Dear Sir:

We have your letter of December 15, 1950, requesting an opinion for the Finance Committee on the question of the liability of the County for injury to elected officials.

In general, liabilities of the County are only those created by Statute.

The Workmen's Compensation Act, M.S.A. 17.147, expressly excludes elected officials from the definition of "employees" coming under the Act.

It is our opinion, therefore, that the elected County officials are without protection in the event of injuries to themselves under the Workmen's Compensation Act.

Act 329 of the Public Acts of 1937, "An Act providing for compensation to certain peace officers injured in active duty, etc.," may have some bearing on the question of financial protection to peace officers and an inquiry is being directed to the Attorney General for an interpretation of this Act.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the present county jail of Macomb County is 38 years old, and was constructed approximately 38 years ago when Macomb County was but sparsely populated in comparison with its present population;

AND WHEREAS, the said jail is now totally inadequate to serve the needs of the citizens of said county and is in a bad state of repair;

AND WHEREAS, in the judgment of the Board of Supervisors of Macomb County, Michigan, it is deemed necessary for the welfare and safety of said County and its citizens to provide for the constructing and equipping of a new county jail to replace the present inadequate structure, and for the county to borrow the sum of money necessary to defray the cost and expense thereof, and issue its bonds therefor, pursuant to the provisions of the statutes of the State of Michigan in such case made and provided;

AND WHEREAS, the cost of said proposed county jail has been estimated by Harley, Ellington & Day of Detroit, Michigan, the architect retained by the Board of Supervisors, to be Nine Hundred Fifty Thousand (\$950,000.00) Dollars, which estimate of cost is hereby declared to be the estimated cost of said new county jail;

AND WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors does hereby determine and declare that the estimated period of usefulness of said new county jail is not less than fifty (50) years;

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TUBERCULOSIS SANATORIUM

WHEREAS, the protection of the health of the residents of Southeastern Michigan demands in addition to other health measures, the proper control of human tuberculosis, and

WHEREAS, proper control measures in tuberculosis includes the immediate hospitalization in suitable sanitoria of persons afflicted with tuberculosis which are staffed by trained personnel in the care and treatment of tuberculosis, and

WHEREAS, in the year 1950, Macomb County had 91 persons hospitalized in 9 different institutions widely spread in the state of Michigan maintained for the care and treatment of tuberculosis, and there were also 47 active cases being treated at home under the supervision of the County Health Department, mainly because of the unwillingness of patients to submit or their families being unwilling to allow them to submit to hospitalization because such hospitalization would require such patients to be in an institution a large distance from their home, and

WHEREAS, the number of accept ble beds per deaths in approved institutions for tuberculosis patients in Southeastern Michigan is 2.2, whereas in the balance of the state of Michigan the number of acceptable beds per death is 3.9 which will be increased to 4.8 upon completion of Genesee County Sanagorium, State Sanatorium at Hancock and State Sanatorium in Southeastern Michigan, and

WHEREAS, Southeastern Michigan in general and Macomb County in particular has the greatest percentage increase in population in the state of Michigan, which indicates that existing problems will become more acute,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Macomb County Board of Supervisors do hereby request the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium Commission to earnestly consider the needs of Southeastern Michigan for a State Tuberculosis Sanatorium and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the County Board of Supervisors consider that the logical place for such an institution be in northern Macomb County and be it further

With a mixture of pride and chagrin we offer this summation of the accomplishments of this Commission for the year 1950. Pride in what has been accomplished and somewhat chagrined by the fact that there is so much that should have been done that our present facilities have been unable to cope with. We do, however, wish to point out that in 1950 over 185,000 cubic yards of gravel were placed on various county roads — an increase of 10,000 cubic yards over 1949. This increase is due primarily to the cooperation displayed by the various Supervisors in paying for hired trucks, which has shown considerable results during this Spring's breakup, for without that help a far greater mileage of road would have been impassable.

