A quorum being present, the meeting proceeded to transact business.

### RESOLUTION NO. 848

The Chairman asked the members of the Board to rise and observe a moment of silence in respect for Mr. Anthony Bitonti, Supervisor from East Detroit, who passed away on January 2, 1966. The Clerk read a Resolution wherein the Board of Supervisors express their heartfelt sorrow and sympathy to the widow and family of Mr. Bitonti. Motion was made by Stark, supported by Weymouth, that the Resolution be adopted and a suitable copy presented to Mrs. Anthony Bitonti. Ayes all - mays none. Motion carried and the Resolution was adopted.

The Chairman called upon Mayor William A. Shaw of Warren to introduce Mr. Harold H. Perry to the members of the Board. Mr. Perry is replacing Mr. Don Binkowski who resigned from the Board of Supervisors.

The Clerk read the Opinion submitted by Mr. Alfred A. Blomberg, Civil Counsel, regarding the petition to incorporate a portion of Shelby Township to the City of Utica. At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Blomberg explained that, in his opinion, the petition is contrary to the statutes of the State of Michigan and that the desired results could be obtained by consolidation, which would give the city and the unincorporated area an opportunity to vote to express their approval or disapproval. He added that the vote is the key to the invalidity of the petition and therefore, he recommended that the petition be denied. Motion was made by Valusek, supported by Beck, that the petition to incorporate a portion of Shelby Township to the City of Utica be denied and that no further action be taken in the matter. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried.

Copies of Resolutions adopted by Alcona County and Jackson County were received and referred to the Legislative Committee for study and a report back to the Board.

The Clerk read a letter received from the Southeast Michigan Tourist Association welcoming Mr. Carl A. Brandenburg as representative of Macomb County on their newly constituted Board of Directors.

#### MINUTES - DECEMBER 16, 1965

Each member had received a copy of the minutes of the meeting held on December 16, 1965 by mail, and the Chairman asked if there were any objections or corrections to them. There being none, a motion was made by Shaw, supported by C. Brandenburg, that the minutes be approved. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried.

The Clerk read excerpts of the minutes of a meeting of the Committee on Community Economic Opportunity held on December 29, 1965, wherein the Committee confirmed the appointment of Mr. John D. Anibal as Director and Mr. Richard S. Ellis as Deputy Director of the Economic Opportunity Program in Macomb County. At the December meeting of the Board of Supervisors, the approval of Mr. Richard S. Ellis as Deputy Director had been tabled. Motion was made by Merrelli, supported by Tomlinson, that the excerpts of the minutes of the meeting be received and filed and that the Board approve the appointment of Richard S. Ellis as Deputy Director of the Economic Opportunity Program in Macomb County. Ayes all - mays none. Motion carried.

The Clerk read a letter received from Mr. Irving J. Rubin, Director of the Detroit Regional Transportation and Land Use Study, requesting that two persons be selected to represent MacombCounty on the Policy Committee. Motion was made by G. Jackson, supported by Armstrong, that the letter be received and filed and the Chairman appoint the two members to this committee. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried.

The Chairman called upon Father Arthur H. Krawczak to introduce Mr. John D. Anibal, Director of the Macomb Action Program, to the members of the Board. Mr. Annibal stated that he had studied the Program and feels that it is a wonderful opportunity for the County. He added that he would appreciate any help he might receive and would do his best for this Program. The Chairman stated that the Director's Office will be located on the 10th floor of the County Building and that he would be happy to work along with him.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETINGS - DECEMBER 10 and 28, 1965

#### PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING - DECEMBER 15, 1965

The Clerk read the report of the Planning Committee meeting held on December 15, 1965 and motion was made by Scheets, supported by Franchuk, that the committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ayes all - mays none. Motion carried and the committee report follows:

At a meeting held on Wednesday, December 15, 1965, the following members were present:

The Committee met in joint session with the Planning Commission.

The Building Committee referred to the Planning Committee and Planning Commission the question of providing space for two additional circuit courtrooms, January 1, 1967.

After a discussion, it was recommended that it might be advisable to utilize the Building Needs Study prepared under the 701 Program. This recommends that the Friend of the Court office be located in the new proposed building. Therefore the most effective way to utilize the present facilities with the least amount of trouble and expense would be to move the Friend of the Court to temporary quarters. Additional space, if needed, could be acquired by relocating the offices of the Board of Education. These recommendations will be submitted to the Building Committee.

The request of the Airport Committee that the Planning Committee and Planning Commission review a possible location of an airport in the County was discussed. No definite action was taken.

Acting Director, Giampetroni, presented a progress report of the 701 Program. The local contributions as specified in the original program are now current.

The recent report of the school census, including total population of the County was given to the Committee. The 1965 population, according to this report, is 519,468. An increase of 26,653 over 1964.

The following recommendation is made to the Board:

Recommendation was made by the Planning Commission and concurred in and approved by the Supervisors' Planning Committee, that Mr. Bernard E. Giampetroni's classification be changed from Acting Director to Director of the Planning Commission. The recommendation was unanimously approved by both the Planning Commission and the Planning Committee sitting in joint session.

#### BUILDING COMMITTEE MEETINGS - DECEMBER 20 and 29, 1965

The Clerk read the report of the Building Committee meetings held on December 20th and 29th, 1965, and motion was made by Wulf, supported by Flanagan, that the report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ayes all - mays none. Motion carried and the committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Building Committee held on December 20, 1965, the following members were present:

Zaccola-Chairman, R. Brandenburg, Weymouth, Rowley, C. Brandenburg, Armstrong, Clark, Wulf, Cardamone and Bade.

The Committee met to continue their interview with architects, one to be selected to design the proposed building adjacent to the present County Building. A report will be made to the Board at a later date covering interviews of architects.

COMMITTEE ACTION: The Committee authorized the transfer of two trucks to the County Maintenance Department, that have been in the past used by the Social Welfare Department. These trucks were purchased with County funds for the Welfare Department.

A request was received from Father Heenan for the sale of four hundred feet frontage on Dunham Road, as an extension to the catholic cemetery. This was referred to the Planning Committee.

A motion was made by Wulf, supported by Bade, that the Committee authorize the payment of \$6,906.80 as the balance of the 35% estimated cost of laundry and boiler room. Motion carried.

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At a meeting of the Building Committee held on December 29, 1965, the following members were present:

Zaccola-Chairman, R. Brandenburg, Weymouth, Rowley, C. Brandenburg, Armstrong, Clark, Wulf, Mrs. Vlaich, Cardamone, Bade and Bonior.

A letter was received from the Social Welfare Department asking that Mr. Raymond Hafeli be allowed to continue his lease of approximately two acres of land on county property. This is being used at the present time for the evergreen plantings and is not needed by the County.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Ray Brandenburg, supported by Cardamone, that the committee recommend that the Social Welfare Department be authorized to enter into a lease with Mr. Hafeli for the property occupied by him at the present time. Lease price One Hundred Twenty (\$120.00) Dollars per year. Motion carried.

This is the amount now being paid by Mr. Hafeli.

The Controller recommended the purchase of a No. 395 N.C.R. bookkeeping machine to be used in the Controller's Office to replace present equipment. Present equipment will be transferred to other work in the department to replace older equipment. The basic cost of the machine is \$17,200.00, to which at a later date will be added data processing card punching equipment.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Armstrong, supported by Cardamone, that the committee recommend to the Board the Controller be authorized to purchase the equipment as outlined. Purchase price to be paid from the furniture and equipment appropriation now in the budget. Motion carried.

The Committee have been requested to allocate space for the Economic Opportunity Office which will be considered a part of matching funds from the County, and also the relocation of the Civil Defense Department will enable the Friend of the Court to use all of the 12th floor. The Committee visited the 10th floor of the County Building.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Bade, supported by C. Brandenburg, that the Civil Defense Department be moved from the 12th floor to the south end of the 10th floor corridor, the Legislative Research Liaison Agent be put in to the office at the north end of the corridor and the two offices on the west end to be used for the offices of Economic Opportunity. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Clark, supported by Bade, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

### BUILDING COMMITTEE MEETING - JANUARY 3, 1966

The Clerk read the report of the Building Committee meeting held on January 3, 1966 and motion was made by Blahnik, supported by Nowakowski, that the report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. After some discussion concerning full emergency power for the Martha T. Berry Hospital, a voice vote was taken. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried and the committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Building Committee held on January 3, 1966, the following members were present:

Zaccola-Chairman, R. Brandenburg, Rowley, C. Brandenburg, Armstrong, Clark, Wulf, Mrs. Vlaich, Cardemone, Bade and Bonior.

