Dear Sir:

We have your letter of February 16, 1948, in which you request the opinion of this office. To indicate the specific question involved, we quote from your letter.

"At a meeting of the Macomb County Board of Supervisors on February 10th, 1948, the Treasurer, Mr. Miller, brought up the question as to whether or not he could legally pay delinquent tax collections direct to the schools rather than to the township and city treasurers. The Board asks for an opinion as to the legality of Mr. Miller's request, so will you please render this opinion before the March meeting."

With regard to the question raised, we believe the following to be the pertinent sections of the tax law.

"Sec. 87 --- The county treasurer of each county shall, on or before the fifteenth (15) day of each month make out a detailed statement of the account for the preceding calendar month between the county and the several townships or cities, which statement shall show the different funds to which the several debits and credits belong, and render the same to the township or city treasurer, and pay all moneys shown by said statement so rendered to the township or city to the proper receiving officer of the township or city, and notify the township or city clerk of the items and total amount thereof; also a description of the lands upon which such taxes were paid.***

(7.141 MSA)

"Sec. 84a. The township or city clerk shall within 10 days after receiving the notice from the county treasurer of the amount of delinquent taxes and a description of the land upon

which said taxes were paid, make out and deliver to the moderator or secretary of the district board or board of education of each school district situated in whole or in part within such township or city to which money may be due from delinquent school taxes as shown by the statement of the County Treasurer a detailed statement showing the amount of such delinquent school tax together with the interest thereon and (the year of assessment thereof) and deliver a copy of such statement therest to the township or city treasurer. The township or city treasurer shall (forthwith) pay all moneys shown by such statement to be due such school district to the proper receiving officer of such district (and notify the secretary or director of each respective school district of the total amount paid to the school treasurer." (7.142 MSA)

CONCLUSION

It is the opinion of this office that the statutes clearly place upon the township or city clerk, the duty of the payment of delinquent tax moneys to the school districts. Since the statute so places the duty, we do not believe that the County Treasurer can disregard the statutory procedure and make payments direct to the school districts.

This final summary of the report of the Macomb County Road Commission for the year 1947 is respected fully submitted.

The primary activities of this department were concentrated on drainage problems. In this field over 70% miles of road and outlet ditches were deepened or cleaned out in 1947. With this, over 2 miles (12,415 feet) of 12% to 96%, inclusive, sewer and culvert pipe was installed. In ditching a surprising amount of co-operation by the abutting property owners, especially in the Northern townships, was obtained. This co-operation was usually in the form of cash payments and in their willingness to take care of excavated material. Without this co-operation, this mileage could not have been obtained and, to continue this program in 1948, will require even more co-operation.

Several small bridges were repaired and the obsolete structure on the corner of 33 Mile Road and McVicar Road, in Bruce Township, was replaced with a 23-foot span by 8° 6" rise multi-plate arch bridge. Additional right-of-way was acquired to eliminate a hazardous turn at this location. The fill and gravel surfacing will be completed early this Spring and the road opened for traffic.

In conjunction with the Federal Aid Secondary Program two bridges have been contracted, construction to begin about April 1st. One will be a 45-foot span, 30° crossing, steel deck girder, over Salt Slang Creek on Romeo Plank Road at a contract price of \$28,075.00. The other, a 40-foot, 90° crossing, steel deck girder, over Deer Creek on Marine City Highway, East of Meade, at a cost of \$22,447.74. The Federal Government will pay one-half the cost of these structures and both bridges are scheduled for completion July 31, 1948.

For surfacing, over 121,000 cubic yards of gravel was mined from county-owned or leased pits and placed on Macomb County highways. It has been the policy of this Board to stabilize new gravel resurfacing with a calcium chloride solution to prevent as much loss as possible from wind and traffic. All primary gravel roads were given two treatments during the Summer and a large mileage of secondary roads were also treated, with the assistance of several townships who purchased the chloride - 211,780 gallons of calcium chloride liquor being used for this purpose.

Our bituminous program primarily was rehabilitation, with quite an amount of bituminous surface treatment. Bitumen required for dust palliative, oil mix, plant mix and surface treatment was as follows: 355,697 gallons of road oils and M.C. cut-backs; 50,422 gallons of asphaltic cement; 85,210 gallons of tar; and 25,895 gallons of asphaltic emulsion. We were assisted somewhat by a few townships who paid for a number of cars of bituminous materials used on McNitt roads. The prospects for bituminous resurfacing for 1948 are not too heartening. With the funds available, we believe our program will be limited to primary or heavily travelled roads. We are tentatively setting up a program approximating 25 miles of the various types, but with the continually increasing cost and the shrinking of the road maintenance dollar, coupled with the prospects of a fuel oil shortage, this Board cannot be too optimistic of the attainment of that goal.