One consideration must not be overlooked in our large regraveling program - that being the depletion of the gravel sources in Macomb County. Our primary sources are moving further and further to the North, which is increasing our haul on this material to a point where regraveling on even the minor traveled highways is becoming an economic problem, and considerable expense will be necessary to use more and more conservative materials, such as chlorides and road oils. In 1950 we used over 300,000 gallons of liquid chloride and 750,000 gallons of various types of bituminous materials for this purpose and as a means of dust alleviation. This large amount was again possible by the cooperation of the various Supervisors. Over 24 miles of various types of bituminous resurfacing was accomplished by our forces.

Approximately 100 miles of road and outlet ditches were cleaned out. As a thought on the problems of drainage corrections, it is practically impossible for this organization to clean over 100 miles of ditches per year, and as there are over 2,600 miles of roadside ditches in this county, we have to use considerable judgment as to which ditches should have priority. During drainage operations our forces placed 5,600 linear feet of various sized culverts.

Under Federal Aid the grading and drainage structure contract on the Twenty-three Mile Road from Gratict Avenue to Romeo-Plank Road was completed at a cost of approximately \$80,000.00. The gravel-ing and shoulder work, being done by county forces, is 80% completed. This contract approximates \$32,000.00. The necessary bridge work involving widening of two large bridges and construction of one small bridge is anticipated for this Summer. On this program the Federal Government is obligated to pay one-half the entire cost.

Our program for 1951 hinges on three major developments. First, the restrictions being imposed because of the mobilization effort. From all appearances, highways are again going to be classified as expendable, as they were in 1942, even though our highway facilities are in worse shape than they were at the beginning of the last War. Second, the rapid industrial development in the Southern area, which may necessitate the marshaling of a large share of our resources in an effort to keep traffic moving in that area. And third, the ever-present spectre of rising costs and insufficient funds. It is becoming more and more difficult to obtain and hold labor because of our inability to compete with the rates now being paid by industry, even though one-half of our entire budget is used for labor payments.

However, the following projects are definite musts:

Bridges crossing Red Run at Dequindre, Mound and Ryan Roads (these with the cooperation of the U.S. Army Engineers and the Bureau of Public Roads).

Bridge crossing Romeo-Plank Road just North of Macomb Corners. (This bridge failed March 21, 1951 due to overload and careless driving.)

The three bridges on Twenty-three Mile Road.

The projects we would like to program are: Grading and drainage structures and gravel surfacing on Twenty-three Mile Road from Romeo-Plank Road to Van Dyke Avenue; Grading and resurfacing of Twenty-six Mile Road from Gratiot Avenue to the St. Clair County line; also, recapping of as great a mileage as is possible on primary county roads and bituminous surfacing on as large a basis as possible on secondary roads where the property owners and townships are willing to cooperate. It will be impossible to take care of all these requests, however, because of our limited facilities, and we question the willingness of the property owners to cooperate if the projects must be built on a contractual basis at increased cost.

It is our intent to use as much of our Federal Aid Secondary allocation as is possible in construction work, but we cannot slight necessary maintenance work on the primary county system because of the overloading of our facilities by construction projects on secondary roads.

We are indeed grateful for the cooperation this Commission has received from the various Supervisors and hope the same helpful attitude we have received will continue during 1951. With that kind of mutual helpfulness, a great deal can be accomplished, even in the face of adverse conditions.

Gentlemen:

A resolution of the Board of the Township of Ray relative to changing the course of the north branch of the Clinton River, north of the 29 Mile Road, where same runs through the property of Edward Job and requesting the County of Macomb to take action, has been referred to me for an opinion as to the authority of the County of Macomb in the premises.

I have examined the statutes relative to natural streams and water courses and have consulted with the Drain Department and reviewed the authority of the Drain Commissioner in the premises.

May 10, 1951.

Opinion - Ray Township, contid

I find no statutes giving the County Board of Supervisors any jurisdiction to alter or change the course of a natural stream. The County Board has some authority in certain cases over the building of bridges over navigable streams and in connection with the removal of obstructions from navigable streams.

On the basis of the facts stated in the Ray Township Board resolution, it is my opinion that the Macomb County Board of Supervisors does not have statutory authority to take the action requested.