The request was made to the Committee that additional shelving be installed in the Welfare-Library Building for the use of the County Library. After a discussion covering the space requirements,

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Armstrong, supported by Wulf, that further shelving at the County Idbrary be held up, pending a report from the Special Study Committee of the Building Committee appointed to review the space situation at the Idbrary. Motion carried.

Mr. Jones and Mr. Carpenter, of Harley, Ellington, Cowin and Stirton, Architects, met with the Committee to discuss further plans for the laundry and boiler room. The Committee was advised that the office of the Hospital Survey in Lansing has approved the plans as submitted by the architect. Written approval should be received by them within the next few days. They will then proceed to prepare the working drawings which are to be completed not later than February 21, 1966.

The question has arisen regarding the equipping of the hospital with emergency electric power. The Lansing Office has indicated a concern over the lack of emergency power for the hospital and they have recommended that this be included in the present project.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Rowley, supported by Ray Brandenburg, that the Committee recommend to the Board that full emergency power for the Martha Berry Hospital be authorized, provided additional funds are made available by the Office of Hospital and Survey from the Hill-Burton Fund, and that the Architect be advised to proceed with the drawings. Motion carried.

The additional cost of the emergency power has been estimated at \$85,000.00. This will supply power for all of the outlets in the present building and a 100 bed addition to the present hospital, if and when constructed.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

# LEGISLATIVE & REAPPORTIONMENT COMMITTEES MEETING - DECEMBER 22, 1965

The Clerk read the report of the joint meeting of the Legislative Committee and the Reapportionment Committee held on December 22, 1965. Motion was made by Flanagan, supported by Bade, that the report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Mr. Steffens questioned Mr. C. Brandenburg in regard to his request for some relief from the County in maintaining private roads in his Township. At the request of the Chairman, Mr. Blomberg, Civil Counsel, explained that such roads are basically private driveways and that legislature would be needed to give townships any relief. On voice vote there were all ayes and no mays. Motion carried and the committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Legislative and Reapportionment Committees held on December 22, 1965, the following members were present:

Legislative Committee: Mrs. Stark-Chairman, Daner, Flanagan, Wulf, Franchuk, Mrs. Lunt, Pugh and Bonior.

Reapportionment Comm.: Inwood, Mrs. Stark and Garwood.

Mrs. Stark stated that the Reapportionment Committee members had been invited to attend to discuss pending legislation. The joint Committee reviewed briefly the questionnaire furnished by the State Legislative Committee, who are making a study of proposed legislation. It was decided that no definite action would be taken at this particular time.

The Legislative Committee continued with its meeting.

Mr. Roberts, Chairman of the Lake Hazards Committee, appeared before the Committee to discuss a problem that was referred to the Legislative Committee by the Lake Hazards Committee. This is the question of legislation setting the requirements, standards and controls for sanitary retention tanks to be installed in pleasure boats.

He has been advised that the State Health Department will introduce legislation covering this subject and it should be reviewed at a later date to determine whether or not this county will support the bill.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Daner, supported by Flanagan, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the State Health Department be notified that Macomb County is in favor of legislation requiring retention tanks in private pleasure boats for sanitary purposes. Motion carried.

All department heads were notified of this meeting and asked to submit any proposed legislation that might be of interest to their department.

The Sheriff's Committee submitted a request that the County again go on record approving the return of additional fees to the local departments to offset the cost of operating the Driver License Bureau.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Franchuk, supported by Flanagan, that the Committee recommend that a bill be introduced in the Legislature to increase the return of the driver license fee to the Sheriff's Department. Said additional fee be sufficient to cover the present cost of operating Driver License Division. Motion carried.

The Sheriff was asked to appear before the Committee at the next meeting with an estimated cost of operating the Driver License Bureau.

A request received from the County Road Commission was discussed. This would cover legislation to enable the County to equalize the salaries of the three Road Commissioners.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Franchuk, supported by Mrs. Lunt, that the question be referred to the Civil Counsel to determine whether or not such a procedure could be established legally. Motion carried.

The Board of Supervisors at the last meeting, referred to this Committee a letter received from Mr. Carl Brandenburg, Supervisor of Chesterfield Township. This letter asked for some relief through legislation if necessary, to enable the County Road Commission to maintain private roads in a township.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Wulf, supported by Flanagan, that the request be tabled pending further legal clarification. Civil Counsel is asked to review the request and report back to the Committee. Motion carried.

Mr. Bernier, Director of the Equalization Department, in a letter reviewed the inequities that are now existing in the procedures for the assessing of real and personal property. He advised the Committee that there is a possibility of some legislation being introduced, as a result of the recent meeting with the House Taxation Committee of the State Legislature. The Committee will meet with Mr. Bernier at a later date to discuss the legislation in question.

A letter was received from Mr. Prescott, County Extension Agriculture Agent, urging the Committee to support the request of the Extension Division of the Michigan State University for an increase in the budget. It was suggested that this matter be reviewed by the Agriculture Committee of the Board.

The Committee discussed briefly the question of County Home Rule. It was pointed out by the Chairman that Senate Bill 112 may again be introduced as is, or with several amendments. The Board of Supervisors previously went on record approving County Home Rule in principal and the Committee authorized the Chairman to appear at a hearing last October, at which time Senate Bill 112 was discussed. This bill was also approved by the Committee in principal.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Wulf, supported by Pugh, that the Committee renew their previous action in supporting Senate Bill 112. Motion carried.

At the last session of the Legislature, Macomb County introduced a bill that would increase the fee for opening the safety deposit boxes to \$10.00 plus mileage. It was agreed that this legislation would again be introduced in the 1966 session.

A letter received from the Macomb County Road Commission dated December 16, 1965, was read to the Committee. This letter, proposing three items for study:

- 1. That the County support the new revenue package bill that is to be submitted to the Legislature, which would provide additional funds for the Macomb County Road Commission.
- 2. That legislation be introduced to enable the County to close out an existing fund of approximately \$40,000.00 on hand since 1929 for the reimbursement to property owners for tax road assessments paid in full.
- That certain lands that have previously been dedicated for public use be sold by the Road Commission, where they have determined the land will not be used for road purposes.

After a brief review,

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Franchuk, supported by Mrs. Lunt, that the Committee recommend that the Road Commission have their legal staff draft the proper legislation that might be required and submit it to this Committee, and further that the Committee be advised as to what additional revenue would be forthcoming to the County from the item contained in the first paragraph. Motion carried.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Flanagan, supported by Pugh, that in the future if any legislation is to be submitted to the Committee, if possible, the department head involved appear in person with a written statement setting forth the reasons and benefits that might be derived from said legislation. Motion carried.

The Controller was asked to notify the City of Warren that the Committee would assist if they were interested in presenting legislation again regarding mobile homes and dog kennels. The 1965 session had Senate Bill 159 regarding the license of dog kennels which was retained in Committee, and House Bill 2183 of Mobile Home Taxation Bill likewise being retained in the House Committee on the general taxation.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

### LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE MEETING - JANUARY 7, 1966

The Clerk read the report of the Legislative Committee meeting held on January 7, 1966. Motion was made by Cardamone, supported by Ryan, that the report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ayes all - mays none. Motion carried and the committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Legislative Committee held on January 7, 1966, the following members were present:

Stark-Chairman, Merrelli, Garland, Flanagan, Wulf, Franchuk, Mrs. Lunt, Pugh, Tallman and Bonior. Mr. Ray McPeters, Legislative Agent.

The Committee discussed the position of Legislative Research Liaison Co-Ordinator and reviewed the duties of this office, set forth in the Committee Minutes of October 21, 1965, which states as follows:

"The primary purpose is to co-ordinate federal programs with those carried on by County and

municipal governments and assist in securing Federal Funds where available. Become familiar with the necessary procedures for securing funds and become acquainted with the Congressmen, the various departments and offices in Washington and Chicago, to give any necessary assistance that might be required to the County Legislative Agents in Lansing."

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Mrs. Lunt, supported by Merrelli, that letters be sent to the State Legislators from this District in Lansing and also Congressmen and State Senators in Washington, advising them of the appointment of Mr. Cosmenco to this position. Motion carried.

a Motion was made by Mrs. Lunt, supported by Merrelli, that necessary travel expense for the Co-Ordinator be paid through the same procedure that is now in effect for all employees and officials of the County. Motion carried.

Mr. Cosmenco met with the Committee at this point and reviewed briefly some of his ideas that are to be carried out by him. He also reported on a meeting in Chicago on January 4, 1966, in which a program was outlined for advising people of the County the facilities that are available through Medicare.

