses shall be audited, allowed and paid from funds of said county board of education."

We believe this act to be self-explanatory.

Gentlemen:

In reply to a letter dated March 24th from the County Clerk, the report of the Finance Committee at the Board of Supervisors Meeting February 10th recommended to the Board of Supervisors that the Social Welfare Board investigate the amount of work performed by the contract doctors and if they feel it advisable, that a new arrangement be made and be recommended to the Board of Supervisors, we have reviewed the performance of doctors under the contract agreement, as far as the Department of Social Welfare participates, covering the first eight months (January through August) of this present year and submit the following information:

The total number of Patient Persons admitted to St.

Joseph Hospital from January through August is - - - - - - - 134

For Medical treatment only - - 106

For Surgical treatment - - - - 28

Breaking down the \$6,000.00 for the service to the 134 patients--

Had the 28 Surgical cases been treated on an individual case basis and paid for at the rates allowed by the State Crippled Children Commission (a general accepted fee schedule) the cost would have been --\$1,667.50

This would leave the medical treatment for the 106 patients the balance of the \$6,000.00 or - - - - - - - - - - - - \$4,332.50

Since the physicians under the agreement service the needs at the Sheriff's jail (the number of calls the Board of Social Welfare has not any way of knowning) and County Infirmary, these services must be considered in \$4,332.50.

At the Infirmary the physicians scheduled by the group's own arrangment service such immates designated by nurses as in need of medical attention. The physicians are subject to call if emergency requires.

Under the present agreement arrangement all cases are compelled to go to one hospital— the St. Joseph. Due to the limited number of physicians participating in the agreement, the private physician—Patient relation—ship frequently stops at the entrance to the hospital. Only physicians on the staff at the hospital can treat public cases or physicians who have courtesy staff status at St. Joseph.

Social Welfare Report continued-

The practice limits to a few the number of physicians who can treat County cases. Other hospitals in the County are eliminated from receiving County cases.

Filter Board:

From this same group of physicians under the agreement, they select usually three to serve for a given time, rotating the periods to pass on all applicants for hospitalization at either St. Joseph or University Hospital, Ann Arbor. Their services for attending Filter Board meeting each Wednesday of the month is compensated by a per diem of \$5.00 each.

Since January through August, 8 months, 151 cases have been passed upon at an expense of \$345.00. This is in addition to the \$6,000.00 paid the physician under the agreement for same period of time.

Breaking down the 151 cases:

23 were examined or interviewed in the office before admittance to the hospital.

128 had been admitted to the hospital before seen by Filter Board member.

All applicants are required to have a diagnosis from attending physician before making application. The emergency cases are authorized for admittance when phone or verbal request is made by attending physician and do not come before the Filter Board in the regular way.

As to making recommendations, our Board feels that since the matter has been discussed by Committees from the Board of Supervisors several times in recent years, each time ending up with the Committees approving continuance of the agreement and the Board of Supervisors accepting the Committees recommendation, we do not present a plan at this time but suggest that your Honorable Body consider trying for a limited time, a plan allowing the patient to select any of the hospitals within the County; fees allowed to be the rate prevailing at the hospital for hospital care and surgery rates as fixed by the State Crippled Children Commission or 75% of the rates of the Uniform Fee Schedule for Government Agencies as set up by the Michigan State Medical Society for wards and dependants of government. An individual case and fee basis with controls differing the public case from a private case practice.

The Board of Supervisors has always done the planning with the medical profession and hospital authorities for County cases. It is not the Board of Social Welfare's attitude that you should not continue, for your body does have final approval since you provide the necessary funds. We offer our hearty cooperation that a mutual, beneficial plan can be adopted and acceptable to all interests.

"At a meeting of the Board of Supervisors on October 22, 1947, I was instructed to procure an opinion from you concerning the status of the money that Circuit Judge James E. Spier turned back to the County during his foreign service in World War II. In other words, who does the money belong to?"

The money returned to the county by Judge Spier was his salary as Circuit Judge, including both the portion received from the county and the portion received from the state, less the

amount retained to cover his income tax obligations to the Federal Government.

A study of the correspondence between Judge Spier and the County of Macomb indicates that:

- 1. That the money returned by Judge Spier to the County was a donation.
- 2. That this donation was qualified and restructed to the extent that it was payable to the judicial fund.
- 3. That the great bulk of the donations were made by Judge Spier after Prosecutor Wilbur F. Held had given an opinion to the county that such money returned might be set up as a separate "Judicial Fund" and further that payments for expenses of visiting judges might be paid from such a fund in accordance with the expressed desires of Judge Spier.

It is further indicated that the county did accept the donations, but set them up on their books as a separate judicial fund and did make payments from said fund in accordance with the expressed desires of Judge Spier.

It is the opinion of this office that Judge Spier had a right to make a donation to the county and that the county had a right to receive it. It would seem to follow as a matter of legal logic that Judge Spier could impress his gift with trust provisions to the effect that the money be used only for a designated purpose and it is the further opinion of this office that the county in accepting the gift with those qualifications would be bound by them and restricted in its use of the funds by the prescribed conditions.

In this case, the county not only accepted the donations with the understanding of the restricted nature of the gift, but also accepted the donations after it had been in effect advised by its legal council that the donations were for the purposes of a judicial fund only, and further we have the undisputed knowledge that the county made payments from the fund in accordance with the conditions of the gift.

It is therefore the opinion of this office that the fund so donated to the county, belongs to the county and that it is in the nature of a trust fund in accordance with the restrictions placed upon the gift by Judge Spier. These restrictions are very indefinite and at this time are impossible to ascertain with any degree of legal definiteness.

Some question may arise as to the purposes for which the "Judicial Fund" so set up can be used, and an examination of the correspondence between Judge Spier and the county leaves many unanswered questions. However, it is believed that this matter can readily be settled by a conference between Judge Spier and a proper committee from the Board of Supervisors.