The Drain Department would only have authority in the event that a petition to lay out a drainage district was presented to the Drain Commissioner and the district was assessed for the improvements petitioned for.

It would appear that any improvements made would be of benefit only to Mr. Job and that his property would in all probability constitute the drainage district and he would have to bear the entier expense of any improvement made by the Drain Commssioner.

To the Chairman and Members of the Macomb County Board of Supervisors:

The Budget Committee is pleased to submit herewith the recommended Budget for 1952.

The total budget is \$1,595,000.00 including \$821,510.65 set up for departmental operating. All salaries set in Budget for all County Departments are the maximum salaries to be governed by rules of classification system, and the minimum starting salary is to be \$1,800 per year. Increases to be at the rate of \$10.00 per month every six months until maximum of position is reached. Further recommendations of the Committee are as follows:

The Sheriff be allowed 40¢ for each meal furnished prisoners.

Traveling expenses of officials and employees be set at 7¢ per mile.

Mileage to be allowed for actual miles traveled on County business only. Bills are to be submitted in detail monthly on forms furnished by the County. This

provision applies to all departments except Car Allowance for the Sheriff.

That Defense Attorneys appointed by the Court be paid according to the following schedule:

On services and preparation of case

\$25.00 per day 12.50 half day 35.00 per day

17.50 half day

Each day in Court

That the Coroner be allowed the following fees:

Viewing the body \$5.00

Use of hearse for removal of body 10.00

Milegge - 10¢ per mile each way

Mileage - 10¢ per mile each way
Use of Morgue 5.00

The charge shall be made for the use of morgue only in cases where autopsies are performed: all charges made for the use of hearse shall be approved by the Prosecuting Attorney.

That the physician performing autopsies be paid as follows:

Autopsies \$35.00
Assistant operator 15.00
Postamortem 5.00

The bills for ambulance be allowed on the following basis:

Twenty-five cents per mile for the first 50 miles and 15 cents for each additional mile, \$6.00 for attendant when necessary.

That all departments be requested to make use of the rectigraph machine for copying records where at all possible. That all public records in the various departments be kept in the proper filing sequence.

All applications for employment for classified positions are to be submitted to the Classification Committee of the Budget Committee before the applicant is employed or transferred to another classification or position listed in the budget.

At a meeting of the Dog Committee held on November 19, 1951, the following members were present:

The Committee met to discuss ways and means of enforcing the collection of dog licenses for the coming year.

Motion by Weymouth supported by Clark that the Committee recommend to the Board that the Dog Warden be employed at a salary to be on the same basis as a deputy sheriff and the County furnish the necessary equipment. And further, that the Committee recommend that each Supervisor in those areas now serviced by the County, be asked to list all dogs according to the provisions of the dog law of 1919, as amended. Motion carried.

In discussing the procedure necessary to carry out the provisions of the Dog Law, plus the additional Ordinance recently passed by the Board of Supervisors requiring vaccinations of all dogs, the following plan was discussed and recommended. In order to secure a proper listing of the owners of all dogs, the Civil Counsel advised the Committee that it would be necessary to have a listing made as prescribed by Statute. He suggested, however, that it could be done by either the Supervisor or some individual appointed by him so act in his place. Under the statutes the County is obliged to pay 20% for each dog on the list. It was felt that for this fee it would be possible for each Supervisor to secure the assistance of some individual in his township to make the listing. After the list has been prepared, the names of those owners who have licensed their dogs are to be checked.off. The list is then submitted to the County Treasurer who in turn perpares a list to be submitted to

the Presecuting Atterney. The Presecutor is then to netify the owners of the dogs on the list, who have not secured a license to A certain length of time, to be prescribed later, could be given each person to secure such license. After that time a warrant can be issued. The Committee felt that if this procedure were followed, a greater percentage of those new owning dogs in the County would pay their dog tax and have their dogs vaccinated.

Three bids were submitted to the Committee for the construction of an office at the Dog Pound. Howard Tucker - \$2,530.50; Otto Maas -\$2,319.00; Fenton and Fenton - \$2300.00.