Mr. McPeters and Mrs. Stark reviewed briefly with the Committee legislation that will be presented to the State Legislature in 1966. The following items will be considered as support legislation:

- Legislation requiring retention tanks on private pleasure crafts to be used for sanitary purposes. This legislation will be introduced by the State Health Department and was contained in the minutes of this Committee December 22, 1965.
- 2. Legislation to increase the return to the Sheriff's Department of the Driver License Fee. It is expected that legislation will be introduced by the Sheriff's Association covering this item. If not, Macomb County intends to do so. This was also included in the Legislative Committee Report of December 22, 1965.
- 3. County Home Rule. This is contained in Senate Bill No. 112, that was approved in principal by the Board in 1965.
- 4. Boundary Annexation Bill. This is House Bill No. 2069, that was previously reported to the Board and introduced last year but not approved. The legislation will be reintroduced in 1966.

The following bills were prepared and introduced by Macomb County in the 1965 Session, previously been approved by the Board of Supervisors but will be re-submitted:

- 1. Senate Bill No. 147, increases the fee for opening the safety deposit box by the County Treasurer to Ten dollars (\$10.00).
- 2. Senate Bill No. 159, a bill to authorize the Cities to license Dog Kennels.
- 3. House Bill No. 2183, Mobile Homes under certain circumstances to be assessed as real property rather than a monthly tax as at present.
- 4. House Bill No. 2243, permits the publication of Supervisor Proceedings in summary form.
- Senate Bill No. 287, corrects the definition in the statute of a County Employee. There has been some confusion regarding this in the past.
- House Bill No. 2239, deeds for property purchased by governmental units that are tax exempt, should be recorded in the year of acquisition.

The following is new legislation that will be prepared and submitted at a later date:

- 1. A bill that will require the approval of a local unit of government for school site planning.
- Increase the reimbursements to the Sheriff's Department for the conveyance of prisoners to the State Prison.
- 3. A possible increase in the court fees collected by the County Clerk's Office, to coincide with those now collected by Wayne and Oakland Counties.

Mr. Tallman presented two resolutions to the Committee that have been approved by the City of Warren. Legislation was introduced in the 1965 Legislature covering one of these resolutions.

One resolution recommends that the Act be amended to provide a rebate of the total amount of tax revenue lost by any local taxing unit.

The second resolution recommends a better definition of "cash value".

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Tallman, supported by Mrs. Lunt, that the Committee recommend approval of the resolutions and that further they be submitted to the State Association of Supervisors Resolution Committee. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

# HEALTH COMMITTEE AND HEALTH BOARD MEETING - DECEMBER 30, 1965

The Clerk read the report of the joint meeting of the Health Committee and the Health Board held on December 30, 1965. After some discussion regarding the use of Federal Funds to employ a Health Educator, motion was made by Buss, supported by Schoof, that that portion of the committee report be referred back to the Personnel Committee for further study. Act 342 provides that the Board of Supervisors may appoint as their agent either the Drain Commissioner or the three Road Commissioners. All of their projects and actions must then be approved by the Board of Supervisors before they become effective. Under this Act, the Agent may handle water, sewer and solid waste disposal.

Under Act 185 the Board of Supervisors may select the County Road Commission as its Agent or it may appoint a Board of three, five or seven members. One member of the Board shall be the County Drain Commissioner. After the Board is appointed, they will act as an independent Board and may employ their own director and other employees. Under the provisions of Act 185, the Board may act only on water and sewer problems.

After some discussion,

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Evans, supported by C. Brandenburg, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the County establish a department under the provisions of Act 342 of the Public Acts of 1939, and further that the Drain Commissioner be designated as the County Agent as provided in Section 3 of the Act. Resolutions have been submitted by several counties recommending support for certain legislation. The following counties submitted similar resolutions.

Ingham, Jackson, Hillsdale and Genesee Counties. This resolution opposes any change in the present method of filing liens, security agreements and financial statements.

At the present time, these documents are filed with the Register of Deeds' Office. Legislation is to be introduced changing this to the Secretary of State's Office. Register of Deeds department reported to the committee that during 1965, 65,805 documents were filed for which a fee under the Statute of One Dollar each is charged. It is estimated that the total cost to the County is approximately \$15,000.00 for direct expense.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Merrelli, supported by Flanagan, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the County oppose any legislation that would permit any change in the present method of filing these documents. Motion carried.

A resolution received from Cheboygan County in which they are supporting the recommendation that a State Tax Court of Appeals be established.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Merrelli, supported by Flanagan, that the Committee recommend to the Board that they support the principal contained in the resolution. Motion carried.

A resolution from Livingston County. This resolution is asking for support to House Bill No. 2664, which would permit the taxing of property transfers after January 1, 1967, on which date the present federal tax stamps on deeds will be abolished. During 1965, there were approximately Fifty Thousand (\$50,000.) Dollars of Federal Stamps used in the Register of Deeds' Office.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Tallman, supported by Mrs. Lunt, that the Committee recommend that the Board support the resolution providing the legislation allows the County to keep the full amount collected. Motion carried.

A resolution from Hillsdale County asking for support of legislation to increase the trailer fees from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per month. The Committee agreed that this resolution should be received and filed because Macomb County are sponsoring a bill that would place the trailers on the tax roll.

A resolution received from Goebic County recommends that property commonly known as mineral rights should be subject to the same taxation as real property.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Evans, supported by Franchuk, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the County support this resolution. Motion carried.

Two resolutions were received from Alcona County recommending legislation governing the hunting of antierless deer and the time of the deer season. The second resolution deals with the problem of mineral rights.

Judge Castellucci reported to the Juvenile Committee at a recent meeting, several items of legislation that would affect the operation of his Court and matching funds for the operation of the Youth Home. Because of the fact that full information was not available at this meeting.

At a meeting of the Legislative Committee held on February 23, 1966, the following committee members were present:

Stark-Chairman, Garland, Flanagan, Wulf, Franchuk, Evans, Mrs. Lunt, Shampo, Pugh, Tallman and Bonior. Mr. McPeters and Mr. Cosmenco were also present.

Mr. McPeters explained to the committee House Bill No. 2774, apportionment of Supervisors which is on the floor of the House and was to be acted on within the next few days.

Mrs. Stark explained that this meeting was called so that the Legislative Committee could review the bill and take some action as soon as possible.

After considerable discussion on the matter,

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Wulf, supported by Flanagan, that House Bill No. 2774 be opposed by the committee for the following reasons and that copies be sent to the Representatives from Macomb County and the Chairman of the House Committee. Motion carried.

Following are the reasons why the committee is opposed to the Bill:

- 1. Because of the present constitutional provisions, it would appear the Bill would be against the concept of one man, one vote.
- 2. Sec. 7 of the Constitution provides that each Township Supervisor shall be a member of the County Board. The proposed bill cannot change the Constitution, it does however, change the method of selecting City representatives on the Board. Under provision of House Bill No. 2774, a Township would either be a whole district or part of one, thus having a Supervisor elected by the Township and also one from the district. The City as a municipality would have no direct representative.
- 3. There should be representation from each unit in the government in keeping with the Home Rule provisions of City Charters as well as representation based on population. It is further believed that the units of government should determine the method of selection of their representatives on the Board.
- 4. That it be mandatory that a new census be taken in the entire county if apportionment is to be on the basis of one man, one vote.
- 5. That the County Apportionment Committee should consist instead of the Clerk, Treasurer and Prosecutor, of the Chairman of the Board of Supervisors or some individual designated by him, One (1) member selected by the Township governing bodies, one (1) member selected by the City governing bodies and two (2) to be selected by the Senior Probate Judge. This would give a five (5) man Apportionment Committee instead of three (3), and the requirements that at least three (3) would have to vote in order to provide a majority.

The Committee set the date of Wednesday, March 3rd, to meet with our County Legislators in Lansing.

A resolution received from Clinton County, dealing with the Milk Program and School Lunch Program now subsidized by the Federal Government was read. According to the resolution, legislation is now being proposed in Washington to reduce this subsidy.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Shampo, supported by Evans, that the Committee recommend to the Board the approval of a similar resolution. Motion carried.

Several additional matters of legislation were discussed briefly, but no action was taken due to the fact the definite bills were not presented. The Committee will review these at a later date.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

### BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETING - MARCH 15, 1966

The Clerk read the report of the Budget Committee meeting held on March 15, 1966 and motion was made by Haggerty, supported by R. Brandenburg, that the report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried and the committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Budget Committee held on March 15, 1966, the following committee members were present:

Beaubien-Chairman, Levine, Back, Inwood, Buss, Shaw, Okros, Zacharzewski, Ryan, Underwood and Bonion.

The Committee met to review items recommended by the Personnel Committee and the requests of several departments.

The Committee reviewed a request made by Mr. Slemmer, County Librarian for changes in some of his personnel. The total budget for the Library will not be changed.