There is a surprisingly large mileage of concrete pavement in Macomb County in dire need of some type of recapping. It must be remembered that there have been very few miles of new concrete laid in this county since 1930. Practically all pavements are twenty years of age or older. Several million dollars are invested in these roads and each years delay in resurfacing them is increasing the eventual cost of that resurfacing. Even the most permanent type of road will wear out or become obsolete because of present traffic demands, and it is time to start looking toward the future if highway transportation is to be efficiently and safely handled.

One of the highlights of 1947 was the completion of the Michigan Good Roads Federation Highway Study Committee's report on highway needs in Michigan. Space does not permit the functions or analysis of this Committee. A summary of the needs of Macomb County is all that is available at the present time, but as soon as a complete report is available, the Board of Supervisors will be advised. For the Macomb County Road System alone, it was found that 145 of the 287 miles of Class B (primary) thoroughfares should be improved at a cost of \$1,374,600.00, and that 410 miles of the 893 miles of Class C (local) roads should be modernized at a cost of \$1,515,000.00. Also, 49 new bridges should be constructed at a cost of \$788,400.00, or a total of \$3,578,000.00. This, Gentlemen, is no padded, but a very conservative estimate necessary to bring the road system of Macomb County to the minimum requirements compatable to a safe and efficient highway system.

On the subject of highway finances, a study of the McNitt Read expenditures is very interesting. In 1945 we had an expenditure of \$152,766.13 for 861.9 miles, or approximately \$178.00 per mile. In 1946 expenditures totalled \$172,321.83 for the same mileage, or approximately \$199.00 per mile - an increase of \$19,555.70, or almost 13% in that one year. In 1947 our expenditures amounted to \$228,818.79 for 888.2 miles, or approximately \$258.00 per mile. Compared with 1946, this is an increase of 33% over 1946 expenditures, or \$57,647.74. This amount is very close to the decrease in our cash balance since December 31, 1945, this decrease being \$53,636.77, which left a balance of \$133,996.59 as of December 31, 1947. This may appear to be a rather large balance but - in order to establish a budget for 1948 large enough to take care of our operating expenses to satisfy the demands for services, we will have to draw \$74,000.00 from this balance. This will leave about \$60,000.00 to take care of Macomb County highways between January 1, 1949 and April 1, 1949, when our first quarter weight tax refunds become due. This means that if this procedure is maintained, we will have to mort—gase our future gas and weight tax funds in order to maintain our roads during the critical Spring months. Our 1947 McNitt road expenditure closely approximates the amount of taxes raised by the various townships for these roads in 1930. However, there is considerable more mileage at this time, and a very large increase in the number of patrons on these roads all clamoring for better services.

A great deal of thought must be given these financial problems. It must be remembered that no other factor was so instrumental in the growth of Macomb County than were the highways of this county. To prevent transportation strangulation and loss of growth, that system must be not only maintained, but greatly enlarged. Traffic on Michigan highways in 1946 was nine times the volume of that in 1920, and it is safe to assume that the increase was higher in Macomb County. To bring our roads and streets to the minimum standards desired within a period of 12 years will require an additional \$300,000.00 more per year than now being received from our gas and weight tax. Our present funds are barely sufficient to meet our maintenance needs. These funds will have to be obtained from some source, and the concensus of opinion is this will have to be through increased motor vehicle taxes, plus partial local support for local roads.

These stipulations also dissolve the present injunction now pending against the construction of both the Red Run and the Clinton River Spillway. It was explained to the committee that Macomb County is to assume at large 7.5% of the cost of widening and deepening the Red Run Drain or an amount of approximately \$35,000.00. If the Board of Supervisors will approve this percentage, the injunctions will be dissolved by the court. Oakland County has agreed to assume 30% of the cost of the Clinton River Spillway.

Motion by Biehl, supported by Verkler that the committee recommend to the Board that the County of Macomb assume an assessment on the Red Run Drain of 7.5% to be spread county at-large in accordance with the stipulation for modification of the injunction now pending in circuit court against Oakland County by several townships within this county. This suit was started upon the suggestion of the State Supreme Court in a recent decision on a case covering the entire drain.

The meeting was called at the request of Dr. Stryker, County Health Officer, who wished to submit several proposals to the committee.

Dr. Stryker stated that under the present policy of the department all patients to be admitted to TB Hospitals at County expense were required to go through the facilities of the Kings Daughters Clinic and he wished to have the committee approve this procedure for the future.

