ARMADA TOWNSHIP

Controversy swirls around bookkeeping

Bank reconciliations and a controversial agenda issue had Armada Township residents in an uproar at a special meeting of the Armada Township Board of Trustees Feb. 5.

The meeting was originally scheduled for Feb. 1 but a typographical error caused the meeting to be moved to Feb. 5.

Many residents learned about the meeting via social media.

Resident Steve Nikkel noted that Armada Township Supervisor John Paterek seemed to be conducting a lot of business behind closed doors.

"I don't feel that having a special meeting one on one with an individual is appropriate. As board members that are elected officials to this community, you should be explaining to us more in depth as to what really is going on and why you're coming up with these decisions," he said. "Instead it's a cat and mouse game and it's really deceitful. Having special meetings like this is deceitful. Not conveying the correct message is deceitful."

On the agenda was an item listing the job description of a deputy supervisor.

Paterek planned to hire Robin Spalding as the deputy supervisor. Residents were outraged when it was learned she is Paterek's personal secretary at his business, Paterek Mold and Engineering.

"I think it's a huge conflict of interest having your personal secretary. I don't see how a true honest job can be done when you're conducting business here and you're conducting business at your own business. I don't see how you can separate the two," Nikkel said.

Resident Monica Job felt that Armada Township Treasurer Camille Finlay was the best person to perform the bank reconciliations the township has been dealing with since March 2017.

"Bank reconciliations are the treasurer's responsibility. Camille is working diligently like nobody has done in years here and working to get that done," Job said.

Another item on the agenda was to give Paterek full access to all township records through BS&A and Quick-Books software the township uses.

"If you have viewing to BS&A and QuickBooks, that is all you should ever have. If I was the clerk or the treasurer the last thing I want is anybody else having access who would be able to go in there and change anything already in those books or not. Nobody should have access to that to change anything going in or going out other than the treasurer and the clerk," she said.

Spalding explained that the special meeting was called at the recommendation of Cary Vaughn, the administrative manager of the audit section of the Michigan Department of Treasury.

Vaughn was concerned that the budgets had not been balanced.

She also explained her expertise in bookkeeping was the reason Paterek selected her.

"The only reason John would include me in this is because I'm not just a secretary, I'm a bookkeeper. I know how to work QuickBooks. I can learn BS&A. It's the only reason he asked for my help," Spalding said.

She went on to explain that Paterek kept getting locked out of BS&A and had to prepare screen dumps to obtain information.

Armada Village Treasurer Jo Adair admitted that BS&A and QuickBooks often conflict with each other.

"It should not be impossible for you to go back into QuickBooks because you will need access to some of that history," she said.

Paterek said he is working on getting a financial adviser to take a look at their records and to get a bond rating for the township. He also admitted the township was in a mess but that money had not gone missing.

"I don't think that there's money missing. I just don't think it can be accounted for," he said. "At some point, I need to know where we are."

Paterek explained why he put a deputy supervisor's job description on the agenda.

"It will help me follow how these bank reconciliations are being handled and where we are on a weekly basis," he said.

The description would include assisting Paterek with gathering financial information, knowledge of Quick-Books, and weekly updates submitted on the status of bank reconciliations.

"I am completely opposed to that," Finlay said. "I was just told 'I want bank reconciliations and I want Robin to get them'."

Finlay then gave members of the board packets containing transcripts of texts and e-mails during Spalding's tenure at the township.

Spalding served as Deputy Treasurer from August 2016 to January 2017. According to Finlay, back in November Spalding was hired to perform the bank reconciliations only. Finlay eventually learned that Spalding had hoped to become treasurer.

"In the 24 weeks that she worked in the treasurer's office she made a notation and one bank statement that she balanced from December checking," she said. "In six weeks I cleaned up years of bad bookkeeping that wasn't cleaned up during the 24 weeks that Robin worked in the same office."

The texts and e-mails show that Peg Smith's last day was Nov. 16, but her retirement was not announced until Nov. 20.

Finlay also said that she and clerk Mary Swiacki had to deal with harassing e-mails from Spalding, primarily regarding pay for her work.

On Dec. 26 Finlay said Paterek contacted attorney Christine Anderson to find a legal way to overthrow her appointment as treasurer.

"When that failed I received two emails from Robin threatening legal action on me to cease and desist. It stated that the letters would follow by certified e-mail as well. This did not happen. It's just more bullying," she said

Spalding denied bullying Finlay.

The motion to give Paterek access to the township's records was ultimately changed to giving him access to only view and print all township records through BS & A and QuickBooks.

The motion to define the deputy supervisor's job description failed by a vote of three to two.