Following are the items approved and recommended by the Committee:

Approved the classification change for Mrs. May, now listed as Librarian Assistant III to General Clerk IV. Salary of Five thousand forty-five (\$5,045.00) Dollars minimum to Five thousand eight hundred eighty (\$5,880.00) Dollars maximum. This will replace the position of Librarian I in the budget, salary \$6,268.00 to \$7,372.00.

Authorized the employment of a Librarian Assistant as a Cataloger on a temporary basis. Present salary \$5,768.00. Employees receive an additional \$500.00 while temporarily occupying the position.

Approved the employment of a new Cataloger at a salary of \$7,320.00. This item is in the budget at a salary of \$6,820.00 to \$7,923.00.

These recommendations were approved by the Committee due to the inability of the Librarian to secure proper professional help.

Recommendation of the Personnel Committee:

The Committee approved and are recommending a salary for the Director of the Alcoholism Information Service in the Health Department be increased from the maximum of Seven thousand Three hundred eight (\$7,308.00) Dollars to Seven thousand six hundred forty-five (\$7,645.00) Dollars. This was requested by Dr. Stryker at the time the budget was prepared in October. No additional funds will be required in the budget of the Health Department.

The Committee approved the recommendation that the Assistant Ambulance Driver in the Medical Facility be adjusted from \$4,750.00 to \$5,200.00.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Inwood, supported by Zacharzewski, that the Committee recommend that the salary of the Assistant Ambulance Driver be increased from a maximum of \$4,750.00 to a maximum of \$5,200.00. Motion carried.

The Personnel Committee further recommended a change in the procedures to be followed for the payment of hospitalization insurance for employees. It was brought to their attention that in several instances, employees while on sick leave had used all of their sick leave credit and were therefore off the payroll. The question is whether or not the employees should be continued on the hospitalization program.

The Budget Committee approved the following recommendations of the Personnel Committee:

Full payment of hospitalization insurance be continued providing the employee files a doctor's statement and provided the illness is not due to pregnancy.

Payment can be continued for a period of three months on approval of the Personnel Committee. After the first three months, the Committee may, after a review, approve continuation of the payment for an additional 3 months but for a period not to exceed six months in total.

Any time during this period, the Personnel Committee may require an employee to submit to an examination by a doctor to be designated by the Health Committee. If the employee refuses, the insurance will be discontinued.

The medical fee will be paid by the County and a proper notice is to be given to the employee if the insurance is not to be continued.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Back, supported by Underwood, that the Committee recommend that hospitalization payments be made on the basis of the above provisions as recommended by the Personnel Committee. Motion carried.

The Budget Committee also went on record requesting that the Personnel Committee review the following benefit programs:

Sick and annual leave policy, Overtime pay policy, Definition of part-time and temporary employees, Life insurance for retirees, Hospitalization for retirees.

The findings are to be reported back to the Budget Committee.

# LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE MEETING - March 16, 1966

Tallman explained that our Legislators have worked hard and long to get House Bill 3327, Straight Line Depreciation Bill, to the Governor's desk and that he feels that the Board should support them regarding this Bill. After some discussion, motion was made by Franchuk, supported by C. Brandenburg, that the Macomb County Legislators be commended for their diligent work and the Board send a telegram to the Governor urging him to sign the Bill. Ayes all - mays none. Motion carried.

After same discussion regarding House Bill 2774, Apportionment of Boards of County Supervisors, Mrs. Stark explained the amendments to this Bill that Rep. Harold Clark had worked for so hard. Mr. Quinton Buss suggested that a letter be sent to Mr. Harold Clark thanking him for his help in this matter.

Motion was made by Gonzalez, supported by Flanagan, that the Legislative Committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried and the Committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Legislative Committee held on March 16, 1966, the following members were present:

Mr. Cosmenco presented to the Committee a written report of some of his activities regarding government grants. The Committee discussed these grants with Mr. Cosmenco.

A request was made that a representative be sent to the National Legislation Conference to be held in Washington, D. C., March 29th, 30th and 31st.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Franchuk, supported by Tallman that the Committee authorize the Chairman of the Board Bonior and Mr. Cosmenco to attend this conference at the expense of the County. Motion carried.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Shampo, supported by Wulf, that the Committee recommend to the Board that it oppose House Bill No. 2774 as amended by the House on March 10th, and passed on March 15th. Motion carried.

This is the apportionment bill for the Board of Supervisors.

The Committee discussed the following bills:

- S.B. 221: Juror Fees. The Chairman reported this bill sets a \$15.00 per diem. She has made a request that this be reduced to \$12.00. The Committee approved this action.
- H.B. 3136: Permits the increase of salaries of elective officials during term of office.
- H.B. 3500: Requires Community Planners to be registered planners.
- S.B. 838: Permits the licensing of hospitals under the direction of the State Health Department.
- S.B. 715: Authorizes the payment of hospital bills by the state for those who are not residents.

The Committee reviewed taxation legislation and the recommendation of the Equalization Committee.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Franchuk, supported by Flanagan, that the Committee approve the recommendation of the Equalization Committee and refer them to the Board of Supervisors. Motion carried.

Following are the taxation bills reviewed:

- S.B. 710: A Bill to amend Section 9, Public Acts 206, 1893. Personal Property exemptions Subdivision 10 - "that property used in agricultural operations".
  - Approved this bill but asked for a further definition of the word "property".
- S.B. 735: A Bill to amend Section 7, Public Acts 206, 1893. Veterans homestead exemptions. Provides for Civil or Mexican War Veterans. Changes amount from \$2,000.00 State Equalized to \$3,500.00 State Equalized. Defines war periods and provides for disability arising from police action or emergency in a Foreigh Country.

Approved.

S.B. 781: A Bill to amend Public Acts 206, 1893 by adding a new Section 22-A. Provides for the authority of the Supervisor or Assessor or authorized representative to examine books for personal assessment.

Approved.

- H.B. 3049: A Bill to amend Section 7, Public Acts 206, 1893. Provides an exemption to buildings owned and occupied by a non-profit trust and used for hospital, clinical or public health purposes.
  - Opposed this bill. (Decision reversed and Bill, with amendments, is recommended for approval by the Committee)
- H.B. 3066: A Bill to amend Public Acts 206, 1893 by adding a new Section 70. Provides for exemption of anti-water pollution devices.

Opposed the bill, unless the state guarantees full reimbursement to local communities.

H.B. 3070: Provides for the same exemption as provided in House Bill 3066 but defines installation dates applicable.

Opposed the Bill, unless the State guarantees full reimbursement to local communities.

H.B. 3105: A Bill to amend Section 9, Public Acts 206, 1893. This bill provides for an agricultural equipment exemption the same as provided in Senate Bill No. 710.

Approved the bill with a better definition of the word "property".

H.B. 3107: A Bill to amend Section 9, Public Acts 206, 1893. This bill provides for exemption of farm products held in storage by the grower.

Approved the bill if reimbursement is guaranteed by the State to the local communities.

H.B. 3116: A Bill to amend Public Acts 206, 1893 by adding a new Section 70. Provides for antiwater pollution devices. Similar to House Bill No. 3066.

Opposed the bill, unless the state guarantees full reimbursement to local communities.

A motion was made by Shampo, supported by Franchuk, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

The Committee met to discuss possible leasing of property to furnish space for the County Library and also space for offices to be moved from the County Building to allow room for the two new Circuit Judges who will take office on January 1, 1967.

The building previously occupied by the Wrigley Company at the corner of Clinton Street and the urban renewal property is available for lease. This building has been visited by members of the Committee. The total available space is approximately 11,500 square feet. The building at present is under lease to the Wrigley Company.

The Committee met with Mr. Rosenthal representing the Wrigley Company and Mr. Grosberg, representing the owners of the building. An offer previously made for leasing the building was discussed by the Committee. The Wrigley Company agreed to lease the building for the balance of their lease which is to October 30, 1968, for the sum of \$1,000.00 per month with the County assuming the responsibility of remodeling the building to suit their purpose. The owner agreed to lease the building for an additional five years for \$1,300.00 per month, with the possible provision of an option for an additional five years.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Wulf, supported by Cardamone, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the Committee be authorized to negotiate a lease properly prepared by the Civil Counsel for the Wrigley Building on the following basis:

The lease with the Wrigley Company to run to October 30, 1968 at \$1,000.00 per month commencing July 1, 1966, with possession to be taken by the County as soon as the lease is signed, and further, that a concurrent lease be authorized for a five year additional period at \$1,300.00 per month, with an option to renew for an additional five years.

It is understood that the heating and air conditioning system is to be put in proper operating condition. The operation of equipment is to be guaranteed for one air conditioning season and one heating season, that the present plumbing and electrical fixtures are also to be put in operating condition.

Motion carried.

The Committee met with Mr. Slemmer, County Librarian, to discuss the moving of the Library to the Wrigley Building if the lease is properly executed and agreed that he would be given the entire building.