Motion by Brewer, supported by Havel, that the committee instruct the County Health Department to have all TB patients pass through the facilities of the Kings Daughters Clinic before being admitted to TB Hospitals.

Dr. Stryker read an opinion to the committee received from the Prosecuting Attorney governing the care and treatment of venereal diseases. In this opinion the Prosecutor ruled that the County Health Department is not liable for the payment of such treatment after the patient has been declared non-infectious. If the patient is still financially unable to pay for such treatment said patient can be taken care of through the Welfare Department and under a ruling from the State Social Welfare Department they will approve such cases provided other forms of relief are being paid at the time to the patient or members of the family. Dr. Stryker recommended to the committee that he be authorized to follow such procedure in his department.

Motion by Brewer, supported by Toles, that the committee approve the recommendation of Dr. Stryker regarding treatment of venereal diseases. Motion carried.

In the past it has at times been difficult to have patients admitted to Herman Kiefer Hospital due to the fact that they are filled to capacity. In order to come to some agreement with the hospital officials, Dr. Stryker and Lyle Rosso met with the authorities of Herman Kiefer Hospital and arrived at the following arrangements regarding patients having a communicable disease: First, that Herman Kiefer Hospital would not be able to take any county TB Patients; seepind, if the patients are taken to the hospital the vehicle conveying such patients must remain at the hospital until it is definitely determined whether or not the patient has a contagious disease; third, the county must agree to guarantee payment for the period the patient is kept in the admitting room. Dr. Stryker recommended that the committee approve such an arrangement.

Gentlemen:

Our agreement for professional services on the above project dated September 2, 1944 provides under Article 4 (a):

"That if, after a definite scheme for the aforesaid project or construction as represented by the "Basic Drawings" has been approved by then, they shall make decisions which for their proper execution involve extra service and expense for changes in, or additions to the drawings, specifications, or other documents, or, if the Architects are put to further labor or expense by delays caused by the Owners or a Contractor, or by the delinquency or insolvency of either, or as a result of damage to the construction work by fire or other unforeseen calamities, they shall be paid at therate of TWO AND ONE-HALF TIMES (2-1/2) their actual payroll cost for all the time expended on the particular work resulting from such decisions or causes as above related. It shall be the duty of the Architects to notify the Owners in writing, whenever such situations arise to establish a right to any additional compensations.

June 2nd, 1948

Communication from Architects - continued:

At the present time you have under consideration the possible revision of the completed construction documents to comply with provisions of the United States Public Health Service standards for qualifying this project for Federal aid under the Hospital Survey and Construction Act.

We have had some conferences with your Building Committee, Medical Counsel, Controller and others in connection with this program and are ready to proceed further under the provisions of the above section of our agreement. The work to be done would include further conferences as may be required with local, State and perhaps Federal authorities and the preparation of first preliminary sketches and later the revision of the completed construction documents. This work would be done in stages in accordance with the provisions of the application for Federal aid under the above mentioned act.

Since the work involved may be quite extensive, we would appreciate the written authority of your board given after appropriate action and confirmed by proper signature in the space provided on copy of this letter, together with a copy of the resolution of the Board giving such authorization. We are prepared to undertake the work rapidly after we have such authority.

That all departments be requested to make use of the rectigraph machine for copying records where at all possible. That all public records in the various departments be kept in the proper filing sequence.

All applications for employment for classified positions are to be submitted to the Classification Committee of the Budget Committee before the applicant is employed.

If any additional expenditure is needed for clerk hire in any department, it shall be first approved by the Board of Supervisors.

If any expense in any department equals the amount set in the budget prior to December 31, 1949, additional allowance must be made by the Board of Supervisors before any additional expenditures can be incurred.

It was pointed out to the Committee that after the regular six months audit of their records, it had been determined that the cost of taking care of patients was \$15.03. They stated that of Mr. Peltier of the Macamb County Laboratory would take care of all county laboratory work the price to the county would be \$13.03 which includes all services.

Motion by Lindsey, supported by Kalahar that the Committee recommend to the Board of Supervisors that the per diem rate for county patients at St. Joseph Hospital be set at \$13.03 effective Nov. 1, 1948.

Dr. Stryker brought to the attention of the Committee the question of paying for supplies furnished tuberculosis patients in institutions. He stated that under the Contagious Act only those charges that are necessary for the care and improvement of the patient could be paid from Contagious Funds. According to an opinion of the Prosecuting Attorney, any other supplies needed by the patient would be because they are indigent and therefore a charge against the Welfare Funds.

Motion by Kalahar, supported by Strich that all supplies needed by indigent tuberculosis patients in institutions not necessary for their treatment be paid for by the Welfare Department. Motion carried.