The Committee previously agreed that the most practical floors to use for court rooms would be the 4th and 10th floors. This would entail the moving of the Intermediate School Office and Special Education, the Equalization Department, Office of Economic Opportunity and Civil Defense.

The Controller was instructed to review the moving of the Intermediate School Office and Special Education to the basement of the Probate-Juvenile Building. The Committee is to be furnished the cost necessary to outfit the basement of this building in condition to be used for offices.

Action will be taken later on space to be allocated to the Equalization Department.

## PROGRESS REPORT - ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY - April 25, 1966

The Clerk read the report as follows:

Purpose: To effect a permanent increase in the capacity of individuals, groups and communities afflicted by poverty to deal effectively with their own problems so that they need no further assistance.

Medicare Alert: Under the direction of Walter Kimmerly (former Supt. of Police of Roseville) and at a cost of approximately \$8,000., 42 workers and volunteers canvassed parts of Macomb County which were designated by Social Security Administration officials. 14,260 homes were visited and 2,723 elderly persons were contacted for the purpose of making them aware of Medicare. 116 were found who had received applications for Medicare but for some reason had not returned them. 78 not on Social Security were referred for Medicare.

Side Benefits: Some workers took it upon themselves to inform the elderly of their benefits under the Michigan Homestead Tax Exemption Iaw. Many of the elderly expressed their gratitude that someone cared enough to come to visit them. In one case a Medicare Alert worker found an elderly couple (husband bed-ridden, wife blind) who were living in a condemned house. The worker arranged to move the couple in with their relatives and brought the case to the attention of the Department of Social Welfare. 27 cases requiring some type of additional help were reported to some agency. Needs of the aged as housing, medical services, home making service and someone to visit with were found.

Headstart: A proposal is in Chicago waiting for approval. The amount asked is \$148,688 of which the local share is \$23,040. This will provide services for 540 children from poverty families who will get a special program of two months duration this summer prior to entering kindergarten in the fall. Eighteen centers to serve these children will be located around the county.

Chester Stobinski, a counselor and Director of Adult Education of Roseville, is assisting in the preparations. He had charge of the Head Start Program for Roseville last summer.

Survey Interviews: At present ten resident interviewers under the direction of Walter Kimmerly are starting to conduct detailed interviews with residents of six areas of the county which appear to be the areas of greatest need. The information gained from these interviews will be used to help set up programs for fighting the War on Poverty.

Community Action Centers: A proposal is in Chicago waiting for approval. The amount asked is \$430,468 of which the local share is \$51,305. This proposal will set up six centers throughout the county (Mt. Clemens, Quinn Roads, South Warren, Roseville, Romeo and New Haven). Each Center will offer services designed to help make those in poverty economically independent. Services include employment counseling and job placement, job training, vocational rehabilitation, home management, health, family and guidance counseling, legal services and aid to communities regarding other federal programs dealing with poverty. Local residents of the areas to be served will be employed by the Centers as much as is possible.

It is hoped that this program will reach out to those who have not been serviced by other local or national programs.

Furniture for this program was obtained at no cost as surplus personal property from Selfridge Field and is presently being stored by the City of Roseville.

Legal Services: A proposal is in Chicago waiting for approval. The amount asked is \$259,934 of which the local share is \$27,600. This proposal will set up a non-profit corporation which will supply legal services to those in poverty. The Macomb County Bar Association is working with us on this proposal.

Conduct and Administration: A proposal is in Chicago waiting for approval. The amount asked is \$97,004 of which the local share is \$9,830. This proposal sets up the administrative machinery necessary to administer the total county War on Poverty.

Length of Time of Proposals: All proposals under consideration in Chicago are for one year duration.

Local Contacts: In drawing up proposals, contact has been made with individuals, private and public agencies, churches, local citizens groups, local governing bodies, and organizations. The extent of involvement of these depend upon the nature of the proposal.

Information and local Contributions: The Macomb Action Program is available to inform persons or groups who wish to know more about what we are doing.

The Macomb Action Program is also available to discuss how local individuals or groups can contribute services or money which becomes part of the 10% local effort Macomb County has to supply in order to have an Anti-Poverty Program for the County.

Moved by Wulf and supported by Armstrong, to allocate necessary funds to implement a portion of the funds (\$10,000) as Macomb County's share. Roll call vote, ayes 53 - nays 0. Motion carried.

Petition of Romeo for the alteration of boundaries. Mr. Blomberg, legal counsel for the County of Macomb, stated that all documents were in order. Mr. Inwood stated that there was no opposition to the proposal. Moved by Inwood, supported by Schoof, to approve the change in boundaries. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried.

# AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE REPORT - April 18, 1966

The Clerk read the report as follows:

At a meeting of the Agriculture Committee held on Monday, April 18, 1966, the following members were present:

Rowley-Chairman, Clark, Koss, Franchuk, Valusek and Alsip.

The Committee met with Mr. Jack Prescott, County Extension Agriculture Agent: Mr. George Parsons, Field Service Representative of Michigan State University; Mr. Thomas Gough, Soil Conservation Representative in this district; Mr. Munns Caldwell, a member of Mr. Prescotts' staff.

Mr. Parsons discussed with the Committee a program that is going to be put into effect throughout the state, using agents to assist in the work of counties adjacent to them. As an example, the Dairy Agent working in St. Clair County will also come into Macomb and the Horticulture Agent working in Macomb will assist in St. Clair County. This program has been recommended by Michigan State University in order to broaden the work of the agents and create closer cooperation between the counties.

Mr. Gough reported to the Committee on the progress of the 701 Soil Testing Program, and also reported that there is a great need in the County for the study of drainage necessary in parts of the county in which it is now very inadequate. Better drainage would enable certain areas to produce more and better crops.

The Committee authorized the appointment of a representative on a special committee to work with Mr. Gough in the study of the drainage problem.

Mr. Prescott reported to the Committee on a proposed "Operation Helping Hand", which is to be a pilot project set up in the county, financed by Michigan State University to determine the possibility of securing manpower to assist the people in agriculture. Their plan is to put into the field as part of the local office, a coordinator for the summer months who will attempt to find work primarily for teenagers who may need employment.

The Committee agreed to select a member of its committee to act on a proposed Manpower Committee. Mr. Franchuk, Lenox Township Supervisor, wasselected.

Mr. Prescott presented to the Committee a request by Michigan State University, that Macomb cooperate in a student work-study program for the summer months. The cost to the County will be \$65.00, which covers \$.12½ per hour of the salary to be paid to the student. Michigan State University will pay the balance of the salary. The student will work with the agents in the Macomb Office and he must be one who has been accepted for admittance to Michigan State University in the field of agriculture.

Committee Recommendation: A motion was made by Clark, supported by Franchuk, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the County enter into an agreement with Michigan State University to establish the student work-study program at a cost to the County of \$65.00, and further that the Chairman of the Board and the County Clerk be authorized to sign an agreement with the University. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

As listed on the attached statement, the total proposed budget will be \$10,621,077.00. This will require in addition to the revenues as listed and estimated cash balance, a receipt from current taxes of \$8,827,071.00. This can be raised by a tax rate of \$5.19, based on the estimated state equalized valuation of \$1,790,299,562.00. A figure of 95% of current levy was used in this estimate.

Committee Recommendation: A motion was made by Zacharzevski, supported by Beck, that the Committee recommend to the Board a tentative budget of \$10,621,077.00 and it be presented to the Tax Allocation Board with the request of a levy of \$5.19. Motion carried.

This is the same tax rate that was allocated to the County for the current year.

Committee Action: The Committee approved the request of the Personnel Committee that all departments be informed to keep an accurate record of overtime for their employees. This information to be submitted later to the Personnel Committee.

The Committee authorized the purchase of a car to be used by the staff of the Controller's Office and the Maintenance Department. The cost will be covered by the current budget.

Total cost approximately \$40,000.00. This will equip the space to be suitable for use as offices.

#### DRAIN COMMITTEE and D.P.W. COMMITTEE MEETING - MAY 11, 1966

The Clerk read the report of the joint meeting of the Drain Committee and the D.P.W. Committee held on May 11, 1966. The Chairman directed the attention of the Board to the two recommendations made by the Committees and suggested that they discuss one at a time. Mr. Ben Giampetrone showed slides of the area involved and Mr. Welsh explained that by accepting in principle, the report of the National Sanitation Foundation on the Six County sewage and drainage system, it would put the cities and townships involved in a position to comply with a basic comprehensive plan to solve the pollution problem. Mr. Alfred Blomberg, Civil Counsel, explained what liabilities these communities might expect. After much discussion, motion was made by Armstrong, supported by Hill, that the report of the National Sanitation Foundation be accepted in concept and, on roll call vote, there were fifty-eight (58) ayes and no (0) nays. Motion carried.

Petitions were received from ten different communities requesting that the State Health Department remove the building ban on sewers. Mr. Welsh, Drain Commissioner, explained the need for a preliminary study of the situation stating that it would help to get ready to create an intercounty drainage district. He added that this would consolidate under one agency water, sewer and storm drains. After discussion, motion was made by C. Brandenburg, supported by Hill, that the Petitions be referred to Civil Counsel and the Drain Commission, the designated agency, and they be instructed to proceed with the Preliminary Study. On roll call vote there were fifty-six (56) ages and no (0) nays and the motion carried.

Mr. Welsh explained the cost of the Preliminary study and Mr. Blomberg read the Public Act relating to it. Motion was made by Crouchman, supported by Stark, that a revolving fund of \$50,000.00 be set up for administrative expenses. On roll call vote there were fifty-five (55) ayes and no (0) nays. Motion carried.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 865

The second recommendation contained in the report of the joint committee meeting was that the Board prepare and adopt a resolution urging the State Health Department to remove the building ban in the ten communities in Macomb County. After some discussion, motion was made by McPharlin, supported by Schmid, that the Committee recommendation relative to the ban be tabled until further information can be obtained. On roll call vote there were seven (7) ayes and forty-three (43) mays and the motion did not carry. Motion was made by Stark, supported by Beck, that the Committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted; that Civil Counsel be authorized to prepare the proper resolution seeking to lift the ban and that the Resolution be adopted and presented at the meeting with the Michigan Department of Public Health on June 1st. All ayes except a few mays and the Resolution was adopted. The Committee report follows:

In addition, Mr. Blomberg-Civil Counsel, Thomas Welsh-Drain Commissioner and Ben Giampetrone-Director of the Planning Commission spoke briefly to the group about the problems that have arisen within the county, brought about primarily because of the recent ban put on building in those communities in the county using the Clinton River as an outlet for their disposal plants.

The report prepared and submitted some time ago by the National Sanitation Foundation, covering a study of the Six County Area, was discussed at length. The primary provision in this study was that sewers should be constructed which would permit the taking of all sewage to Detroit.

Numerous individuals present from the various municipalities stressed the importance of some action that would relieve the ban on building and also take steps toward relieving the continued pollution of the Clinton River.

Mayor Shaw of Warren stated that after a meeting held in his city he has had contact with the State Health Department and they have agreed to meet in June in the county with the interested parties to discuss this problem further.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Evans, supported by Schroeder, that the Committee recommend to the Board that they accept in principle, the report of the National Sanitation Foundation on the Six County Sewage and Drainage System. Motion carried.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Nowakowski, supported by Beck, that the Committee recommend to the Board that a resolution be prepared urging the State Health Department to remove the building ban in the ten communities in Macomb County. Motion carried.

Mr. Welsh and Mr. Blomberg explained the procedures that could be used to relieve the problem through Act 342, recently adopted by the Board of Supervisors who have established a new agency to co-ordinate the development of projects within the various communities.

Motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

# FINANCE COMMITTEE MEETING - MAY 12, 1966

The Committee met to examine the semi-monthly bills.

A request had previously been made by Glen Eden Hospital that the County increase the rate for hospital care from \$13.00 to \$17.00 per day per patient and further that an allowance of \$5.00 a day be made to the doctors for each patient in the institution. The Committee had asked that a representative from the hospital appear to discuss this matter.

Dr. Goldin, representing Glen Eden, Judge Donald Parent, Probate Judge, and Dr. Stryker met with the Committee. Dr. Goldin explained to the Committee the type of service that could be performed at the hospital. He stated that he felt if the County would agree to pay this daily doctor fee, it would enable them to have treatment given to all the patients that are now in the hospital, as county charges. Such treatment should be of great assistance to the patient and in some cases shorten their stay in the institution. He also stressed the fact that it is very important to have the psychiatrist make plans for the care of the patient after they leave the hospital and this must be done, not only with the patient, but with the interested relatives.

At the present time only the extreme emergency cases are now receiving the attention of a doctor. The county is paying a separate medical fee. Based upon the number of patients in the hospital for the last six months, the requested doctors fee would amount to an additional cost of approximately \$29,000.00.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by McPharlin, supported by R. Brandenburg, that the Committee recommend to the Board that they approve the payment of \$5.00 per day for doctors fees for all patients at Glen Eden. Payment to be effective on the day after approval by the Board. Motion carried.

The Committee took no action on the request for increase in the hospital care from \$13.00 to \$17.00 per day, but are asking that a representative of the hospital appear before the committee at their next meeting to explain in detail the reasons for this requested increase.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by McPharlin, supported by Beaufait, that the bills amounting to \$199,833.91 be approved. Motion carried.

Dr. Stryker, Health Director; Merlin Damon, Sanitary Engineer and Frank Murphy of the Department met with the Committee. Dr. Stryker presented Mr. John Vogt who represented the State Health Department. Mr. Vogt discussed at length the reasons for the recent ban placed on the ten communities in Macomb County against the extension of sewer systems. He stated that under the new law, the Water Resources Commission had the responsibility to investigate and determine where there might be danger in a stream of future pollution, rather than waiting until pollution actually happens. Tests taken by his department of the Clinton River during part of the summer season indicated there is a lack of the correct amount of oxygen and at times none at all in the water and they have received numerous complaints from people living along the river.

Mr. Vogt listed the following procedures that could be followed to relieve the situation:

- 1. By improving the treatment in the existing plants, the contamination of the river could be greatly reduced but these new methods are extremely costly.
- 2. The communities, individually or collectively, could provide a better treatment than at present by removing primarily the phosphates that are now being deposited in the river. A sever could then be constructed, taking the affluent to the Detroit River below the Detroit City Water Intake.
- 3. The communities could by joining together, install equipment within their own plants that would make the water safe to be dumped into the Clinton River. This procedure would be extremely costly to the communities.
- 4. The recommendations of the National Sanitation Foundation Study which provides for the connecting of all sewer systems in Macomb to the Detroit System could be followed.
- 5. The possibility of devising a system with improved treatment and the removal of phosphates that would allow emptying the affluent from the county into Lake St. Clair.
- Mr. Damon brought to the attention of the committee and board, the problems now existing in many areas due to the soil not being suitable to take care of the affluent from the septic tanks.

Dr. Stryker and Mr. Damon were authorized to prepare an amendment to the existing regulations that would be discussed by the Committee at their next meeting.

The question of the testing of water in swimming pools used by members of a club was discussed. It was suggested that the Health Department, if requested, do the testing of the water but a reasonable fee should be paid for their services.

A motion was made by Flanagan, supported by Gonzalez, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

Mr. Welsh stated that the engineers would make use of the information prepared by the National Sanitation Foundation in its recent study of the sewage problem for the Six County Area.

Mr. Welsh also stated that he felt each community should appoint one or two representatives to act as an advisory committee to meet with him.

The architects have presented several plans to the Committee before a parking decision is to be made at a later date.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Armstrong, supported by R. Brandenburg, that the committee approve in concept the preliminary plans and further, they authorize payment to the architect of \$25,864.50 for the preliminary stage. This payment is in accordance with the contract. Motion carried.

The Committee authorized the planting of shrubs around the Probate-Juvenile Building at an estimated cost of \$915.00.

The Committee approved the payment to Harley, Ellington, Cowin & Stirton, Architects for the laundry and boiler room for Martha T. Berry Hospital of \$18,643.60. This represents a balance due on 75% of the architects fee, as per contract. Plans are now completed and bids have been taken.

The Committee authorized the purchase of a floor mopping machine to be used at the Probate-Juvenile Building at a cost of \$1,200.00.

At the Building Committee meeting of May 24, 1966, the committee recommended that the lease originally approved for renting of the Wrigley Building not be entered into. The Committee feels it is more feasibile at this time to construct a building with approximately 12,800 square feet that can, at a later date, be used for storage of records, general storage and a garage. This building would cost approximately the same amount that would be paid in rent for the Wrigley Building over a period of seven and one-half years.

The System is designed as a warning for a man made attack and also a weather warning. Lights and bells are installed in individual units and the warning is from one direct source. At the present time, this is the Detroit Police Department and it will be received by all individual installations. It is the hope of the State Civil Defense Department to have this as a complete metropolitan area warning system.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Roberts, supported by Beaufait, that the Committee recommend to the Board the adoption of the Bell and Light Warning System and that one installation be made in each community at the expense of the County, provided a fifty (50%) percent federal grant is approved. This meeting was called as a result of a letter addressed to the Board of Supervisors from Carl A. Brandenburg, Supervisor of Chesterfield Township, in which he suggested that the recently revised septic tank ordinance be reviewed by the Board. Mr. Brandenburg stated that he was fearful that if the ordinance is put into effect as interpreted, it would have an adverse effect on the building in his township, due to the fact that at the present time there is no sewage system available to builders in his area.

Several other township Supervisors outlined the problem they have been confronted with as a result of permitting extensive growth in areas without sewers. It was agreed in general however, that it is difficult to construct sewers prior to the people being located in the area so that there is sufficient income to pay for them.

Mr. Blomberg explained that in the past the Health Department, after determining that the soil is not sufficient to allow septic tanks because of no authority, were required to issue a building permit. Then at a later date when the individual found that they were having difficulty, the Health Department was criticized for issuing the permit. This is the primary reason for the new regulation, which will give the Health Department the authority to refuse to issue a permit if conditions do not warrant construction or use of a septic tank.

Representatives of the Health Department agreed that if their survey or examinations of conditions in a given area warranted a septic tank after certain improvements or changes were made, they would be very glad to recommend such changes and would in the future notify the township office of their recommendation. It was agreed that no change would be made in the new regulations.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Gonzalez, supported by Tomlinson, that the Health Department be asked to continue their cooperation to the fullest extent possible, under the existing regulations. Motion carried.

The Clerk read letters from the following candidates for the office of Road Commissioner: Ernest W. McCollom, Lowell A. Steffens and Milan (Mike) Matich. The Clerk also read a letter from Mr. Howard Canute requesting the Board to consider appointing him to a full term of office as member of the Social Welfare Commission.

The Clerk read a telegram from Congressman James G. O'Hara advising the Board that 1.5 million dollars has been reserved by the Housing and Urban Development Department to assist in the construction of storm sewers in Macomb County.

Mr. Welsh, County Drain Commissioner, appeared before the Board to discuss the problem of pollution of the Clinton River. He stressed the need for action by the State Government in allocating funds to match money that will be forthcoming from the Federal Government, when new legislation has been approved. At the present time, it is possible to secure up to 50% of the cost of a project from the Federal Government, providing the State will contribute 30% leaving 20% to be paid by the local community.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Flanagan, supported by Franchuk, that the Committee recommend to the Board that the County support or initiate legislation that will make the State compatible with the Federal action on water pollution. Motion carried.

## LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE MEETING - NOVEMBER 3, 1966

The Clerk read the recommendations made by the Legislative Committee at their meeting held on November 3, 1966. The Chairman called upon Mrs. Mildred Stark, Chairman of the Committee, who explained that this report represents the package for Macomb County for the next legislative session. Mr. Merrelli moved that the Finance Committee set up rules and regulations for the disposition of monies where the County must foot the bill for needy in the County. Motion was supported by Schroeder. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried. Motion was then made by Austin, supported by Perry, that the Legislative Committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried and the report follows:

At a meeting of the Legislative Committee held on Thursday, November 3, 1966, the following members were present:

Mrs. Stark-Chairman, Merrelli, Flanagan, Wulf, Franchuk, Evans, Mrs. Lunt, Pugh, Tallman and Bonior. Ray McPeters, Assistant Civil Counsel.

The Committee met to review proposed legislation for the 1967 Session. All department heads were advised that if they were interested in any legislation, it should be presented to the Committee not later than November 1, 1966.

The following proposed legislation was reviewed by the Committee for presentation to the Board of Supervisors, some of which was a part of the 1966 legislative program and other items are new.

- 1. Legislation recommended by the County Road Commission which would permit the transfer of funds now in the Covert Road Refund Accounts to the regular operating account. At the present time, the County Road Department has approximately \$42,000.00 in this category.
- Legislation correcting the procedures that must be followed by Road Commissions in the vacating of land previously purchased.
- 3. The suggested change in the formula for the distribution of gas and weight tax.

(The three items above will be introduced by the Good Roads Association of the State. The actual bills will again be reviewed by the Legislative Committee.)

- 4. Legislation that will make the State compatible with the Federal Government in regard to water plllution appropriations. (This item was reported to the Board at the last meeting.)
- 5. Legislation recommended by the Lake Hazards Committee for some type of holding tanks for water craft.
- 6. Legislation regulating and governing the removal of fishing shanties from the Lake.
- The recommendation of several counties that legislation be enacted to change the present act requiring the State Equalized Valuation on tax rolls.

- 8. A pool of concurrent resolutions passed by the State Legislature No. 357, which calls to the attention of the Federal Government the need for Planning Programs. There has been some indication that the funds for the 701 Planning Programs may be reduced by Congress.
- 9. Legislation regulating the publishing of Supervisors Proceedings. This will be reintroduced by Macomb County.
- 10. Support legislation if introduced, giving Health Departments immunity.
- 11. A bill to increase the return to the Counties of 50% of the cost of the care of T. B. patients in hospitals.
- 12. Support legislation to establish an appropriation for topographical mapping for Planning Departments.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Mrs. Lunt, supported by Franchuk, that the Committee recommend to the Board, the above items as a part of the 1967 legislative program and that they be submitted to the Supervisors Inter-County Committee. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Evans, supported by Merrelli, that the Committee recommend that the Legislature be encouraged to proceed with fiscal reform and that some consideration be given for additional funds for the use of local communities. Motion carried.

The Committee reviewed briefly the proposed Highway Safety Act that is expected to be passed by Congress. This will require matching funds from the State.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Franchuk, supported by Mrs. Lunt, that the Committee recommend that a resolution be adopted approving the Highway Safety Fund, with the request that the State Legislature also approve sufficient appropriations to coincide with the Federal Act, similar to a resolution recently passed by the Board on the water pollution legislation. Motion carried.

It was also the desire of the Committee that some reference be made to the possibility of including funds for street lighting, to be used by local governments.

The Committee discussed the question of a Public Defender. It is anticipated that legislation will be introduced at the next session, covering this procedure. Several counties at present are preparing legislation.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Mrs. Lunt, supported by Flanagan, that the Committee recommend that the County endorse the principle of a Public Defender and that when and if a Bill is introduced, it be examined and if necessary the County sponsor such a bill. Motion carried.

Mrs. Stark advised the Committee that Monroe County is in the process of introducing a bill covering the fees for dog licenses.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Mrs. Lunt, supported by Franchuk, that the legislation when received, be referred to the Animal Shelter Committee. Motion carried.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Tallman, supported by Merrelli, that the Committee approve and recommend to the Board the following recommendations of the County Taxation Study Committee for the Seventh District Supervisors. Motion carried.

- 1. A legislative bill should be prepared which would amend current legislation and assist in the assessment of personal property by providing:
  - (a) Authority to local assessors and Equalization Departments to examine taxpayers' records for the purpose of establishing an authentic tax base.
  - (b) Authorizing certain fines and penalties, retroactively for failure of taxpayer compliance in reporting.
  - (c) Other provisions which would be effective in the establishment of a tax base, equitable to all taxpayers.
- A system or schedule shall be devised that in application will produce a realistic, current, true cash value of personal property recognizing appreciation and depreciation in replacement costs and discounting technological improvements in business machinery.
- 3. The construction of a legislative bill which would amend current legislation and/or policy in the administrative procedures involved in granting exemptions compensable by the State of Michigan to local units of government i.e., Senior citizens and Veterans Exemptions, which places the responsibility of granting and compensating eligible applicants exclusively on the State Departments involved.

Several amendments to present laws and new laws were presented to the Committee by Dr. Stryker. These amendments and new laws will be introduced into the legislature through the State Health Department. The Committee reviewed the legislation and received and filed, pending receipt of the exact bills to be introduced.

### RETTREMENT COMMISSION MEETING - OCTOBER 7, 1966

### RESOLUTION NO. 879

The Clerk read the report of the Retirement Commission meeting held on October 7, 1966. This report was tabled at the October meeting of the Board to enable the Retirement Board to study all of the recommendations. Mr. Alfred Blomberg, Civil Counsel, read the amended sections of the Ordinance establishing the Macomb County Employees' Retirement System which is in the form of a Resolution. Motion was made by Levine, supported by Beaubien, that the Retirement Committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted and the Resolution also be adopted. On roll call vote, there were fifty-eight (58) ayes and no (0) nays. Motion carried and the proposed amendments to the Retirement System Ordinance were adopted. The Committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Retirement Commission held on Friday, October 7, 1966, the following commission members were present:

Shaw-Chairman, Beaubien, Bonior, McCollom, Brown, Hall, Blomberg-Civil Counsel, Whalen-Treasurer and Bennett-Secretary.

The Retirement Commission over the past year have been studying several proposals for changing the benefits for retirement of County employees. Several plans were prepared and submitted to the Commission by the County Actuary, Mr. Gabriel. At the present time the basic retirement allowance is one percent of the first \$4,200.00 of final average compensation and one and one-half percent of all over \$4,200.00, times the number of years of service.

After considerable study, the Commission is now recommending that this formula be changed to 1.25% of the first \$4,200.00 final compensation and 1.75% of all over \$4,200.00, times the number of years of credited service.

Following is a table showing the retirement allowance estimates, based on an employee having twenty years of service.

Based on the actuarial survey for the year 1965, this will cost the County an additional \$48,000.00 per year for General Fund and \$16,000.00 per year for the County Road Fund.

The average increase of pension will vary from 24% for the lower income to approximately 15% to the higher income brackets.

The Budget includes a payroll increase of \$1,167,248.00 and due to the reduction of certain appropriations the actual total increase is \$1,071,795.00. The salary increase includes \$97,312.00 for ten (10) employees added during 1966, seventy seven (77) new employees added to the Budget amounting to \$502,977.00 and the balance of \$566,959.00 represents adjustments and salary increases for employees.

# Longevity Compensation:

An appropriation of \$70,000.00 is included for payment due in December 1967. This is to continue policy established by the Board of Supervisors in 1963, paid on the following schedule:

## Hospital Insurance:

That full paid certified hospitalization insurance be furnished all employees and their families included in the budget. There is no change for 1967.

## Life Insurance:

Each employee to be covered by \$3,000.00 life insurance paid in full by the County, increased from \$2,000,00 in 1966, appropriation is increased from \$15,000.00 to \$20,000.00. Increase effective January 6, 1967.

## Retirement:

Employees retiring after December 31, 1966 will receive increased benefits as approved by the Board of Supervisors December 14, 1966. Ordinance is to be amended accordingly. Appropriation for Retirement in General Fund is \$235,000.

## Social Security:

Rate is increased for 1967 from 4.2% to 4.4%.

## Sick Leave:

Amendment to Annual Leave and Sick Leave Ordinance to affect the following changes:

Permit an accumulation of 125 days - present accumulation is 100 days.

An employee leaving County Service after 5 years to receive 25% of accumulated sick leave in cash, based on total salary at termination of employment.

An employee leaving County Service after 10 years of continuous service and not eligible for retirement to receive 50% of accumulated sick leave in cash based on salary at termination of employment.

Each employee is allowed to use 1 day for Personal business and charge to Sick Leave.

# TRAVEL AND CAR ALLOWANCE:

The officials and employees be allowed the following for mileage on a monthly basis:

10c per mile for 300 miles
8c per mile next 700 miles

per mile all mileage over 1,000 miles

Requests for mileage payments are to be filed on forms furnished by the Controller. Forms must be filed at least 60 days after expense has been incurred.

# TRAVEL AND CAR ALLOWANCE (cont'd):

That any county employee requiring expenses for an overnight stay for a meeting, convention or any county business must submit an itemized expense account to be approved by the Finance Committee. No expense will be allowed for trips outside the state unless they have first been authorized by the Finance Committee. A maximum of \$20.00 per day for expenses, plus transportation and convention registrations, will be allowed; the committee is authorized to approve an additional allowance if information is furnished that will justify the additional amount.

## COUNTY VEHICLES:

That all motor vehicles owned by the county and operated by the departments within this budget have adequate markings on both side doors identifying it as a county vehicle. Monthly mileage reports giving daily speedometer readings and brief descriptions of trips made are to be filed with the Controller. Gasoline for vehicles to be secured from the county pump. Exceptions to this rule are to be authorized by this committee.

The Clerk read the report of the Budget Committee meeting held on December 27, 1966. Motion was made by Wade, supported by Ryan, that the committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. Ages all - nays none. Motion carried and the Committee report follows:

At a meeting of the Budget Committee held on Tuesday, December 27, 1966, the following committee members were present:

Beaubien-Chairman, Levine, Back, Inwood, Buss, Okros, Beck, Ryan, Underwood, Valusek, Waterman and Bonior.

The Chairman opened the meeting at 10:05 A.M., as the official Public Hearing on the budget for 1967. The hearing was advertised as required by Statute.

Mr. Carl Brandenburg, Supervisor of Chesterfield Township, appeared before the Committee to discuss the request for an appropriation for the Traffic Safety Association. Mr. Brandenburg was advised that the Committee had considered the request for an appropriation. No action was taken, pending the receipt of additional information, such as the amount of money raised by private contributions and also the amount of the proposed budget and a summary of some of the activities.

Mr. Brandenburg presented to the committee a summary of activities. The committee stated they would take action after the receipt of the requested budget information.

No other individuals appeared before the Committee.

The following corrections should be made in the printed budget for 1967:

Page 2 of letter, under "Sick Leave", second paragraph after the word "5 years" should be inserted "of continuous service".

Third paragraph, after "continuous service", the following should be deleted "and not eligible for retirement".

Page 18, Equalization Department. Item No. 1, Tax Consultant, should be changed to Director.

Salary under 1966 column instead of \$13,000.00 should be \$13,500.00.

In the 1967 column, the following classifications changes should be made:

General Clerk IV to V General Clerk II to III General Clerk III to IV Typist Clerk II to III

These changes do not affect the amount in the 1967 Budget.

Page 28, Prosecuting Attorney. In 1967 budget column, Assistant I, change number 6 to 7. Total employees should be 37. The amount of dollars in the budget is correct.

Page 32, Sheriff Department. Salary under 1966 budget for Sheriff should be \$16,500.00 instead of \$16,000.00.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Buss, supported by Underwood, that all full time employees be expected to devote the entire normal working day on county function and that there be no outside activities scheduled during working hours. Motion carried.

The following policy recommended for County Employees was approved:

As recommended, if any employee wishes to attend conferences, meetings or any other activities other than those related to his county position, the time required should be approved by the department head or a committee of the Board and the time off charged to Annual Leave and or regular compensation.

It was reported to the committee that the recommendation of the Legislative Committee for a Steno Clerk for the Federal Aid Coordinator was not acted upon. The committee tabled the request until a report on the evaluation of the position is received from the Legislative Committee.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION: A motion was made by Underwood, supported by Ryan, that the Committee approve the budget for 1967 and recommended its adoption to the Board of Supervisors. Motion carried.

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Valusek, supported by Levine, that the Public Hearing on the 1967 budget be adjourned. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.

After some discussion, motion was made by Evans, supported by Alsip, that the 1967 Recommended Budget be approved. On roll call vote there were fifty-seven (57) ayes and no (0) mays and the budget was approved.

A motion was made by Stark, supported by Waterman, that County Offices be closed at noon on Friday, December 30, 1966. Ayes all - nays none. Motion carried.

The Chairman announced that the State Association of Supervisors Annual Conference will be held at Lansing, Michigan on January 17, 18 & 19, 1967, and asked those planning to attend to contact Mr. Sherwood Bennett about reservations.

D.P.W. COMMITTEE MEETING - DECEMBER 28, 1966

### RESOLUTION NO. 881

The Clerk read the report of the D.P.W. Committee meeting held on December 28, 1966 and the Chairman called upon Mr. Thomas Tomlinson, Chairman of the Committee, to bring the members up to date on the sewage problem in Macomb County. Mr. Tomlinson then called upon Mr. Thomas Welsh, Drain Commissioner, to explain the contract with the City of Detroit to take care of sewage from the communities in Macomb County. Mr. Welsh explained that Macomb County would have to work out an agreement with each community to participate in this contract and, until that time, there was nothing binding on the County in the contract. Mr. Blomberg explained that, if this contract is approved, a subcommittee must go into each community to work out a contract with them. He added that until the County gets a sufficient number of communities to participate in this program, they do not have to do anything and that no community can be bound by the contract until they make an agreement with the County. Motion was made by Shaw, supported by Bade, that the matter be tabled until the next meeting of the Board to give the city attorneys time to study the matter. After discussion, a roll call vote was taken. There were ten (10) ayes and forty-one (41) mays and the motion to table was defeated. The Chairman stated that the County is trying to get the sewer ban lifted and that this action is just an expression of intent and seems like the most feasible answer to the problem. After further discussion, motion was made by Valusek, supported by Back, that the Resolution identified as Exhibit "A" as part of the contract be adopted and that the Committee report be received, filed and recommendations adopted. On roll call vote there were forty-three (43) ayes and seven (7) mays and the motion carried. The Committee report follows:

At a meeting of the D.P.W. Committee held on Wednesday, December 28, 1966, the following committee members were present:

The revised draft of the contract with the City of Detroit Water Board was reviewed and explained. After a detailed explanation by Civil Counsel and Drain Commissioner,

COMMITTEE ACTION: A motion was made by Whedon, supported by Inwood, that the Committee feels the agreement for waste water disposal with the Detroit Water Board is acceptable and wishes to submit it to the Board of Supervisors. Motion carried.

A motion was made to adjourn. Motion carried.
